


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A Diocesan Big Sing event is planned for January 2023.



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A NOTE FROM THE BISHOP



Sermon for a Service of Prayer and Reflection on the eve of the funeral of Queen Elizabeth II in St Macartin's Cathedral Church, Enniskillen 18th September 2022

We gather this evening in St Macartin's Cathedral, Enniskillen for this community service of prayer and reflection on the life of our late monarch Queen Elizabeth. Since her death last Thursday, a great sadness has intervened in our common life, and we feel that the pattern of our lives has been shaken. Many people have spoken about the constancy of her reign and how the still centre of national life has been disturbed and how a remarkable chapter of the life of this nation has ended. That feeling has been shared widely across these islands and across the world.

Her death has touched our world because she was probably the most famous person in our world today. Thousands of people have been impelled to travel to mark her passing with floral gifts and make visits to Balmoral, Edinburgh, and London. Many of those who were interviewed spoke of a 'personal grief' having felt they knew the Queen without ever having spoken to her because of the warmth with which she carried out her duties.

We have been transfixed by the TV coverage of various aspects of the preparation for her funeral, the journey of her remains from Balmoral to Edinburgh, the arrival in London, the resting in state, in preparation for

tomorrow's funeral. We have seen the deep respect with which she was held by people, the quiet dignity shown by the many bowed heads. There have been exquisite services of remembrance, with beautiful music, deeply moving moments and fitting tributes by the Royal family, clergy and politicians and those who met her personally.

Much has also been said about her personal qualities, her clear yet quiet un-showy faith, her sense of the role thrust upon her as a young woman and her distinctive and unique service. On this eve of her funeral, we are together as a community with the late Queen in our minds, to gather our thoughts, to fill our hearts with thankfulness and to join in prayer.

In many ways we are doing what families do upon the death of a loved one, come together in God's house, to pray, to reflect, to find common strength, to share memories, to value the love shared, to prepare hearts for a difficult day ahead. Tonight, we recall that at the core of this time of mourning a Family is grieving the loss of a mother, grandmother, and great-grandmother. This is hugely private loss as well as a national loss.

What families often do in times of grief is to talk together and remember how

the deceased person has touched our lives and the qualities we admired. In the case of Queen Elizabeth, those who had met her at engagements and state visits have commented on: her gracious personality, her dazzling smile, her Hanoverian blue eyes, her deep interest in people, her strength and wisdom. Above all that unfailing sense of selfless service which has marked her reign.

In June here in Fermanagh we, as many parts of the UK and Commonwealth, marked her Platinum Jubilee with many celebratory events. Most memorable was the service here in St Macartin's followed by the beacon lighting in the churchyard and at the Castle. It was a time of great rejoicing, and I had the privilege of speaking at that service and we focussed on that profound sense of duty and service. And I reflected that this might be traced to a pattern of life learned from the Catechism – a duty towards God and a duty towards thy neighbour.

Families at times like these also tend to pass around photos of the deceased in happier times and reflect on the occasions they shared as family, and what they meant to all.

There must be millions of photographs of the Queen, taken in times of joy and times of sorry, each marking a moment in her long and fulfilling life.

However, for us those photos taken during her visits to Ireland, have had an importance beyond measure.

Photos taken during her visit to Dublin in 2011 when she visited sites of significance for Irish nationalism in Dublin. And most importantly when she delivered a widely praised speech in Dublin Castle on the relations between the two countries reflecting that 'With the benefit of historical hindsight we can all see things which we would wish had been done differently or not at all".

Her words, calling for forbearance and conciliation and the loosening of the knots of history, were picked up by many and deeply appreciated.

How can we ever forget the photos taken to mark her historic 2012 visit to this town at a service to mark the 60th anniversary of her reign? Those remarkable images taken by the world's media as she famously walked across Church Street to meet members of St Michael's Church, and the wonderful painting commissioned to commemorate the moment. She led the way in promoting reconciliation and breaking down barriers to friendship and working together.

In a few moments, tonight Dean Hall and Monsignor O Reilly will lead us and once again we will have opportunity to follow the footsteps of Her Majesty by



crossing Church Street to be welcomed into the community of St Michaels for the second part of this service. It is something which only we can do tonight, and we do it with gladness in her memory. It is something very dear to our hearts and is a unique memory for us here in Enniskillen of the late Queen.

However, Queen Elizabeth has left us with not just photographs of that day but an example of how to live well with our neighbours. We might ask ourselves as we complete this service of remembrance and this walk, are we truly following this command to love our neighbour as ourselves and to be inspired by the example that Queen Elizabeth has modelled in her life? Are we walking a life of reconciliation and taking every opportunity to build new relationships across our communities?

I have been wondering this week what is it that makes Queen Elizabeth stand above all the other famous people in our society, the politicians and statesmen and women? I think it is because she represents a set of spiritual qualities. Politicians deal with the affairs of the moment, administering the shifting challenges of our times. The Queen points us to eternal qualities such as constancy, faith, grace, fidelity, dedication and service. She bequeaths to us a spiritual inheritance.

Tonight, in common with all who gather on this eve of the funeral of Queen Elizabeth, we close this hour of prayer by commending the Queen into the hands of Almighty God, we pray for her dear family, and we seek for them courage and faith to meet the days ahead with steadfast trust in the Saviour whom she believed guided and held her life. And we pray for the future of our county and country that we might be built into the kingdom of our Saviour Jesus Christ."

At the time of writing these notes for the Diocesan Magazine, we have been stopped short in our daily lives with the sudden passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. Each one of us will have our own memories of a gracious, dignified, and dedicated lady whose motto "I Serve" was also the motto of her father, King George VI and her grandfather, King George V. In the month of April 2022, the author of these notes whilst on a visit to Edinburgh, visited St Giles Cathedral. Little did we think, then, that St Giles would play such a role in Her Majesty's final journey from Balmoral to London. On the evening of Her Majesty's passing, the bells in Cleenish and Mullaghdun were set to toll and the Rev Alison led

both services on the morning of Sunday 11th September with special prayers and lituray.

As the peoples of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland mourn the passing of our beloved Queen, we offer up the following prayer: God of love,

Creation, Humans, and the Spirit


Amen.

The season of Autumn is well upon us now as you read this. Harvest Thanksgiving Services are in full swing. Within our liturgy we are blessed with a richness of resources provided for our use as we thank and praise our Creator for his steadfastness and goodness. I love the hymns we sing during Harvest, but I feel they do sometimes overshadow the original source of many, the Psalms. Before there were any hymns, we sang psalms. Not that long ago memorising the psalms was the best way of gaining easy access to scripture. It is my hope that psalms will once again have been sung in Cleenish and Mullaghdun Parishes this Harvest to our bountiful and generous Creator.

According to Paul, Christians, of all people, should be sensitive to the groans of creation and respond with prayer and action. In Romans 8:18-30 he provides a beautiful insight into the intricate relationship between humans, creation, and the Holy Spirit, where creation itself is eagerly longing for humans to become true children of God.

Almost every day now we hear on the news that our global environmental crisis is getting worse. Climate change gets most of the attention, and there is no doubt that it is a very serious problem. The carbon dioxide concentration in our atmosphere is increasing year on year, and that is a major factor in driving the ever-increasing global temperature. This is reflected in the severity and frequency of global weather events as experienced in Pakistan last month. And it is going to get worse. At the same time, we are losing animal and plant species to extinction at an alarming rate. Not to mention soil degradation, nitrogen pollution, ocean acidification, land use change and a host of others that rarely make it to the news.

In the years since I first learnt about the hole in the Ozone layer, Greenhouse Gases, and recycling, at school in the 1980's, things have got a lot worse. Change must happen. We all remember the pre-pandemic school strikes led by Greta Thunberg. However, with the Global crisis in energy supply caused by the war in Ukraine, the pre-pandemic agreements

made in Glasgow November 2019 at COP26 seem to have been overtaken by these recent Global events. We are stewards of the earth, and we have responsibility to care for it. Meet our Group's longest serving organist: Mrs. May Leech

Music warms the heart and lifts the soul, and this Group owes a huge debt to the three talented organists who exercise







their ministry of music in our churches. We treasure them all – but after 34 years of devoted service our longest serving organist, May Leech in Clones, has decided to retire. As she returns from the organ loft to the pews, here is just a little of her history.

May is a 'local girl', born in Newbliss in 1934. Her father was the local blacksmith as well as being a fine musician and Sunday School teacher. As she grew up, May attended church with her parents each Sunday – and, as a young girl, her first experience of playing the organ was to accompany just one hymn in Sunday services under the watchful eye of the then organist (Mrs Doogan) after lessons from Miss McGee.

At the age of 17, May left Newbliss to live and work in Belfast. She then emigrated with her family to England when she was just 20. It was in England that she married the love of her life, Jervis, who followed her from Clones – and together they had four children, the eldest two of whom were born in England ... and the youngest two in Ireland, after her return to her husband's family farm near Clones at the age of 28.

Alongside her work on the farm and raising a family, May looks back with real satisfaction on a rich and varied career. During her life she has looked after children in Belfast, begun training as a nurse in Enniskillen, worked in Marks and Spencer's in Leamington Spa, and spent many years working as a highly respected relief teacher in the Clones area. Whatever she did, though, May never forgot her love of music. She joined the Clones Choir (singing alto) immediately after coming back to Ireland, and when organist Dorothy McMahon left for Lisburn in 1988 May filled the vacancy. The rest is history!

For the past 34 years May has played the organ in Clones with skill and dedication – helping the people to sing God's praises

and leading our excellent choir ... as well as being a good friend and musical advisor to a number of different Rectors. She also spent 20 years travelling straight on from Sunday services in Clones to play the organ in Newtownbutler Church too ... and after being invited to follow her from Clones to Newbliss on his first Sunday in the Group four years ago, the current Rector can testify from experience that May is the fastest driver in her 80s he has ever met! He can also testify that she is one of the most supportive, helpful, hospitable (and yes, glamorous!) organists with whom he has had the privilege to serve

As May retires, we will miss her at the organ. Yet she goes with our thanks and blessing – and we know she will be busy with her crosswords, jigsaws, thrillers, and many (great-) grandchildren! We also look forward to standing alongside her in the congregation as together we sing a new song to the Lord.



In remembrance of HM Queen Elizabeth II

As the news broke of the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, many of us felt that immediate sense of loss of one who was a constant in all our lives. Her devotion to duty, and service, to her people, has never faltered throughout her long reign. Her words often at times of crisis, but annually in her Christmas message to the nation and commonwealth was intermingled with her expression of faith in Christ, and of His words being a source of comfort and guidance throughout her life. It is for us all as it was for Elizabeth our faithful Queen to have a living faith in a living Saviour, Jesus Christ the King of kings, and Lord of lords.

Back in June of this year, we celebrated her 70 years on the throne, a time of jubilation for our nation, to which we thank God, by whose grace she reigned over us. "His lord said unto him, Well done, good and faithful servant; thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things: enter thou into the joy of thy lord." Matthew 25: 23 As the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland mourn the Queen, there are those whose mocking voices. whose key aim is to cause offence and hurt, celebrate Her passing. I wonder how they would feel, though it appears they lack emotions, if this was their mother, grandmother, and someone else mocked their passing. Jesus said, "He that is without sin among you, let him first cast a stone at her." John 8: 7 we all have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God. Sadly, the moral and biblical values espoused by Queen Elizabeth II, by like mind Christians throughout the world are not embraced by everyone.

The events we are able to witness on our TV screens, listen to on radio, or view on social media enables us to connect with what is happening elsewhere. Some of what we hear and see may seem strange as we mourn The Queen's passing and at the same time welcome the proclamation of a new King, Charles III. God save the King. That transition, the historical significance that the continuity of the monarchy remains unbroken. History unfolds before our eyes, of which we are a part, remembering with love and thanksgiving the passing of our faithful Queen Elizabeth II, and pledging allegiance to King Charles III. While some in the political arena, whose past and present still glorifies acts of terrorism, now in their roles, must recognise and welcome Charles III as king of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and pass on the condolences of the people here. It is our hope, and our prayer that such is not merely tokenism but a step forward. Paul's words in Romans 13 are worth reading and commending to heart, lest we believe what we do, we do on our own authority and not of God.



Outside work

Lots of work has been undertaken at the





side of Donacavey church over recent months. A large plot of trees has been removed and the ground cleared and levelled. Most of the timber was sold to Balcas and will be used for planks, posts and other timber products. Almost 30 tonnes of the hardwood has been sold and will be used for wood burning stoves, and around 200 tonne of branches have been shredded and reprocessed into chippings that will be used to generate electricity. Nothing has gone to waste and even the stumps of the trees were used for filling on a building site. Parishioners and local people can just remember it being planted many years ago and also games being played on the tennis court that had long since been overgrown. All this work has created a great interest and of course speculation as to what will be built on the now cleared land. Heritage Week

We were delighted to be able to reopen two of our churches during Heritage week following the disruptions that accompanied the various lockdowns over the past two years.

In St Salvator's Revd Tim spoke about the architecture of the village, the church and their various stages of development since the first Manor House was first built on the site prior to the arrival of Bishop John Leslie and his family. Revd Tim then gave a brief biography of Bishop John, "the fighting Bishop", detailing his exploits in

defence of the monarchy and his sustained resistance against the numerically superior forces of Cromwell. It was Bishop John's support of the monarch that resulted in his translation to Clogher Diocese and the gift from Parliament of £2000 that enabled him to purchase the land which was to become the Leslie Estate and it was here that he refounded the parish church where worship according to the Book of Common Prayer (which Cromwell had proscribed during the Commonwealth and Protectorate) continues to this day. Mr Diane Kendrick-Wright brought us up to date with her memories of the excitement surrounding Sir Paul McCartney's wedding in 2002 and the speculations and secrecy surrounding the events which were exposed when Sir Jack accidentally let the cat out of the bag when he made an offhand comment to some reporters at the gate, not realising that the cameras were rolling! Diane entertained the audience with descriptions of the opulence and extravagance of the floral displays and recollections of the guests and the somewhat nonplussed response of the



locals who were much more interested in the Irish team's progress in the Football World Cup in Japan. We also got to hear about the delight caused to two nuns and their class of teenage girls when they happened across the 25-year old Mick Jagger while on their school trip to Castle Leslie in 1966. Of course, no history of St Salvator's would be complete without reference to the much-loved Sir Jack Leslie and it was with his memorial plaque, installed ante mortem and filled in post mortem that we concluded our history of St Salvator's.

We are very fortunate to have a number of budding young historians in our parish, among them Master Alfie Stewart who interviewed his grandfather Mr William Singleton for a school History and Heritage project. Mr Singleton has an excellent memory and his grandson proved an adept listener and chronicler of his grandfather's memories of his school and church life and especially of the life and times of the long closed Errigal Shanco Church. Alfie was assisted in the telling of his grandfather's recollections by his mother Mrs Arlene Stewart because summer days are very long and tiring for energetic young historians, especially when their lectures don't begin until near bedtime and they have been busy at camp all day. Mr Singleton recalled his his home life, school life and church life. We were fascinated to see the pictures of the old Glebe House and the smiling young faces of so many of our now most eminent parishioners in short trousers as they crouched in-front of their beaming teacher, whom, we noted, Mr Singleton had his arm around! We were reminded of a very different pace of life when cars were a rarity and confirmations weren't the big family events that they are now, with Mr Singleton and five of his contemporaries being taken off to Clogher Cathedral by one of the few parishioners who owned a car.

Mrs Ethne McCord had assembled a collection of photos of her own family through the years and these stimulated much excitement as different members of the audience were able to fill in the gaps in the recollection of who was who in each of the photos. One of the loveliest of the photos was of the parishioners of St Muadain's, Errigal Truagh from 1982. Many of those in the photo have long since gone to God, but the front row was of special interest as it featured a very young Mrs Stewart (nee Singleton) and two of her siblings who were also in the audience on the evening of their nephew Alfie's lecture. The Singleton name looms large in the history of both Errigal Shanco and Errigal Truagh and their presence is still strong



in the parish today where Mr Singleton continues on the Select Vestry which he first joined 65 years ago, and Revd Tim was greatly heartened to hear that one of Alfie's ambitions is to follow in his granda's footsteps and be Rector's Churchwarden. On the evidence of his thorough research and excellent lecture, I'm sure he will be a shoe in!

On the last Sunday of the Summer Holidays the children came to church with their bright new Schoolbags and pencil cases for the Blessing of the Schoolbags. Revd Tim showed the congregation a candle and reminded the children of how Jesus calls each of us to bring the light of his love into all that we do, so that we can bring Christ's light of kindness, forgiveness, friendship and inclusion into the lives of everyone we know and meet. Next, Revd Tim showed us a copy of the Bible and told the children how their parent's and all who love them want them to hear wise words so that they may grow to be wise too and that in the Bible we find many wise words and stories that help us to understand how much God loves each one of us and how God wants us to grow in wisdom and love

in all that we say and think and do. Finally Revd Tim showed us a lunchbox (although he told us that it wasn't his actual lunchbox as that one was too big to get into the car!) and reminded us that our lunch boxes are filled with food that is lovingly prepared for us so that we can be fed and sustained and have the energy to grow and learn, but also it reminds us of how we need the love and care of others and how others need our love and care to to ensure that they grow strong too.

Enthronement

On Thursday 8th September on the Feast of the Birth of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Bishop Ian was finally enthroned at Clogher Cathedral. The Service was prefaced by the sad news of the death of Queen Elizabeth II, for whom a minute's silence was observed and Dean Kenny Hall led the congregation in prayers for the Royal Family and King Charles III before the national anthem was played. However, the Enthronement Service was a joyous occasion for Bishop Ian and the Diocese and our parish contributed to the festivities as Mrs Ethne McCord's merry

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Queen Elizabeth II

Lord Jesus Christ, you are the way, the truth and the life. Keep me from wandering from your ways. Help me to trust you, the truth, and to be filled with your life. May your Holy Spirit teach me to live the right way, to be truthful, and to be filled with your life, living to please you. Amen.

This was one of the prayers that Queen Elizabeth prayed before her Coronation. Later in her own words she said, "...I must seek by God's grace to be a true and faithful witness unto the Lord." It's clear from this that she was living to please the Lord. In her Christmas message in 2002 she said:

"I know just how much I rely on my own faith to guide me through the good times and the bad. Each day is a new beginning. I know that the only way to live my life is to try to do what is right, to take the long view, to give of my best in all that the day brings, and to put my trust in God....I draw strength from the message of hope in the Christian gospel."

"To take the long view" meant that she had her eyes on eternal things and on the knowledge that she would either go to



be with Christ or meet him when he came again (if she was still alive). She once told her chaplain, "How I wish that the Lord would come in my lifetime!" When the chaplain asked her why, she replied with quivering lips and her whole countenance lighted up with deep emotion: "I should so love to lav mv crown at His feet." For each of us who like Queen Elizabeth and others who have lived their lives for Jesus, longing for his appearing, Paul tells us there is a crown (2 Tim 4:8) Now there is in store for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will award to me on that day—and not only to me, but also to all who have longed for his appearing.

Prayer Spaces

Prayer Spaces provide an opportunity to draw aside, take time out and meet with God. They are dedicated space where people can go to pray and seek God, to intercede and petition. Jesus withdrew to pray (Mt 14:13; Lk 5:12-16; Jn 6:14-16), not at the expense of serving the Father but in order to be more effective in that. The key is not about the physical spaces, but about making space for relationship with God who from the beginning of time, longs to be with His people and connect with them. We know that God is everywhere and we can meet with God anywhere and everywhere, but a Prayer Space with information as well as activities to help people focus on God and issues in the world, together with time set aside, can have a real impact on someone's prayer life.

Over the Harvest weekend (Friday 30th Sept – Sunday 2nd Oct) the Church and the hall will be set up as prayer spaces to help reflect on various aspects of Harvest, including thanksgiving as well as on the Bible Society and Barnabas Aid. The Church will be open on Friday from 8pm (beginning with our first Harvest Service) until 10.30pm, on Saturday from 10am to 10pm and then on Sunday from 7.30pm – 10.30pm (beginning with our final Harvest Service).

Enniskillen Cathedral



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It was with great sadness that we heard of the death of Queen Elizabeth II on Thursday 8th September, and we pray for King Charles III – both as he mourns the death of his mother and settles into the hugely demanding role of being our King. Over this past month, we have heard – time and time again – of Her Late Majesty's faith: the witness she bore to her faith, and the actions that sprung from her faith – her love of her country, her devotion to duty, and her desire for reconciliation.

The reign of the Queen was not a performance, but rather the character of one who lived up to the oaths she took. While so much of her life was dominated by protocol and civil duties, we recognise that she set something quite different before us. For 70 years, through turbulence and change, she has sustained the qualities we admire, and remained the person we respect. She promised at her Coronation to devote her life to principle, not power; to law, to justice, to mercy, and to faith. She kept her promise; she ran the race. It was sustained and it was



demanding. It could be truly said in those words of St Paul to Timothy: 'I have fought the good fight; I have finished the race; I have kept the faith.'

Can the same be said of us concerning our faith? At baptism, we became a member of Christ and a child of God, with a promise to continue on the Christian journey and a prayer that we may bear witness to the Christian Life by a life of service to others. Queen Elizabeth certainly kept the faith and bore witness to the Christ by a life of service to other. We should follow her example. She always endeavoured to look at the world with the eyes of Christ.

During this Harvest Season as we look around us, it is my prayer that we will see through new eyes each day the ways God has blessed us and never take God or those blessings for granted. This year, as we celebrate the Harvest Thanksgiving, may we each see God for who he really is and see ourselves for who we really are. People who have been blessed beyond measure need to give thanks to the Giver of all good gifts, and give a little more to those in need. We often don't realise how blessed we are- and hence how thankful we ought to be - until what we have is threatened to be taken away.

With rising prices of almost everything, including food and heating bills, we as a church need to reach out to those in need. We have already started that process by recycling School Uniforms, opening our Cathedral Halls on Tuesdays to allow parishioners to save on heating bills, and holding Supper at Six to provide a substantial meal. Another way to help would be to provide some food for Enniskillen Food Bank, as well as contribute to our Harvest Appeal.

During this Harvest Season, may we take time to reflect and to enjoy all that God has given us. Harvest Thanksgiving means nothing until you give back to God the gratitude due to him; we need to offer thanks by singing to and about him, praying to him, giving all that we have to him – including our talents, abilities, possessions, opportunities, and most importantly our presence in his Church. We need to commit ourselves to be his faithful disciples, and never take God for granted; for such was the pattern set by Her Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

Guest Preacher at the Family Service on 23rd October

The Revd Nick McKee tells us a little about himself: I was born the youngest of five children to John and Grace McKee. I went



to Jones Memorial Primary School and then Portora Royal School where Stephen Nixon was one of my contemporaries. At school I was rubbish at rugby but not bad at rowing. My Fermanagh childhood has given me a deep love of the outdoors and I regularly drag my family up mountains and across lakes. After school I went to Nottingham to study engineering and then spent a decade in the oil and chemical industry before entering training for ordination. The call to ordained ministry had come much earlier, shortly after I'd stopped wanting to be a lorry driver aged about seven, but I was a bit slow on the uptake. While still working in industry I found my way into the Church of England in Brussels and from there I entered training for ordination in Cambridge. Cambridge was followed by a curacy in south Manchester and an incumbency in Bolton, just north west of Manchester. After a decade of parish ministry I moved to my current role as Director of Vocations for the Diocese of Blackburn.

I'm married to Jo, who is also ordained and is the vicar of a parish in north Manchester, and we have one daughter called Hannah who is an A Level student. With two clergy for parents, Hannah has to be one of the most understanding teenagers on God's good earth. Jeremiah got an understanding of what happens to a person or situation when that person or situation is placed in the hands of a loving God. The New Living Translation of Jeremiah 18 verse 4 of says "But the jar he was making did not turn out as he had hoped, so he crushed it into a lump of clay again and started over". When you are in the hands of a loving God, He gives you opportunities to start all over again; He makes it possible for you to experience a new beginning. I believe God invites all of us to His New Beginning. His New Beginning in our lives so that we work together to make the world a better place. God is no ordinary potter. This was what God wanted Jeremiah to understand that was why He sent Jeremiah to the



1. The potter may not have had the patience to start all over again or to continue working with that same pot. Starting over requires a lot of patience. God as a potter is able to start over with the same marred, spoilt pot because He is no ordinary potter. We are clay in the hands of a patient and loving God.

2. The potter may have thrown the pot away or discarded it.

When items in our homes or offices get spoilt, damaged, broken or rotten, what do we do with those items? We throw them away, put them aside, dump or abandon them somewhere in our store or shed. As far as we are concerned, they are no longer desirable and useful. But when you are in the hands of a loving and merciful God as the prophet Jeremiah saw, no matter how spiritually rotten, spoilt, damaged or broken you are

God will not throw you away, He will not abandon you. The potter still had use for the marred pot; He still continued working on it. We are all a work in progress and God never gives up on us.

A Better Way



From Rev. Rebecca: NOTES FROM THE RECTORY:

A turn in the seasons is upon us, and

at the same time a change of season nationally. The air outside grows cold, we recalibrate, packing away the flipflops and summer shorts for next year, assessing whether we have enough jumpers, casting a weather-eye over the log pile.

And here, in September, we also take stock as a nation. A monarch is dead the longest-reigning monarch, in fact, of the United Kingdom. Her death seems to bring a close to a chapter of our history, and now we are recalibrating. It's an unsettling time. As we leave behind one chapter in our national history, we are still adjusting to this new chapter. We're not sure what the future will bring. Indeed, everything is tinged with uncertainty. We have a new King, and a new Prime Minister. We have an ongoing cost-of-living crisis. We have inflation, and talk of a recession. Moreover, we have just come through a 10-year period of particular turbulence: a recession, the Arab spring and ensuing conflict in the Middle East, an increasingly unstable weather climate, a

pandemic, and most recently the war in Ukraine. In light of the past decade, the future seems particularly unpredictable. There is one constant, however, in this future - God. God is good, all the time. We can have hope for the future because we trust that God can work all things for the good of those who love him. Not everything that happens is good, but God can work all things to the good. It befits us to ask in this new season not 'what will happen' but 'what is God doing? How is God working?' and 'How can we keep in step with the movement of the Spirit?' For the Queen, faith was a constant in unstable times. And while we can look back with a balmy eye over her reign, she endured many challenges and trials. Through it all, she was a model of uncomplaining grace. If we have learnt one lesson from her life, it must be the power of an enduring relationship with Jesus Christ.

Constant

It was expected sometime, but what a shock now that it has happened. Queen Elizabeth II has died at the grand age of 96 years old, in Balmoral in Scotland. Many people have spoken about unexpected emotions arising, feeling a real sadness at the Queen's death, an unexplained sense that something is missing now. For many that missing something, or more someone, was unexpectedly more connected to them than they thought.

For most of us she had always been there, if somewhat in the background of our lives. She was on the coins and banknotes we carried with us and spent and she accompanied the letters that we sent. Comments since the Queen died on Thursday 8th September, have touched on the idea of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, and even the world not being the same without her. She was a motherly figurehead who spoke with thoughtful and considered words of wisdom and comfort at Christmas time and stepped forward to reassure at times of national need, pointing her listeners to her God.

Across the nation people gathered at various points of pilgrimage and mourning to sympathise and to connect and be part of the story. It is hard to think that, in all likelihood, "God save the Queen" will not be sung in our lifetime again. Today, although only a couple of words have changed, there is a new song, a new anthem, to a new monarch, to a king. But it'll take a bit of getting used to.

We could speak at length about all that she did and all that she meant to the people of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and the Commonwealth of nations, but one word that arguably has been used most since her death to describe the Queen – has been constant. She has been a constant. In a world that chases after change, isn't it interesting that

the main aspect of the queen's reign that was pointed out was its constancy? That she was a constant. That she had for so many always been there! Is it just possible that these comments and the death of Queen Elizabeth highlight a deeper need that people have, not for the new and fast paced, or the latest trending ideas or for new for the sake of being new, but also for something that lasts, that is enduring, that is solid and dependable. Is our nation recognising (subtly and subconsciously) that tradition, that constancy and consistency, that endurance and faithfulness and reliability are good things and in fact things that bring us security, a firm social foundation, things that let us know where we are and that unite us? But if the Queen was a constant for others, who was a constant for the Queen? Queen Elizabeth is quoted to have said, "Faith, family and friendship have been not only a constant for me but a source of personal comfort and reassurance." The Queen may have been a constant for so many across the United Kinadom but her faith in God alongside her family and friendships had been her constant. Maybe we recognise something of the goodness of God in the Queen's long reign that was prayed for every time the national anthem was sung; and maybe the constancy that we notice and value in her long life was due to where the Queen, herself found her constancy. Psalm 61 tells us this, "When my heart is overwhelmed; lead me to the rock that is higher than I." The Queen seemed to have discovered that even with all of her authority and power and wealth there was yet another who was higher than her. There was someone who would always be there for her, someone who would not



be fleeting or temporal but someone who was steadfast and dependable and even more constant than she was. Perhaps her constancy was because of His constancy and that she had anchored herself in Him. As we reflect upon the death of Queen Elizabeth II, may we recognise in her wealth of good attributes, and especially in the fact that for many she had always been there, that there is another to whom the Queen fixed her gaze, whom she depended upon, and to whom she pointed her nation, the Lord Jesus Christ. her Saviour, the One and Only Saviour of the world. As mourning continues, let us remember a life well lived and a life that had been given over to Jesus: a life that pointed others to that same Jesus and a life that has now been called home. She has run the race, kept the faith, proclaimed Christ crucified, and now has entered into the light and health and fulness of His glory.



A committee meeting is to be arranged soon.


Parent and Toddlers Group

Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II

On Sunday 11th September, we had a Service of Remembrance and Thanksgiving for the life of Queen Elizabeth II. Reverend Abraham Storey said that the death of Queen stirred many deep emotions across these islands and around the world. For most of us, this is an end of an era. As the world's longest Head of State, the Queen's mere presence brought a sense of stability and her absence in our culture will leave a gap for quite some time to come. Annual highlights that many look forward to seeing the Queen in attendance or taking part are now a thing of the past (Queen's Christmas Speech, Maundy Thursday ceremony and attendance at the Royal Variety show etc). Adjustments, that most of us will never have seen in our lifetime, will be made - her image on the coin, the change to the national anthem and even our own Book of Common Prayer. However, we are not to forget in all of this that it is not just us as a nation that has lost a beloved Queen but that the Royal Family have lost a member of their family - their mother, grandmother and great grandmother. As we would pray for the comfort of all those who mourn, it is only right that we also offer prayers for the Queen's family.

Rev Abraham's sermon was on the parable of the lost sheep and that those that have left the safe-ty of the flock are no longer in fellowship, well cared for or protected by the shepherd but frightened, lonely and vulnerable, with the recent pandemic adding to this problem. The Pharisees and Teachers of the law couldn't understand why Jesus would

want to spend his time with sinners, outcasts and tax collectors. Quite simply, it is because he loved them. He had come to serve everyone and we are also to serve and to love others through our thoughts, prayers, words and actions. Queen Elizabeth said in 2013 that 'The Christmas message shows us that this love is for everyone. There is no one beyond its reach." We are to be most concerned for those who are not in the 'flock' and have a heartfelt restlessness for them to know the Lord Jesus Christ (St Augustine said 'You made us for yourself and our hearts are restless until they rest with you').

What a difference a day makes!

As I write these notes our new King is arriving at Hillsborough Castle with the Queen Consort on his first trip to Northern Ireland as our sovereign. These are deep and unsettling times as we prepare to bid farewell to our late Queen Elizabeth II. The news of her passing came as a great shock to us all on the evening of Thursday 8th September 2022. And the advancement of media and communications has allowed us to watch almost every moment of our late Queen's journey from her death at Balmoral estate, down to Edinburgh, and then on to London. This carefully choreographed procession continues to be undertaken with skill, precision and expertise, allowing us as a nation to conduct a period of mourning, and indeed a funeral itself, that is fitting for a monarch that has been so faithful, both to country and to God. As a national family we mourn her loss deeply, but as the family of God we give thanks for her life, her dedication to duty and her devotion to God, as we prepare to hand her back to Him. Although we grieve with the nation, we should also rejoice that this faithful servant has completed her call and her journey as she returns home to God. And as we prepare to bid farewell



to her, we should do so with a willing and a thankful heart which sees the blessing that God has given us in our late Queen, but which also sees our duty to now return her to Him. In this season of change, as we welcome a new Prime Minister, and a new monarch, we should continue to give thanks for their desire to serve so willingly and so actively. King Charles III, amongst his many other titles, now also becomes the head of the Church of England and the Defender of the Faith. We must uphold him in constant prayer as he embraces these roles and commits to serve with the same vigour as his late mother.

As the family of God, we opened the Church for a period of quiet reflection and prayer on the evening following the death of our late Queen. On Sunday 18th September 2022, on the eve of our late sovereign's funeral, we will hold a service of Thanksgiving in both Churches. As we continue through this period of mourning, as we look ahead to the funeral of our late Queen in just under a week's time, and as we look beyond that day, we, the Rector, Select Vestries and parishioners of the grouped parishes of Maguiresbridge and Derrybrusk extend to his Majesty King Charles III, and all members of the Royal family, our sincere sympathy on the death

of her late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. God save the King.




As you read these notes we are in the midst of having held or looking forward to these important thanksgiving services.

Our Harvest Services teach us some

Our Harvest Services teach us some important lessons.

1. Give thanks to God who provides us with all our material needs James 1 v 17 "Every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of Heavenly lights, who does not change like shifting shadows." 2. Give thanks to God who gave us strength to do our work especially on the land. Deuteronomy 8 v 10 'When you have eaten and are satisfied, praise the Lord your God for the good land the Lord has given you. Be careful not to forget the Lord your God.... You may say to yourself "My power and the strength of my hands have produced this wealth for me. But remember the Lord your God, for it is he who gives you the ability to produce wealth".

3. Remember there will be a spiritual harvest one day. Jesus taught this in a many of the parables about the Kingdom of heaven. See the parables of the weeds in Matthew 13 v 24-30 and 13 v 36-43. The weeds separated from the good seed. The weeds those who reject the call and claims of Christ in their lives. The good seeds are those who have responded to Christ's call to come and



follow Him and live a fruitful life for Him. Matthew 13 v 41-43 'The Son of man will send out his angels and will weed out of his Kingdom everything that causes sin and all who do evil. They will weed out of his kingdom everything that causes sin and all who do evil. They will throw them into the fiery furnace, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth. Then the righteous will shine in the Kingdom of their Father. He who has ears to hear, let them hear". The challenge of the Harvest message is this, who or what do we depend upon for our daily lives? Clogher Cathedral hosts first of two Services of Enthronement

The first of two Services of Enthronement of the Bishop of Clogher, the Right Revd Dr. Ian Ellis, took place in St. Macartan's Cathedral, Clogher, on Thursday, 8th September.

Many of the members of the congregation who had gathered for the service learned of the death of Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II while waiting for the service to begin. Special prayers were read by Dean Kenneth Hall and by Bishop Ian Ellis and the National Anthem was played by organist, Mr. Glenn Moore.

The procession of churchwardens, parish readers, diocesan readers, ecumenical guests, visiting Church of Ireland clergy, clergy of Clogher Diocese, the Chapter of both cathedrals Diocesan Registrar, the Dean's Verger and the Dean of Clogher made their way up the aisle to the singing of "Praise to the Lord, the Almighty, the King of creation!"

Then, following the opening greeting and the Reading of the Mandate by the Dean, the ceremonial entrance of Bishop Ellis began. He arrived at the West Door to find it closed and struck the door three times with his pastoral staff to which the Dean

replied, "Let the doors be opened! Right Reverend Father in God, we have looked forward to your coming with great joy. In the name of the Lord we greet you and welcome you into your Cathedral Church."

The Dean's Verger, Mr. Andy McCabe led the procession of the Dean; Diocesan Registrar, the Revd John McClenaghan; Diocesan Chancellor, the Right Hon. Lord Stephens of Creevyloughgare and the Bishop of Clogher and his Chaplain, Revd Chris West.

The collect for St. Macartan's Day was read and followed by the Act of Enthronement.

Bishop Ian welcomed to diocese in second service of enthronement

The second Enthronement Service of Bishop Ian Ellis took place in St. Macartin's Cathedral, Enniskillen on Sunday, 25th September, postponed from the earlier date of 11th September due to the death of HM Queen Elizabeth.

The hymns included; "Praise to the Lord, the Almighty, the Kind of Creation, "The Lord's my Shepherd," "My Jesus, my Saviour," "Lord, enthroned in heavenly splendour," "Be still, for the presence of the Lord," "I am not worthy, holy Lord," "Be known to us in breaking bread" and "Be thou my vision." The organist was Mr. Glenn Moore.

The lessons were read by Monsignor Peter O'Reilly, Mr. Mark Ellis and Revd Chancellor Ian Berry. The Bishop was the preacher.

Prayers were led by Mr Sam Morrow, Hon. Secretary of St. Macartin's Cathedral; Mrs Ethne McCord, Hon. Secretary of Tyholland and Errigal Truagh Union of Parishes; Mrs Julie Crawford, Principal, Clontibret National School and Miss Elizabeth Armstrong, Principal, Enniskillen Royal Grammar School. service included the celebration of Holy Communion.

In his sermon, Bishop Ian thanked everyone for arranging the services and said;

"I would like to focus our thoughts on the Gospel passage and those parables on lostness—the lost sheep, the lost coin, and the lost son.

"I wonder have you ever lost something valuable and understand that sense of loss – I once lost my wedding ring on beach in France! I searched all afternoon turning over the sand where we had sat and came back the next day thinking the tide might have uncovered it – daft idea

as that was! I even asked a guy with a metal detector to scan the area - but to no avail – no happy ending – I had to buy a new one when I got home.


"These parables are good news for those who have lost something or someone important. Firstly the parable of the lost sheep and the seeking and caring shepherd emphasises the joy of God, who rejoices more over one sinner who repents than over 99 respectable people who have not committed any gross sin. The parable at another level is also an insight into the ministry of Jesus – bringing the joy of God as his promised shepherd, God's new David, doing the work of God – God intervening to restore his lost sheep.

"It's an image very apt as we think tonight on the role of the bishop in a diocese – and I have been given the great honour of being your bishop. The crozier we carry is not so much a symbol of authority but of pastoral care – it speaks of the caring and leadership role of the bishop as the chief shepherd and a symbol of unity for the diocese to gather around.

"Sheep tend to get lost I am told because of their silliness or their inquisitiveness – they nudge their way through a gap in a hedge, move off and get separated from the flock. The shepherd in the parable notices the missing sheep and leaves the flock and scours the hills for the wayward one. When he finds it, he carries it on his shoulders back to the flock.

"As we in churches move on from the pandemic when so many people have had their lives changed or disrupted at so many levels, it is not surprising that some may have lost their way – their mental health affected – lost within themselves, or their employment lost, or their relationships altered.

"In recent weeks our church leaders have called for action from our governments to address the financial losses many are going to face over this winter with

crippling costs of living. It looks like the new UK Prime Minister is going to do something to address these fears. There is a real sense of impending crisis in the minds of the vulnerable and needy families across these islands with many families feeling they have lost control of their lives.

"I think there is another form of lostness right across churches – many parishioners have just lost the patterns of life they previously had. A good many lost their regular connection with the church. "Our role as clergy and laity is just as it ever was - modelling the good shepherd, seeking, and helping those who have lost their way to find meaning, purpose, hope and restored relationships with others and perhaps with God himself. And we now must help those who have lost connection find reconnection with our churches. The challenge for us is to find ways of doing this effectively and appropriately. "But here is where we are and where we

must begin to move forward.


"This evening, I dramatically knocked the cathedral door seeking admission - that action symbolises the knock of those who are asking what the church has to offer, who seek answers to timeless questions, who yearn for hope in a seeminaly hopeless world, who feel lost in the unexpected twists and turns of the journey of life. Our task is to have the doors of our churches open with welcome and to be actively seeking and drawing in those who want to find their way back to God. Otherwise, they will decide the church is irrelevant and walk away. "Some of this opening of doors will happen naturally. Our greatest strength in the C of I is our pastoral care. Clergy can and must now begin to pick up their patterns of visiting again and begin to restore our full pastoral and sacramental ministry. Rebuilding our church life with adult, youth and children's work and restarting in a lively way is however a work for the whole people of God not just the clergy.



"We are very fortunate to have historic links with local schools, more than ever we need to strengthen our engagement, to show that the church highly values education, pastoral care and takes seriously its role in community life. Principals, teachers, governors, and parents need our support and our prayers. The English word 'education' comes from the Latin educare – 'to lead out'. It's about leading out the talents of young people and leading the community forward in its development and growth. Education in any society is critical to its well-being. We will help our parishes and school communities move forward as we engage with our local schools - it is good to be reminded about that tonight as some principals of schools in the diocese take part in our intercessions.

"The second image Jesus uses is moved from working outdoors to indoors – he speaks of a woman who has lost one of ten silver coins – biblical scholars tell us to think perhaps of a string of coins on a

necklace or headband given at a special time. Jesus describes her strenuous efforts to find her missing coin. The focus of the parable is on the great efforts of the woman to find her valued item. It is about recovering a loss.

"I think it challenges us also, those who are called to care for others who get lost in life either through bad choices or through circumstances beyond their control. Have we the caring eye to look carefully and the committed heart to spend time to help those who may lose their way or whose strength of faith is weakened? There are many who will need pastoral support or our healing ministry and the caring friendship of parishioners. As parishes we must engage with wider society and bring practical help where we can whether that is through a food bank or meals for the elderly or befriending services or whatever outreach we can offer.

"During the Lambeth Conference this summer we heard a remarkable address

by the Archbishop of York, Stephen Cottrell – who spoke about mission and evangelism. He urged us to think about our core mission. He made the striking point that 'the core business of the church is to make disciples, just as the core business of McDonalds is to make burgers!' He went on to say that 'disciples make disciples by sharing the good news'. The word Evangelism has within it the word 'angel' – 'you and I are to be angels' he said, 'sharing with the world what God has done in Christ'.

"We must become those angels whose vision is to make disciples – we need to recover a sense of our core business, not to maintain an institution, but to make and nurture disciples. And that will take reaching out with care and imagination. We begin with the disciples we have and think beyond to those who are on the fringe of church life and reach out in engaging ways to draw new people to find or rediscover faith.

"The final parable is so well known — the story of the lost son. There can be no more powerful picture of the forgiving love of God. It is a wonderfully constructed story - an argument, against the pharisees, but it is an argument, with the gentleness of love. The story has deep psychological insights into human nature and the hope of restoration.

"The wayward son who yearns for more excitement and spending power, takes his inheritance in advance of his father's death, moves off to a life of hedonism till his capital resources run out. His fairweather friends soon desert him, and he is reduced to a low point of existence like a farmyard animal. He realises his error, humbly sets off for home and discovers his father looking and waiting and forgiving. But his brother stews in anger and judgement and is helped to realise that a lost son, his brother had

been brought back to life and the family restored and that joy was the appropriate response.

"It has been said that it is really the tale of two lost sons for the elder brother was wrong too. We can be like the wayward son - going off on a selfish lifestyle, or we can be, like the elder brother in our meanspiritedness and full of judgment. Yet we are called to be like the forgiving and loving father - who was ready and waiting to forgive even before the son had made it home and could offer his sorrowful repentance. We echo that thought in our HC liturgy - When we were still far off, you met us in your son and brought us home. "The picture of the forgiving Father is so different from the picture people often have of distant and formidable God – he is a God who values people, delights in them, is interested in every detail of their lives, has a way through their sins and difficulties and has a calling for them. "This is the forgiving, loving God we are called to proclaim and display to those who are seeking him. The cross was the revealing of the love of the forgiving God a servant come to give his life as a ransom for many. — 'opened wide his arms for us on the cross'.

"The honour you have bestowed on me with tonight is a seat – a cathedra or a throne to sit in this Cathedral. That also is a symbol of our church's mission – to reach out and help people discover their place in the family of God – a seat

in his church in which to worship, to pray, to learn, to be challenged, to find forgiveness and healing, to grow and to know God's presence. That is the call of God to us as disciples to make that possible for others by sharing the good news of Christ Jesus.

"As a diocese tonight we are called to continue that mission of seeking and caring for whoever may be lost and welcoming them back into the family of God

"It has always been so in the mission of God – but it is even more important in these times to remake those lost connections and to reach out in ways



appropriate to each parish context, to tell of the wonderful seeking shepherd, to restore our own sheep and reach out to others sharing the good news of God in Christ.

"May we rediscover within our diocesan life, our parish ministry and inmost being, the loving care of the shepherd, the determined eye of the searching woman and the forgiving heart of the father. As we move out into God's future, may we learn to model the good shepherd and refocus on the core business of his church – helping the lost to find him and reaching out to make disciples."





QUEEN ELIZABETH 'TOUCHED HEARTS AND MINDS'

A Service of Prayer and Reflection following the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth took place in Enniskillen on Sunday evening, 18th September The service began in St. Macartin's Cathedral and continued in St. Michael's Church across the road as the clergy and congregation walked in the footsteps of Her Majesty during her historic visit to the town in June 2022.

Taking part were Dean Kenneth Hall and Monsignor Peter O'Reilly as well as Revd Lorna Dreaning from Enniskillen Methodist Church and the Revd David Cupples, from Enniskillen Presbyterian Church as well as the Bishop of Clogher, the Right Revd Dr. Ian Ellis who gave the sermon (See Bishop's Note on Pages 4-5).

In a foreward to the service, Bishop Ellis said; "It is with profound sadness that we have learned of the passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. On behalf of the clergy and people of the Diocese of Clogher I offer our sincere condolences to the members of the Royal Family in

"Her visits are dearly held in our memories; most notable was the remarkable visit to St Macartin's Cathedral, Enniskillen, in 2012, for a service to mark the 60th anniversary of her reign. On that occasion she reached out to members of the Catholic community and walked across Church Street to meet members of St Michael's Roman Catholic Church.

"Queen Elizabeth has led the way in promoting neighbourliness and breaking down barriers to friendship and working together.

Dean Hall and Monsignor O'Reilly said; "With the announcement of the death



During the Platinum Jubilee of her life as Queen, her regnal qualities were widely remarked and acclaimed: service, duty and devotion.

"She did not disguise the roots of these qualities in her Christian faith but gave sterling witness to a practical belief in God, something for which Christian leaders like ourselves are especially grateful in time of changing culture. In Enniskillen, we experienced something of this at first hand. As was also evident in her visit to the other part of this island, she well understood the cause of division and the consequent ongoing need for reconciliation, something which her 'crossing the street' visibly demonstrated. She made a point of speaking about continuing to rise to this challenge when she met us personally in 2012." The hymns "All my hope on God is founded" and "The King of love my shepherd is" were sung in St Macartin's and following the address by Dean Hall, the clergy and congregation walked across the road to St. Michael's church while they sang "Lead me, Lord, lead me in thy righteousness." In St. Michael's Church, further hymns included; "Nearer, my God to thee," and "Be thou my vision, O Lord of my heart." An address was given by Monsignor Peter O'Reilly.

'Queen Elizabeth followed where Jesus led' - Archbishop John McDowell

A Service of Reflection for the life of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II was held in the Cathedral Church of St Anne, Belfast, on Tuesday, 13th September 2022, in the presence of His Majesty King Charles III and the Queen Consort.

The sermon was given by Archbishop John McDowell who told the congregation attending and the many thousands watching the service live on television, that for many there were only two people whose deaths they could never imagine, their own and the Queen's.

He said: "I think that is one of the reasons why the death of Queen Elizabeth was literally felt – felt so keenly by so many people when the news broke on Thursday afternoon. It was as though the nation's collective grief was gathered up in those remarkable words of Christopher Marlowe's: 'If I had wept a sea of tears for her, it would not ease the sorrow I sustain'.

"And if that was how those of us felt who were in many ways part of her adopted family through her coronation oath, how much more profound must that feeling of loss be to those of the Queen's blood family; those who knew her best and loved her most; Your Majesty, our prayers will be with you and your family for a long time to come."

"There were many other words used about the late Queen during her long reign. Faithfulness, care, dutifulness, love, devotion. And all of these could be employed to describe her relationship with Northern Ireland and, I have to say, probably with patience binding them all together. But paying attention especially to what she said most recently, the word which I think will be most associated with Queen Elizabeth and Ireland, north and south, is Reconciliation.

"It's a great New Testament word. It's a great civic word. And it's a hard word.

So hard in the religious sense that it was beyond the power of humanity to achieve, and God Himself had to give it to us as a gift in His Son. And as a disciple of Jesus Christ, Queen Elizabeth followed where Jesus led as women often have in the elusive and unfinished work of reconciliation here in Northern Ireland. For where the Master is, there will the servant be also."

The full text of Archbishop McDowell's sermon is on the Clogher Diocese and Church of Ireland websites.

A number of other people from within Clogher Diocese attended the service in their roles in society.

Archbishop John McDowell was among a group of church leaders from Northern Ireland who attended Queen Elizabeth's funeral service in Westminster Abbey on Monday, 19th September.
