


Two Diocesan Big Sing events are planned for September 2022 and January 2023.

A NOTE FROM THE BISHOP



A Message from the Bishop


Lambeth Conference 2022

The Lambeth Conference took place from the 26th July – 8th August, with 650 bishops from throughout the Anglican Communion gathering in Canterbury. This once in a decade conference brings together bishops from across the globe for prayer and reflection, fellowship, and dialogue on church and world affairs.

It was a great privilege to be present and along with other bishops from the Church of Ireland to meet with bishops and their spouses from the most diverse range of countries, cultures, and languages, invited by the Archbishop of Canterbury to gather under the theme 'God's Church for God's world'. I found it a most exhilarating experience to spend time to listen, study and pray with fellow bishops. It was inspiring and challenging to hear how other Christians are living out their call to discipleship often in the most demanding, impoverished, and hostile situations.

In my Bible study group, was Bishop Rufus from the Southern Sudan, Bishop Steven from the Solomon Islands, Bishop Rose of Dover, and Bishop Andy of New York. Together we studied together the first epistle of St Peter bringing to the discussion experiences from a wide range of contexts. From Sudan we learned how the country is gradually emerging from civil war and we heard how the church is helping displaced people and responding to those who are victims of war crimes. From the Solomon Islands we heard how global warming is causing the sea levels to rise and endanger the very existence of island nations. Bishop Rose, one of the

first British Afro-Caribbean bishops in the Church of England, spoke of engrained racism and how she challenges her diocese to welcome refugees making the precarious Channel crossing. Bishop Andy told us of how his church, one of the richest in the Communion is challenged by complacency and the presence of the poorest neighbourhoods within his diocese.

Two days of the conference were spent on a retreat in the beautiful surroundings of Canterbury Cathedral with talks, discussion, and prayer on some of the key themes under consideration. One of the most memorable aspects was the worship which was led by an amazingly talented music group. We sang familiar hymns and learnt many new songs from across the communion in a variety of styles from Taizé to Gospel alongside traditional worship songs from Africa, Polynesia, and North America.

Each day began early with morning worship, then after breakfast, a Bible exposition, Study groups, then a Plenary session followed by discussion on one of the themed 'Calls' of the conference. Themes of the Lambeth Calls included: Mission and Evangelism, Safe Church, Anglican Identity, Reconciliation, Human Dignity, The Environment and Sustainable Development, Christian Unity, Interfaith Relations, Discipleship, Science and Faith.


One undoubted highlight of the conference for me was the Opening Service in Canterbury Cathedral, with the most amazing procession of robed bishops making their way through the streets of the town to enter the majestic cathedral for a service of sung Eucharist.

Another was the sunny day we spent in London at Lambeth Palace. Here we took part in a prayer walk around the garden and listened to inspiring talks reflecting and taking action on the environment and sustainable development. Archbishop Justin and Caroline Welby were generous hosts as we enjoyed a marvellous lunch served at tables in a marquee in the garden. That day finished with a service of prayer and worship focussed on creation care and the launch of the Communion Forest initiative.

The most demanding times were the discussions and focus on the Lambeth Calls. Each was on one of the key themes of the conference and replaced the resolutions of previous conferences. The draft calls were discussed in detail in groups and were affirmed by the whole conference after the discussion. A further discussion is to follow in some months' time by Zoom.

The Call which received the most press interest was on Human Dignity. Archbishop Welby was concerned to maintain unity within the Communion, so much time was spent listening to the various views and sensitives of this subject. The Call wording acknowledged a disagreement and plurality of views on the relationship between human dignity and sexuality. It affirmed that many provinces (the majority) continue to affirm that same gender marriage is not permissible. It affirmed resolution 1.10 (1998) which states that 'legitimizing or blessing of same sex unions cannot be advised. However other Provinces have welcomed same sex unions after careful reflection and a process of reception. As Bishops we remain committed to listening and walking together to maximum possible degree, despite our deep disagreement on these issues'. This Call received remarkable acceptance and encouraged a reconciliation of a diversity of views.

Two other Calls stood out for me. One was on the theme of Science and Faith – a topic close to my interests. That Call proposed that we address the perception of a rift between science and faith by



committing ourselves to enter into dialogue with science recognising within it God-given resources for the life of faith and to offer the wisdom of faith to its work.


The Call which left a lasting impression was that to Mission and Evangelism. We listened to an inspiring address by The Most Rev Stephen Cottrell, the Archbishop of York. He made the striking point that 'the core business of the church is to make disciples, just as the core business of McDonalds is to make burgers!' He went on to say that 'disciples make disciples by sharing the good news'. The word Evangelism has within it the word 'angel' – 'you and I are to be angels' he said, 'sharing with the world what God has done in Christ'. The conference also heard of inspiring programmes of

intentional discipleship where churches with declining numbers have refocussed their vision, been energised and seen growth.

Heather also joined me at the Conference and took part in the parallel Spouses' programme. We both felt so blessed by our time in Canterbury; we met so many bishops and spouses, made many new friends and contacts and gained amazing insights into the wider Anglican communion. We are so thankful for the wonderful opportunity to attend the Lambeth Conference, and we both look forward to opportunities to further share with the diocese our experiences in being part of this Global Anglican gathering.

Update from Donna Geary

I have just spent my first few nights on land in just over 10 months and can gladly say I didn't get "land sick"! I'm currently having a few days off the ship to relax and refresh. Over the past 10 months I've been going from one role to another with not much down time in between and, despite how much I love it and everything I have been doing, rest is much needed!

This past outreach has been quite different to what we expected - the expectation was to sail out to Western Province to provide



services in rural communities that struggle to reach healthcare facilities. However, the plans changed quite last minute due to some ship technical issues and, instead, we carried out our clinics around Port Moresby and Central Province. Although our plans changed, we have been able to see the fruit of going into these communities; setting up healthcare clinics and also sending out community engagement teams.

Galley life

For the last nine weeks my role has been "Chief Steward" on board the ship. This has entailed overseeing and coordinating the galley and housekeeping on our medical ship. If anyone had told me that I would be spending extended amounts of time in the galley when I first came to the ship, I wouldn't have had much of a heart for it. I'm not a big fan of food and I don't really enjoy cooking. I know that, while in missions, there will be times when I will fill roles that I don't initially have a heart for, but God has shown me that, if I'm faithful in what I am doing, He will give me a heart

for it and bless what I do. I have seen how excited people can be by the food we serve and how a meal can make the ship feel like home. Some of the people I cook for have been on the ship for as long as I have, or longer, and others for less, but they have become family and I now love that I am able to bless them by cooking new meals or creating a new morning tea treat!

Leadership training seminar

I have come to realise through my various roles on board the ship that I rather enjoy leading and this is something I would like to explore more and grow in. At the end of August the Port Moresby campus are running a 5- week long "Leadership Training Seminar" which I am hoping to be a part of. This school is aimed at both emerging leaders and those leaders who need renewal and encouragement in their current leadership role. It will cover many topics around leadership and give me a biblical insight as to what leadership should look like from a Christian perspective. The school has a cost attached to it of just shy

of £350/€400 - if you would like to donate towards the cost of this training, please reach out or have a look at the ways you can donate. Your support in this is much appreciated!

Prayer

We are currently going through a lot of change within the ministry which comes with many decisions to be made. I would appreciate your prayer for wisdom and guidance to the leaders of YWAM medical ships and also for myself as I figure out what God wants next for me within the ministry.

Praise

Despite all the changes to our outreach plans, we were able to adjust and continue to connect with health workers, both in Western Province and here in Central Province, to provide health care and teachings to the people of Papua New Guinea.

Take Some Time And Reflect

On a recent trip to the seaside, I arrived wondering if the tide would be in or out. I can remember very starkly the disappointment once when on arrival at the beach I found not a speck of sand. All was engulfed in the seasonal high tide. This trip was the opposite having to walk nearly to America to reach the shallows

for a paddle. A well-known phrase popped into my mind as I walked out to greet the waves; "Time and tide wait for no man." However, I was wrong in my understanding of this.

When this phrase was coined, tide did not refer to the cycle of the ocean waves but meant a season, or a time, or a while. The

word is still with us in that sense in 'good tidings' or as in Whitsuntide. The earliest known record is from St. Marher, c1225. Written in Middle English it long predates the use of this phrase in Geoffrey Chaucer's Prologue to the Clerk's Tale first published c1395, from which it is best known.

September sees the year move from summer to autumn as we get back into the usual swing of things, many off which we last experienced in June. But it is a gradual shift in season with the transition blurred often with periods of unseasonal warmth and sunny weather, helping us to hang on to the glory days of high summer. Whether you are feeling the angst of back-to-school time, or the prospect of lounging by the pool for a few weeks abroad, free from excitable children, it is important to take some time to reflect on the end of summer. As the season of swimsuits, suntans, and sweet vacations draws to a close, so may your sunny demeanour.

The end of summer can be a let-down full of mixed emotions. After enjoying a boost in mood from the extra vitamin D or some time off from work, the end of summer can trigger feelings of loss. If summertime has brought with it more quality time with friends and family, especially due to the longer days, the drawing in of longer evenings might be bittersweet. As the daylight wanes, so might these memories and the positive feelings associated with them. It can be beneficial to reflect on the feelings that arise as summer transitions into autumn.

We are told that there is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens. (Ecclesiastes 3:1) Just as the seasons never falter, we know with surety that autumn will be fruitful and pleasant, winter will give way to spring and that summer will return next year, however briefly it might be. As the years go by one thing, we can be sure of is that although every passing year hold its challenges, we can take strength for today and bright hope for tomorrow knowing that whatever awaits us we can be sure of God's faithfulness, mercy, and love. Annual Parade Services





Archdale Parish). The Service was led by Ruth Morrow (Methodist), Canon Michael (Roman Catholic) and myself (Church of Ireland). The singing was led by members of the Community Choir accompanied by David McDowell on guitar. It was great to have the new Lady of the Lake, Chloe McKevlin, with us along with her attendants. Thanks as always to Joe Mahon and the Festival Committee for all their hard work and dedication to the community. White Island is an island in Lower Lough Erne, County Fermanagh and is situated in Castle Archdale Bay off the east shore of the Lough. The ruins of an ancient church are found near the shore, built on the site of an earlier monastic settlement. It still has an intact arched Romanesque doorway. Secured to the north side of the south wall are eight carvings, seven figures and one head, built into the masonry of the church. Most of the figures were carved wearing the long tunics of ecclesiastical characters. They are all carved in quartzite and were probably made between 800 and 1000 and were later used as building stones in the church, before being uncovered in recent centuries. It is recorded in the Annals that the Vikings attacked and destroyed the monasteries in Lough Erne in A.D.837. For at least 400 years therefore these carvings may have laid in the ruins before the stone Romanesque style church was built.

Twelfth Morning

The Rector was pleased to be able to offer Prayers with Drumharvey LOL159 this morning before they left for the main Demonstration in Enniskillen, accompanied by Drumharvey Pipe Band. A wreath was laid at the Cross of Sacrifice in the Derryvullen North War Graves area.

Moravian Pentecost

The great Moravian Pentecost of 13th August 1727 ignited a prayer meeting which continued non-stop for more than 100 years, propelling missionaries, aflame with the gospel, to the ends of the earth, and launching the modern missions movement. It is a moment worth celebrating!

It had begun five years earlier when a

bedraggled band of refugees arrived on the country estate of Count Nicolaus von Zinzendorf at Berthelsdorf in Saxony, fleeing for their lives from fierce religious persecution in their homelands of Bohemia and Moravia across the Austrian Alps to the south. Zinzendorf offered them extraordinary hospitality, provoked no doubt by his Mustard Seed vow* to 'be kind to all people'. He permitted the Moravians to settle on his land where they built a village called Herrnhut, 'the Watch of the Lord'.

But the new community was far from idyllic. For five years they had bickered

and argued until this day in 1727 when they gathered in the church and repented before the Lord. Count Zinzendorf himself recorded what happened next: 'The Saviour permitted to come upon us a Spirit of whom we had hitherto not had any experience or knowledge. Hitherto we had been the leaders and helpers. Now the Holy Spirit Himself took full control of everything and everybody.'** (John Greenfield (Original Version, 1928). We had the pleasure of hosting Bishop Masimango (Bishop of Kindu Diocese and

former Archbishop of DRC) and his wife Mama Naomie from 10th – 15th August. They were in Northern Ireland as part of CMS Ireland and SAMS Ireland's 'Kingdom Voices' along with other leaders from the Global Church (Africa, South America and Nepal)—post Lambeth Conference. Bishop Masimango and Mama Naomie are linked with Calry Parish in Sligo, but they couldn't obtain a visa to visit across the border. So during their time with us they got the opportunity to meet a few parishioners from Calry at the Cathedral Offices in Enniskillen as well as meeting Bishop lan.

Mama Naomie shared with some of our MU members from Clogher Diocese on Thursday 11th August about her work with women in tackling illiteracy, poverty and gender-based violence. As a trained Primary School teacher, she was using her skills to teach literacy using stories from the Bible. People were shocked to see a video showing the roads they have to travel on around the diocese of Kindu. When visiting parishes in the jungle, they set off on the back of four motorbikes with the bishop and other diocesan representatives. Since there are no petrol

stations they have to plan their journey at least a week in advance and send jerrycans of fuel with someone to place at various locations along the way in order to refill the motorbikes. When they get to muddy sections along the way they have to get off and walk while the drivers make the way through the mud and water (even in the dry season). Bishop Masimango acted as a translator for his wife as she

was freer speaking in Swahili. Bishop Masimango spoke at our Praise and Ministry Service on Saturday night on Christians being the '5th Gospel' - 'a letter from Christ' for everybody to read (ref. 2 Cor 3:1-3). Then on Sunday morning he challenged everyone to sow to please the Spirit which leads to eternal life rather than sowing in the flesh which lead to destruction (ref. Galatians 6:7-10).

The course is taught in conjunction with Trinity College Dublin.

Vocations Sunday (5th September) will be his final Sunday with us before he commences his studies. We want to take this opportunity to formally wish him well. We look forward to seeing how he grows and develops in his vocation and ministry and continue to uphold him in our prayers.

Back to Church Sunday

On Sunday 25th September at 11.00am, we mark "Back to Church Sunday", which provides an opportunity for those who

used to attend, as well as anyone who does not currently attend, our Sunday services to come back to Church, especially young families. All who come along will receive a warm welcome. The special guest preacher at the service will be the Very Revd Stephen Farrell, who was recently installed as Dean of Ossory and instituted Rector of Kilkenny Union of Parishes. He is from a Tyrone farming background, and his home parish is Holy Trinity Dromore in the Diocese of Clogher. As a special treat, an ice-cream van will provide free ice-cream for all afterwards.

St Patrick's the National Cathedral

The Dean of Clogher, the Very Revd Kenneth Hall was elected to the Chapter of St Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin, in 2021, taking the prebendal stall of Tassagard. In this role, Dean Hall spends two weeks each year 'in residence in Dublin' with the responsibility of preaching and other duties in St Patrick's, the National Cathedral.


Dean Hall was 'in residence in St Patrick's' on Trinity Sunday and the following week. On the afternoon of Trinity Sunday, he had the pleasure of preaching and being part of the commemoration for the 100th anniversary of the disbandment


of the Irish regiments. This service just happened to fall on the same Sunday as Dean Hall was on duty, and there was a very interesting connection as both Dean Kenneth Hall and Monsignor Peter O'Reilly are joint Honorary Chaplains to The Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers and The Royal Inniskilling Dragoon Guards.

In the photograph Dean Hall is holding a

stole, which was presented to him bearing two badges - one from each regiment, and he referred to this during his sermon. The Irish infantry regiments disbanded in 1922, in order of seniority, were: Royal Irish Regiment, the Connaught Rangers, Royal Dublin Fusiliers, Royal Munster Fusiliers, and the Leinster Regiment. Also the South Irish Horse, (cavalry) was disbanded. When five Irish Infantry regiments (including the RDF) were disbanded in 1922, a set of Colours from each regiment was laid up in Windsor Castle, where they can still be seen. The Royal Dublin Fusiliers were created in 1881 by the amalgamation of two regiments which originally were in the army of the East India Company, the Bombay Fusiliers and the Madras Fusiliers.

The Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers created in 1881 by the amalgamation of the 27th Foot (origin 1689) and the 3rd Madras Infantry,









another Indian regiment.

The Royal Inniskilling Dragoon Guards, formed in 1922 by the amalgamation of the 5th Dragoon Guards and the 6th Inniskilling Dragoons.

Cavalry and Infantry did not serve alongside each other, though they may have been in the same campaign. All three (RDF, RIF, and 6th Inniskillings) served in the Boer War 1899-1902, and First World War 1914-18.

The Royal Dublin Fusiliers were in the same Brigade, the Irish Brigade, as the Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers, which means they fought alongside each other in the same campaigns.

PS – the Dean was very appreciative for information received from Mr Richard Bennett regarding the history of the regiments.

The Cathedral Graveyard

The tidying-up of the graveyard and other improvements carried out recently have received much praise. When the ivy, which had been damaging the boundary wall, had been removed it revealed an unsightly section of concrete block walling superimposed on top of the original stone boundary wall.

The block walling was obviously added by the builders of the dwellings in Market Street a long time ago. An expert stone mason has looked at this section of walling and recommends that the concrete blocks should be faced on the graveyard side with natural stone. It is estimated that this work would cost around £8,500 to complete and the Select Vestry has decided that this should be done. A fund is being set up for this and parishioners may wish to contribute towards this very worthwhile project.

Youth and Children's Ministry Sunday Lights and Café

Sunday Lights and Café, at which we use interactive and creative forms of learning to help the children learn about

the Christian faith (telling Bible stories, discussion, songs, games, and crafts), will return in the Sundays following "Back to Church Sunday". Registration forms will be available, and should be completed, following the "Back to Church Sunday" service. From Sunday 2nd October onwards, the children will leave during the 11.00am service after the singing of a family hymn for their own activities and will attend and take part in monthly Family Services. The first Family Service of the new programme (after "Back to Church Sunday") will be held on 23rd October. Sunday Lights is open to anyone in P1-4, and Sunday Café welcomes children in P5-Year 8.

Messy Church

An exciting new programme for Messy Church, which takes "The Five Marks of Mission" as its theme, will be launched next month. Messy Church is open to all children of primary school age and their parents or guardians. Now that we are in a new school year, we are looking forward to meeting new friends! So even if you have never been before, or even if you or your children are not parishioners of the Cathedral, you are very welcome to join us.

Xplore

Xplore is a relaxed group for young people in Years 9-12. We want the young people of St Macartin's Cathedral to know that they are valued and have a safe space to ask questions about life and faith. We ask our young people to keep the evening of Friday 21st October free for our Xplore outing. More details will follow!

Family Fun Morning

A Family Fun Morning, open to all young families, will be held in the Cathedral Hall on Saturday 8th October from 10am-12noon. Please keep the date free and come along for fun and fellowship. Activities for children, as well as

refreshments for parents and guardians, will be available. More details will be announced soon.

Confirmation

A Confirmation Service will be held during Eastertide 2023 for young people of Year 9 and above. Those who expect to be confirmed should regularly attend services with their families, as Confirmation is about taking your place within the life and mission of the Church. Application forms for Confirmation are available in the Parish Office for those who wish to be confirmed. Please collect and return them as soon as possible. Details of Confirmation Classes will be released in due course.

Discipleship

Bishop Rowan Williams says that discipleship is about being "a life-long learner", following the "discipline" or the pattern of Jesus' life. He writes that this pattern involves four essentials: Baptism, Bible, Eucharist, and Prayer. At St Macartin's Cathedral, we take these four essentials seriously; so you will find a number of opportunities to grow in your understanding of them below.

The Pilgrim Course

From the earliest days of the Church, Christians developed short, simple summaries of the faith. These short statements became known as "creeds". Two creeds in particular were developed in the early centuries of the Church, which have remained important to the Church and are regularly used in our worship today: the Apostles' Creed and the Nicene Creed. People who were preparing for Baptism in the early centuries of the Church learned a short summary of what Christians believe. One version became accepted as the Apostles' Creed, because it was thought to include the essential teaching of the 12 apostles, Jesus' earliest followers; and it was into that faith of the apostles that Christians were, and

still are, baptised. Would you like to explore this faith with us? Following on from the popularity of our Lenten booklets of daily reflections, we are holding a Pilgrim Course that explores the Christian faith in greater depth through these creeds. The course will be inclusive and open to all, whether you are exploring the Christian faith for the first time or simply want to grow in your understanding of what you believe. Sessions will be held in the Cathedral Hall on the second and fourth Tuesdays of the month, with the first two sessions being held on 13th and 27th September at 7.30pm. A warm welcome awaits you, and refreshments will be served at each session. We look forward to journeying with you.

The Enthronement of the Bishop of Clogher

The Enthronement of our Bishop, the Rt Revd Dr Ian Ellis, will take place in the Cathedral on Sunday 11th September at 7pm. When Bishop Ian knocks at the West Door and waits for entry during the service, we will act out the fact that he recognises the Cathedral has a life and ministry of its own and yet is also his Church. The service marks the beginning of Bishop Ian's public ministry in the Diocese in a special way, even though he has been our Bishop for some time already. It is a service of celebration and welcome.

Enthronement is at the heart of what happens during the service, as Bishop lan will sit in the seat (the Cathedra) that is reserved for our Bishop. The Bishop's seat resembles a throne, and is there to call us into unity and to invite us to gather around that chair from which the Bishop spreads the Gospel. Now, and in the months and years to come, we hold Bishop lan in our prayers.

Diocesan Big Sing

A Diocesan Big Sing will be held on Sunday 25th September 2022 at 7.00pm in Enniskillen Cathedral. We look forward to hearing musical contributions from parishes across the diocese at the event. All are welcome to attend!

Harvest Thanksgiving Services

Our annual Harvest Thanksgiving, in which we give thanks to God for his generous provision, will be held on Sunday 9th October at the usual time of 11.00am. The special guest preacher at this service will be the Right Revd Patrick Rooke who recently retired as the Bishop of Tuam, Killala, and Achonry in the West


New donations from Knit, Pray, Love

The Ministry of Reconciliation

At the heart of Christian teaching stands the knowledge that all people may be made right with God and may share in his friendship when they turn to him in faith. It is a personal choice for each of us to

make. That by the life of Jesus, God has come to know profoundly and completely what it means to be human; and that by Jesus' suffering, God has shared in all human suffering. The hope of the Christian faith is that by the gift of Jesus' own life on the cross, we may be gifted life forever in God's presence through the

power of his resurrection.

That faith is lived out by modelling in our lives and leadership on the reconciling love of God. In an address to the General Synod of the Church of England, whose Supreme Governor she is, The Queen said: 'All Christians, as ambassadors for Christ, are entrusted with the ministry

of reconciliation. Spreading God's word and the onerous but rewarding task of peace-making and conflict resolution are important parts of that ministry' (General Synod Opening Address, 2015). During her 70 years of leadership, The Queen has been an outstanding ambassador of the ministry of spreading God's word and growing the seeds of his reconciling love by working for peace in the world. The Queen knows: 'to bow to the past, but not to be bound by it', is how she expresses it (Dublin Castle, 2011).

The Queen, in her 1975 Christmas message said; 'His [Jesus's] simple message of love has been turning the world upside down ever since. He showed that what people are and what they do, does matter and does make all the difference.... It does matter therefore what each individual does each day. Kindness, sympathy, resolution and courteous behaviour are infectious. Acts of courage and self-sacrifice ... are an inspiration to others. And the combined effect can be enormous.... We may feel powerless alone but the joining efforts of individuals can defeat the evils of our time. Together they can create a stable, free and considerate society.' (p.49 in The Servant Queen, by Mark Greene and Catherine Butcher).

The Queen was given a sword at her coronation. This sword, given to the new queen, at her coronation actually had a broken tip. It was broken on purpose, to remind her of something. Why do you think the tip is broken? A broken sword might remind the Queen of...what? This sword with its broken tip symbolises mercy. In fact, it has a special name: Curtana, The Sword of Mercy. The broken tip reminds the Queen that she must not be cruel but be merciful. She must find ways to bring peace not hardship in her judgements. Just like the prophet Micah said, 'What does God require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God.'

Words of encouragement for this ministry from Paul: 'Finally, beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honourable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. Keep on doing the things that you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, and the God of peace will be with you' (Phil 4.8-9). The Queen has been an outstanding ambassador of the ministry of spreading

God's word and growing the seeds of his reconciling love by working for peace in the world. God bless, our Sovereign Lady, Queen Elizabeth and may we follow her example as she has followed the example given by Jesus Christ.

From Rev. Rebecca:

Notes from the Rectory:


There's a thing in the world of counselling called 'unconditional positive regard'. It means that, when a client's

sharing, you try to assume the best of them, rather than the worst. It's a thing which, it seems to me, is lacking in the world today. Behind every headline, every bit of gossip, is a person. And 'unconditional positive regard' tries to see that person beyond their actions. It asks 'what if'. 'What if N is just trying their best to get along in a mad world?' 'What if N genuinely went into politics to bring about positive change, and is trying their best to do so, however misguided?' And so on...

Looking at the coverage of the Lambeth conference, it seems to me that 'unconditional positive regard' could be applied more liberally to the episcopate. Here is a collection of men and women who do an incredibly difficult job, under immense pressure. Right now, on both sides, they are trying to keep the church united while being faithful to their understanding of the Gospel. That is a noble thing. We may not agree with some of their viewpoints but we can respect their sacrificial commitment to their calling, a calling which often takes them away from family and home, and which affords them constant criticism from those they live to serve.

When I say 'I don't care' what your view

on human sexuality is, I don't really mean I don't care. I care that you have studied the Scriptures and prayed to God to give you understanding on this issue. I care that you have respectfully sought to deepen your understanding through conversation with other Christians and non-Christians. Where that has led you I leave in the hands of God.

But I do care, deeply, how we treat people. Backbiting, derision, might be common in the modern media but it has no place in the church. We will all stand before a Judge one day, but until that day arrives, not a single one of us is qualified to judge and condemn, to cast stones. You don't know the full picture. You haven't walked in that person's shoes. And until the day you and I know fully, as we are fully known, let's all try for a bit of unconditional positive regard. Teddy Bear's Picnic



Running the race

Over the summer the World Championships, the Commonwealth Games followed by the European Championships took us through the highs and lows of athletes of many different sports. My interest is in the track events, something that I had a personal association with in a previous life. The thing about running is that you don't want to be carrying anything more than you need to. The ancient Greeks, when competing, perhaps took that to the ultimate conclusion when they would step out to compete in their "birthday suit". But it was to the end that absolutely nothing would disadvantage them in their competition. This ideal differs somewhat from how most of us are happy to live our Christian lives. The Apostle Paul in Hebrews encourages



his readers to "lay aside every weight, and the sin which so easily ensnares us, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us," Hebrews 12:1. Paul tells us that we are easily ensnared by sin and that this has a direct influence upon our performance, in the race. How much time have we ever given to a process of un-ensnaring ourselves from sin? The pursuit can often rather be to see how far we can be ensnared and still be able to run. We can find ourselves redefining the rules of the race, dictating to the authorities why we had the right to step over our line into another's lane and not be disqualified. May we not forget that sin is that which is offensive to God, that keeps Him at a distance, that hurts us and our reputations, and causes hurt to others. Sin separates, is against the created order of the Creator and welcomes in darkness as it pushes away the light. Although not the beginning of the Church calendar year, September sees organisations and programmes and meetings and projects and ventures start again after a summer's break. How will we run the race that we could imagine as that stage between September and June? And how important could it be to consider running that race un-ensnared, free, and

instead of trying to see what we can get away with and still be in the game, to be wholehearted in our devotion to God, in our rejection of all that is not truly His will in His kingdom and be in it to win it? Let us pray for and welcome the convicting presence of the Holy Spirit to lead us into all truth and away from all sin and be courageous, not double-minded in our obedience to His lifegiving guidance — that we may indeed run with endurance the race that is set before us.

Orange Service


It was a joy to welcome to Morning

Taking the limits off of God

How often do we limit God?

Shocked in a GOOD way as I recalled a number of major and significant, indeed miraculous things that have happened in and through my life.

In a way it was like it dawned on me for the first time, that when I chose to believe and trust God for something that was "beyond" me, He started to BLESS me and other people in ways that I just couldn't do by myself.

It was like God "took the limits off" and things started to happen because I trusted Him.

So what about you?

Do have a similar experience?
Or is there something you could do right now?

Which "stretches" your faith?

You see God wants us to believe and He wants GOOD things to happen in our lives, but He wants the GLORY, the credit for the good things that happen and is not willing to share that with us or anyone else.

Whenever we can say: "I did such and such..."

God is probably NOT involved.

In the case of the Children of Israel, according to Psalm 78.

They limited God and wandered around in the desert for 40 years.

Entering the Promised Land took FAITH. Where do you find yourself? In the desert...?

Or in the Promised Land...?

level education. For Churches hopefully there will be the re-opening of activities which have closed for most of two years due to covid 19. Our Lord set the example, as we read in the gospels that it was his custom to attend the synagogue on the sabbath. The writer of the Hebrews urges us "Let us not give up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but let us encourage one another and all the more as you see the Day approaching" (10 v 25) Coming together in church on Sunday is a command of scripture from the time of the Ten Commandments, Remember to keep Holy the Sabbath Day. 





Everyone welcome to Enthronement Services


The Bishop of Clogher, the Right Revd Dr Ian Ellis has at least two important dates in his diary for September; his two Enthronement Services in both St. Macartan's Cathedral, Clogher on Thursday, 8th September and in St Macartin's Cathedral, Enniskillen on Sunday, 11th September.

A delay in arranging the services was as a result of the Covid restrictions in place.

Dean Kenneth Hall explains that when Bishop Ian knocks at the West Door and waits for entry at the beginning of the services, the congregation will act out the fact that he recognises the Cathedral has a life and ministry of its own and yet is also his Church.

The service marks the beginning of Bishop lan's public ministry in the Diocese in a special way, even though he has been our Bishop for some time already. It is a service of celebration and welcome.

Enthronement is at the heart of what



happens during the service, as Bishop lan will sit in the seat (the Cathedra) that is reserved for our Bishop.

The Bishop's seat resembles a throne, and is there to call us into unity and to invite us to gather around that chair from which the Bishop spreads the Gospel. Now, and in the months and years to come, we hold Bishop lan in our prayers.

The Dean and Cathedral Chapter of the Diocese of Clogher extend a warm welcome to parishioners and friends across the diocese to be present at one of both of the Services of Enthronement.

The service in Clogher will be a Service of Evening Prayer on the Feast of the Birth of the Blessed Virgin Mary and in Enniskillen Cathedral, the service will be a celebration of Holy Communion on the Thirteenth Sunday after Trinity.

Bishop Ellis will be the preacher at both services.



CHURCH OF IRELAND NEWS

Close links between church and education

Education is an important subject within the Church of Ireland and recently two key people involved; Dr. Peter Hamill, Secretary to the Church of Ireland's Board of Education in Northern Ireland and Dr. Ken Fennelly, Secretary to the Church's Board of Education and Education Officer in the Republic of Ireland briefed Diocesan Communication Officers on the sector in the two different jurisdictions.

In Northern Ireland, many of the controlled schools evident today were originally church schools under the management of the Church of Ireland, Presbyterian Church and Methodist Church whose control was transferred in the 1930's and 1940's in return for assurances that a Christian ethos would continue through collective worship or school assemblies as well as the teaching of non-denomination religious education and having representation of the churches on boards of governors. Now more than 1500 school governors are nominated by the three churches which work through the Transferor Representatives' Council to promote educational matters. The controlled sector is the largest education sector in Northern Ireland accounting for almost half of all schools and they are open to all faiths and none.

Dr. Hamill said that as followers of Christ, they seek to pursue a vision of education in which every child will get the best and to enable him/her to fulfil their potential.

In the Republic of Ireland there are more than 172 Church of Ireland schools operating where boards will be made up of teachers, parents and usually the bishop in the diocese acting as patron or chair.

Dr. Fennelly is responsible for advising Church of Ireland school principals, boards of management and patrons as well as being responsible for building

relationships with the education partners and maintaining the profile of the Church of Ireland in educational circles along with overseeing the Church's Safeguarding Trust procedures.

One of the issues ahead will be how the sector will be affected by the Citizen's Assembly on the Future of Education in the Republic of Ireland.

Transferor representative meet Education Minister

Church of Ireland, Presbyterian and Methodist representatives, from the Transferor Representatives' Council, along with the Controlled Schools' Support Council, met with Education Minister Michelle McIlveen MLA at the end of June.

A range of issues across the controlled education sector in Northern Ireland were discussed. The three Churches transferred most of their schools into state control – hence the terms 'transferor' and 'controlled' – in return for assurances regarding the Christian ethos of schools and a continued role in their governance.

The controlled sector is the largest education sector accounting for 49% of all Northern Ireland's schools, including 63 nursery schools, 380 primary schools and 69 post-primary schools. Controlled schools are open to children of all faiths and none, which brings a rich diversity and inclusive ethos reflecting the many different communities which they serve in today's society.

Tributes to former principal of church training college

The Archbishops of Armagh and Dublin have paid warm tributes to the Revd Canon Professor John Bartlett, formerly Principal of the Church of Ireland Theological College between 1989 and 2001, who died on 18th August 2022.

Canon Bartlett was predeceased by his first wife Jan and is survived by their children and his widow, Olivia, and his funeral took place at Christ Church Cathedral, Dublin on 23rd August

The Most Revd John McDowell,

Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland, paying tribute said; "I write with profound regret at the news of the death of Canon John Bartlett, but with an equally heartfelt gratitude for his life, influence and witness. John was a Christian scholar, teacher and intellectual to his fingertips, the scope of whose accomplishments and the depth of whose modesty matched perfectly.

"I had the pleasure (I don't think John would approve of the word "privilege") of studying for Orders under John's



gentle guidance when he was Principal of what was then the Church of Ireland Theological College. It was a difficult time to be in charge of such a place. "Vocations to priestly ministry were not plentiful, and the usual respect felt for senior clergy and scholars was not always evident."

"He was a Catholic scholar of the Anglican obedience, who was content to concede that the Anglican way may not have been the 'best' way of being a Christian, but it was 'our' way, and had its unique contribution to make to the treasury of the Universal Church. He kept copies of the Hebrew Bible and the Greek New Testament, with which to follow the Readings, in his seat in Chapel, and I think he could never quite grasp why so few ordinands learned to read the ancient languages."

The Most Revd Dr Michael Jackson,

Archbishop of Dublin and Primate of Ireland, said; "It is with considerable sadness that members of the United Dioceses of Dublin and Glendalough will have learned of the death of the Revd Canon Professor John Bartlett.

Canon Bartlett was beloved of generations of undergraduate students and staff in Trinity College where he lectured in Old Testament and Inter Testamental Studies. He served the College as a Fellow and the University as a Professor.

"Christ Church Cathedral became his spiritual home in recent years. He served faithfully as Precentor and greatly enjoyed the musical tradition of the cathedral."



New edition of 'A Short History of the Church of Ireland' is published

A new edition of A Short History of the Church of Ireland, by Dr Kenneth Milne, has been published by Messenger Publications. In nine chapters, the book takes readers from the dawn of the Celtic Church when Ireland experienced a Golden Age of scholarship and culture under its influence through the Middle Ages, the Reformation and subsequent centuries, and into the most recent 150 years of the Church's history since Disestablishment in 1871. This is a "sensitive and detailed introduction" which allows the reader the choice to explore the Church's history at their own pace, as noted by Messenger Publications. It will be of interest to members of the Church, and indeed other denominations, and also students studying for state examinations who could find it helpful as they research Ireland's different church denominations.

In the Preface, Dr Milne recalls that the book's first edition appeared in 1966, a year after the conclusion of the Second Vatican Council, which brought about a ground-breaking approach to inter-church relations across the world and also on the island. These relationships were soon "severely



put to the test" by the conflict in Northern Ireland, its roots in the revolutionary period of 1912-22, "with repercussions for the entire island"

He reflects: "The leaders of those churches

have been reflecting a century later on events of the 1920s, and have expressed their wish to work for greater understanding of the differing political perspectives. It is to be hoped that the pages that follow make some contribution to this task." Dr Milne served as Secretary to the General Synod's Board of Education prior to his appointment as Principal of the Church of Ireland College of Education. In his retirement, he chairs the Literature Committee of the Central Communications Board, and is a member of the Commission for Christian Unity and Dialogue and of its European Affairs Working Group. He also been involved in the Irish Council of Churches and the Irish Inter-Church Committee for many years, and a member of the National Council for Curriculum and Assessment (NCCA). Dr Milne has published widely on Irish education and

Charities information evening for Monaghan parishes

Urgent appeal for accommodation for those fleeing Ukraine

Members of the Church of Ireland in the Republic of Ireland are being encouraged to give urgent consideration as to how they can provide accommodation for people fleeing war in Ukraine. This appeal for help is being made further to consultation with the Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth (DCEDIY), which manages short-term accommodation needs, in light of the current shortage of accommodation and the need to sustain the momentum for the long run on behalf of people who have lost everything at home. Anyone who owns or knows of buildings in good or habitable repair for immediate use which could accommodate groups of Ukrainian refugees is asked to contact DCEDIY directly at: ukrainetempaccom@equality.gov.ie Buildings should preferably have communal cooking facilities that can be used by residents so they are not dependent on provided food. People coming from Ukraine are currently being housed in a wide range of properties, including hotels, guesthouses and B&Bs, hostels, self-catering accommodation, former nursing homes, and repurposed buildings.

Each local authority in the Republic has a Community Response Forum which is co-ordinating efforts at the local level. For example, the Forum for Monaghan County Council can be contacted at the email address; communityforum@monaghancoco.ie

All parishes are also encouraged to contact their Community Response Forum to see how they can support people through the next steps in their journey and to help them integrate with the communities in which they find themselves. Each forum will know best about the needs that exist locally which may, for example, include good quality clothing, bicycles, or offers of transport to help people resettling in more remote accommodation to connect with local support hubs or to attend appointments.

The Department has commended and welcomed the initiatives of Church of Ireland parishes and other organisations around the State for all their generosity to date in response to the crisis.

BENEFACT TRUST CONTRIBUTES 1,000,000 EUROS TO CHARITIES HELPING UKRAINIANS SETTLE IN IRELAND

The Church identified a number of projects within its parishes involved in supporting the integration, accommodation and safety needs of Ukrainian evacuees – all of which need vital funding support.



Commission (CASC), Archbishop Michael Jackson, said the warmth of our welcome is very important, especially for children who make up one in three of the people arriving in Ireland from Ukraine. Many children arriving from Ukraine are unaccompanied.

"The Department has asked for our assistance in this urgent matter which comes at a time when our entire country is struggling to find solutions to a housing and accommodation crisis," Archbishop Jackson stated.

The Church Leaders Group representing the Church of Ireland, Roman Catholic Church, Presbyterian Church, Methodist Church and Irish Council for Churches have issued a statement voicing their concerns over the cost of living crisis and the effect on households leaving people with impossible choices to make between heating or eating.

"We are also deeply concerned regarding the government response in both jurisdictions, in meeting immediate needs and also in relation to longer term strategy.

"We want to join our voices with many others, calling for more practical support

to be delivered urgently through direct government initiatives in both jurisdictions and also via grassroots charity and community partnerships. "Followers of Christ have always been called to serve the poor, not just through acts of charity, though these continue every day in ways large and small, but through the pursuit of justice and mercy. It is our shared vocation to witness to Christ and to protect the dignity of those made in God's image, and so we are compelled to speak up in this moment, out of concern and in hope, for the good and flourishing of everyone in our communities."


