



A NOTE FROM THE BISHOP



A Message from the Bishop

ADDRESS GIVEN TO THE ANNUAL SERVICE ORGANISED BY THE FRIENDS OF ST MACARTAN'S CATHEDRAL, CLOGHER ON SUNDAY 26 MARCH 2023

It is a great privilege and a pleasure to be asked to preach at this 64th Annual Service for the Friends of St Macartan's Cathedral. It is good to be associated with a body of supporters of this Cathedral extending beyond its congregation and across denominational boundaries, as you gather for your annual service on this Sunday nearest to St Macartan's Day.

The title of your group is, Friends of Clogher Cathedral and it may seem strange to be friends of a building albeit a beautiful one. However, it speaks of your common desire to support, care and love this historic place of worship and of your belief that together you can help to maintain its witness and role in the community.

I'd like to reflect for a few moments upon one word in your title – **Friends.**

A human friend is someone who is: faithful, wholehearted, at times perhaps honest and challenging, yet a constant support and willing to offer themselves in loving service.

The Bible tells us that 'God is love' and interestingly one medieval writer Aelred of Rievaulx (an abbey in North Yorkshire) translated this as 'God is *friendship*'. Meaning perhaps God is the utmost of friends, he alone embodies the ideals of self-giving love and other qualities of friendship at the deepest and fullest level.

(James 2:23) because his works exemplified his faith, likewise in the New Testament St James in his Epistle envisions the Church as the community of the friends of God called to embrace, imitate, and re-present Christ to others by witnessing the ways of Christ in their everyday lives. Jesus gave us a very simple, but very sharply observed definition of what friendship with him means – 'You are my friends if you do what I command you'. (John 15:14).


St Macartan as you all know, has historically been described as the friend or 'faithful companion' of Patrick. The ancient origin of this diocese and Cathedral church brings us back to the early Celtic church in these islands. It transports us to the missionary movement of those early Christians who through the leadership of those saints like Patrick and Bridget and their friends and followers set up centres of prayer and learning, and from them reached out to the indigenous people, eventually bringing the Gospel to every part of these islands.

In continuing our worship on the same holy sites, we are joining in God's mission and uniting in their friendship too. There is something inspiring and comforting to know that the walls of these ancient churches have echoed the prayers of countless saints, friends in the Lord and we join with them in approaching God in a place hallowed by such prayer.

Prayer has been described by some as a *transforming friendship*.

Our prayers and life of faith are a response to the friendship and love of God. When we pray we allow God to live within us, so that at the deepest level, it is God's Spirit who does the praying in us and through us. We are changed by prayer much more than we ever realise.

Søren Kierkegaard, a nineteenth century Danish Christian philosopher put it like this: 'Prayer does not change God, but it changes him who prays'. We do not pray to inform God, as if he didn't know what was going on in our lives and of what we are thinking or feeling. Instead, we pray 'your will be done', so that in our companionship and friendship with him, as prayerful people we become radically different. Our whole being begins to be shaped by our friendship with God and our life of prayer.



Joining this thought with our sense of belonging to a long line of followers of Jesus Christ brings us to the concept of the communion of saints – which in one understanding is the supportive friendship of saints of old and of today, a mutual society of love of God which helps us to walk in his way.

There was a group of Christians in the history of the church, in the Rhine valley during the 14th century who called themselves 'The Friends of God'. They wanted to discover God's friendship in a closer way than the medieval church encouraged. They tried to revitalize the spiritual life of local communities through letters, visiting people, and what they called 'soul friendships'. They became a very influential informal society and a spiritual force in Europe before the Reformation.

Perhaps today we could learn from this approach of understanding our faith as a friendship with God and with one another. We today need to counteract the atomisation of society which encourages self-interest, individualism, and the denial of community. We who believe we are the friends of God could become his instruments for transformation.

So, as we commemorate once again, St Macartan who died in 506AD, we are caused to reflect as Friends of this Cathedral upon his life and witness. We give thanks for his steadfastness in bringing the ancient faith to Counties Tyrone and Fermanagh. We praise God for the founding of this Cathedral church, giving thanks for the heritage of prayer and worship we have received, and may we seek a greater understanding of what it is to be a 'friend of God'.

Those who attended the service in Castleblayney were delighted to welcome Revd. Margaret Pringle as speaker. Everyone enjoyed a wonderful evening of fellowship and prayer, finished off with a cup of tea and homemade cakes. It was our turn to host the service in Ballybay and parishioners were delighted to welcome a large group of men and women from other churches in the area to Christ Church. Members of local churches assisted with the music, readings and prayers during the service - it was a great joy to be able to worship with our fellow Christians. Refreshments were served for everyone afterwards.

Holy Week and Easter

Holy Week and Easter include some of the most important dates in the Christian calendar during which we follow the story of Jesus' life, how he faced suffering and death, and inspired many to believe and live a new way of life.

On Palm Sunday we recall Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem to crowds and cheers (see Mt 21:1-11, Mk 11:1-11, Lk 19:28-44 and Jn 12:12-19), then on Maundy Thursday we remember Jesus' Last Supper with his disciples (see Mt 26:26-29, Mk 14:22-25, Lk 22:14-30 and 1 Cor 11:23-25), while on Good Friday we remember the events leading up to, and including, Jesus' crucifixion. Services will take place in each of our parish churches on Palm Sunday at the usual times. There will be a celebration of Holy Communion in Christ Church, Ballybay, at 8pm on Maundy Thursday, 6th April. On Good Friday, 7th April, there will be activities for children in Ballybay Parish Hall from 10.30am. – 12pm. These will be followed by a children's service for Good Friday in Christ Church, Ballybay, at 12 noon and all are welcome to attend. There will also be a service in St. Colman's Church, Clontibret, at 8pm. Services on Easter Sunday, 9th April, will take place in each of our parish churches at the usual times. Please try to journey with us through Holy

Weak as we follow Jesus' path to his death on the cross and then celebrate his triumphal resurrection from the dead on Easter Day.

A huge thanks to the parishioners of Carrickmacross, Magheracloone and Ardragh, for giving me such a warm and encouraging welcome to the group of parishes. I am excited at what lies ahead for us in the immediate and longer term. The warmth and positivity of acceptance I have received from the wider community. shows the standing of the Church of Ireland in the area through the lives lived by the parishioners and past rectors. I was aware of some connections with previous parishes, through the Cook and Keegan families, but my attention was caught by the words of Colin Creighton, who has been the pastor of the Baptist church in Carrickmacross for over 10 years. Colin was given the responsibility of giving salutations on behalf of the other denominations, and what happened next caught me completely by surprise. Colin explained that he recognised the name Cruickshank but wondered if it was the same person. When it was mentioned that my son Matthew was here, Colin had no doubt that I was the person he had in mind. Colin went to Friends school in Lisburn with my son Mat and hadn't seen him since, that's about 25 years ago. But Colin went on to explain that he remembers an assembly in the school. He didn't attend the assembly but was walking past when he heard this Scottish voice saying, "If there's no resurrection, there's no point in being a Christian". He shared on the evening of my institution that although he didn't understand the meaning of the words, they stayed with him. During this time, I was an itinerant evangelist and would have spent a lot of time doing school assemblies, including Friends School Lisburn. How strange that

all these years later I find myself serving God in the same town with a young man whose faith journey involved a few words he overheard me say so long ago, and I hadn't a clue the effect it had on him, until now more than 25 years later.

Lent

Over the past few years I have grown more into seeing the season of Lent as a time of preparation. Therefore, we are using the time over Lent to prepare ourselves as individuals and a community for the year that lies ahead. A few years ago, one of the gospel scriptures that was part of the set readings was in Luke 10 where it said this, "after this the Lord appointed seventy others and sent them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he himself intended to go." He said to them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the labourers are few; therefore, ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest." Such was the significance that I can tell you the date, 7th July 2019. If you were to ask me to give a date that a certain reading fell on I couldn't, but this one I can. The reading prompted me to ask if

we had experienced much growth either as individuals, or as a parish. Like many others there was more of a fear of decline rather than an expectation of growth. That being the case, what do you do if you have land that is not producing? Do you accept the fact that the land is not very fertile? Or do you see if anything can be done to improve the fertility of the soil and bring in a crop. I suggested the latter which would involve examining the soil to see if there was anything stunting the growth of the crop? Also was the soil lacking, did it need additives to make it more productive? This is the background to our Lenten services this year. Focusing on what could be removed and added to make us as individuals and a community more fruitful in our living. In biblical times after you have sown a new crop it could take up to three years before you would expect some harvest. By God's help we'll work and see.


St. Tighernach's Day Celebration – 4 April 2023

Ash Wednesday

We began the season of Lent with a Service of Evening Prayer during which, mindful of God's grace, we reflected upon the Ten Commandments and the ways in which we have fallen short, of things we have done and things we have left undone. As part of the penitential rite, we each received ash poured into our hands as a symbol of our mortality, and heard the words "Remember that you are but dust and to dust you shall return" before a sign of the cross was made in the ash which we held in our hands and we heard the words "repent, turn and follow Christ" as we let the ash fall through our hands and wiped them upon them towel. We returned to our seats in silence before hearing the words of the absolution reminding us that Lent is ultimately not about our failings and limitations but about the boundless love and mercy of God who is always calling us away from everything that would keep us from the joy of the fullness of life; turning us away from the despair of dead ends and into the hope of new life and new beginnings.

World Day of Prayer

Mrs Ethne McCord had the serried ranks of the Donagh Community Choir well rehearsed for this year's World Day of Prayer with the choir singing all of the pieces written for this year's reflection on the faith of the women of Taiwan. Women from St Mary's, Glennan, Glennan Presbyterian and St Salvator's, Donagh (Mrs Diane Wright-Kendrick, Ms Alexandra Wright Kendrick, Mrs Eileen Fielding and Mrs Marina Waller) led the prayer Service, reading the various prayers and reflections which drew our attention to the numerous difficulties facing the women and girls of Taiwan and the ominous threat cast over their lives by Chinese territorial claims on their country. Fr Hubert's homily reminded us of how we can support each other through our lives of faith as he shared how the stories contained in this year's WDP service had encouraged and inspired him in both his own personal faith and his public ministry. Our thanks to the women of St Mary's for the tea, and the beautiful floral decorations that had been prepared for this Service.

Lent Reflections

It is a truism to say that we all live such busy lives today; bearing this in mind, and acknowledging that we have not had a tradition of midweek Services during Lent, I recorded a series of daily Lenten Podcasts based upon Henry Martin's book "Alongside: Reflections on Jesus' Struggles and How He Meets Us in Our Struggles" which appear on the parish facebook page each morning. I am a big fan of podcasts as I love being able to listen at the kitchen table, or in the car, or as I am going off to sleep; in short they fit into those moment in our lives when we aren't in the middle of something else. I hope people have found them a help in keeping a Holy Lent this year.

All Age Family Services


Each fourth Sunday of the month, children from our Sunday School help me lead Morning Prayer 3 (you have to buy the most recent blue covered reprint of The Book of Common Prayer to find it, or buy the separate book Morning and Evening Prayer for use on Sundays containing the seasonal variations). The children read the penitential petitions, the versicles introducing the readings, psalm and canticles, the intercessions and the thanksgivings. It has been wonderful to see how they have grown in confidence since we first introduced this Service last summer.

Thank you to the Sunday School children and their teachers for enhancing our All Age Family Service each month. No fourth Sunday would be complete without the contribution of our Junior Choir, our thanks to the children and to Mrs Ethne McCord for their wonderful contribution to our services.

Confirmation Class

We are delighted to have seven children preparing for Confirmation this year. Having agonized in the past (and for six years in tandem with my good friend and clerical neighbour in my previous parish, Archdeacon Stevenson) over how best to prepare our young people for confirmation: how long should the course be, what do they need to know, what can we risk leaving out, should there be homework, what course should we use, how much of it.... This year I decided to be entirely honest with myself and accept that the perfect Confirmation Course does not exist and that I am the last person likely to be able to deliver one. So, concluding that determining what candidates for confirmation need to know is up there with such great philosophical connundra as: how long is a piece of string, I decided to try a two track approach: a six-week course of 45 minute sessions at the rectory and three follow up podcasts each week (based upon "This is my Faith" by Douglas Dales) that, when combined, will hopefully have opened up something of the mystery of the love of God and the fullness of life into which God calls us through Christ in the power of the Holy Spirit.

Devices and Desires

A few months ago I asked the parishioners of St Sillian's and St Muadain's if they might prefer the Order 1 Services over the Order 2 Services and there was a fairly unanimous expression of preference for the "traditional language" Services. We have been using them now for a few months, and I must say that I love the Order 1 Holy Communion Service and always feel that something is missing from Morning Prayer if I haven't told God that I have "erred and strayed from your ways like lost sheep". The speech rhythm of these Services feels so natural to so many of us and it is wonderful to be reminded of what we risk losing from our worship when we too casually (or carelessly) dispense with the old, and I say this as a child of both the wee Red Books and the APB. It was parishioners from my curacy parish who taught me the fluid beauty of the Order 1 services and I am delighted to be able to use these Services again with the people of St Sillian's and St Muadain's and as I do so, I remember with thanksgiving the faith of those Saints who have nurtured me in the faith of the Church.

it with them to the second tool check. This time, no shovel was missing. Indeed, there had been a miscount at the first check point.

"The word spread like wildfire through the whole camp. An innocent man had been willing to die to save the others! . . . The incident had a profound effect. . .

The men began to treat each other like brothers.

"When the victorious Allies swept in, the survivors, human skeletons, lined up in front of their captors— and instead of attacking their captors—insisted: 'No more hatred. No more killing. Now what we need is forgiveness.'" Sacrificial love has transforming power.

Jesus taught his disciples in *The Parable* of the Unmerciful Servant (Matthew 18:21-35) that in response to the grace and mercy he gives (cancelling a debt equivalent to the wages earned in 235,294 years – impossible to pay back), that grace and mercy should be given to others (cancelling a debt 600,000 times less). Jesus refers to those who have received grace (been forgiven) but are unwilling to give grace to others (forgive) as *"wicked"* and says that the debt which had been cancelled is to be paid by them. He then finishes with these sobering words:

"This is how my heavenly Father will treat each of you unless you forgive your brother or sister from your heart." (Matthew 18:35)

Miracle On The River Kwai

Ernest Gordon's Tells a story in 'Miracle On The River Kwai' about Scottish soldiers, forced by their Japanese captors to labour on a jungle railroad. Under the strain of captivity, they had degenerated to barbarous behaviour, but one afternoon something happened. "A shovel was missing. The officer in charge became enraged. He demanded that the missing shovel be produced, or else. When nobody in the squadron budged, the officer got his gun and threatened to kill them all on the spot . . . It was obvious the officer meant what he had said. Then, finally, one man stepped forward. The officer put away his gun, picked up a shovel, and beat the man to death. When it was over, the survivors picked up the bloody corpse and carried

in Northern Syria have already been suffering because of 12 years of conflict. The relief to Syria has been much less than to Turkey, even though 15.3 million people rely on humanitarian support to survive and 90% of people live below the poverty line (according to the British Red Cross).

Barnabas Aid have people on the ground and so we organised three drop-off times, partnering with the Presbyterian Church and the Catholic Church in the village. Over the three Saturdays we managed to fill two cattle trailers and thanks to Lynden Keys from Dromore Presbyterian Church, the warm clothes and dried non-perishable foods (mainly rice, flour, lentils and chickpeas) were delivered to Barnabas Aid's warehouse in Belfast. These will then be combined with aid from others within Northern Ireland and transported to their Swindon warehouse and then out to Syria. A big thank you to all who gave towards this.

As I write these words we have been reminded that despite the recent spell of pleasant weather winter is still around as we had a little bit of snow yesterday. However we know that longer days and hopefully warmer weather is not very far away. We are approaching the middle of Lent and looking forward to Mothering Sunday next week when we will acknowledge all that our mothers and others have done for us and what that means in our lives.

We will then look forward to Palm Sunday, Holy Week and Easter Sunday with all the



significance of that time of year. I want to share some words from Micah which I came across as I thought about what I wanted to say in my notes for this month.

In Micah 7 we find these words, Who is a God like you, pardoning iniquity and passing over the transgression of the remnant of your possession? He does not retain his anger for ever, because he delights in showing clemency. He will again have compassion upon us; he will tread our iniquities under foot. As we continue to journey through Lent and look forward to Easter I think that these words give us a timely reminder about the God who we worship and what this time of year means for us. The God who we worship is unique in that

we are forgiven through his grace and not

through anything that we have done. The prophet reminds us that the God who we worship pardons our sin and passes over all that we have done.

We are also reminded that he does not remain angry and that he offers us compassion.

This is what we should be considering at this time of year - the fact that God loved us so much that he sent his Son to live among his creation, to endure temptation, to face trial and crucifixion so that the price for our sins would be paid something that we could never do ourselves.

The words of Micah remind us of all that God has done for us and at Easter we will celebrate the fact and it is a fact that death could not hold Jesus and in rising from the grave on that first Easter morning Jesus defeated death once and for all. I hope that thought fills you with joy and that you will take the time to attend church on Sunday 9 April to thank God for his grace and his mercy for his creation.



So much of our lives can be a bit of a wallpapering exercise – trying to show the world that we've got it together, when we really don't. Slap on some makeup to fake eight hours' sleep. Run around the house with a hoover and a bin-bag as soon as you get warning that someone is calling by, so they think you're a tidy person. Put pictures on Facebook of your lovely holiday where everyone's smiling, even though the baby spent the whole plane journey screaming and it rained for most of the week. We're quite good at papering over the cracks.

Sometimes, though, we fail. Last week, some comedian wrote 'clean me' on the back of our car. I felt totally mortified. I had been spotted 'not coping' – someone had realised that, between juggling the demands of work and home, I hadn't managed to wash our car. I hate dropping the ball, and I hate it even more when others notice that I have. I'm a failed perfectionist, and I had been found out by some observant passer-by. But is dropping the ball all that bad? Jesus refers to the Pharisees as 'whitewashed tombs' (Matt 23:27). In other words, they spend their lives trying to convince others that they've got it all together, when spiritually they're a mess. By contrast, Paul says of himself 'We now have this light shining in our hearts, but we ourselves are like fragile clay jars containing this great treasure. This makes it clear that our great power is from God, not from ourselves.' (1 Cor. 4:7 NLT). What he's saying is it's ok if we look a bit rough around the edges, a bit of a mess - not fine China, but simple earthenware pots. We're not showing off ourselves, we're showing Jesus to the world - and our humanity is testament to the greatness of

A prayer of return

As our pictures show, the cold, dark Winter is still in conflict with the warming of Spring as one clings on trying to fight off the inevitable move away from cold to the hope of warmth. The inevitable win of the light over darkness is the inward hope and every follower of Jesus as they wrestle with the laying aside those things that so easily entangle. King David is hailed as Israel's most distinguished King but he wasn't without fault. The account of his life in the Bible doesn't try to hide his shortcomings but reveals a King who made mistakes and shows him, warts and all, as a very human, at times weak, prone to wander individual. Psalm 51 arises out of David's catastrophic fall from grace when after intentionally being in the wrong place at the wrong time a series of unfortunate events is orchestrated, at David's command. Adultery, lies and deceit, murder, followed by a cover-up; One Royal scandal after another Royal scandal after another Royal scandal. David is confronted by an extremely brave prophet, the prophet Nathan who tells the King, to his face, that he is in the wrong and needs to repent. That would be a nail-biting appointment to arrange. The words of Psalm 51 offer us a window into David's repentance and his cry to God for forgiveness and help. But I want to focus on one verse here - Verse 10, "Create in me a pure heart, O God, and renew a steadfast spirit within me." But what is this a prayer for and might this be a prayer that we could pray as we being our journey through Lent this year? "Create in me a pure heart, O God." The

great and powerful Creator is being called upon to create again. The Creator God who was and is still involved in knitting babies together in their mother's wombs is called upon to do what only the Creator can do for only the creator can create a new heart. But what is this prayer asking for? What is God being called on to do? Well, the action that is being requested is to do something creative where you take away all that is bad and replace it with all that is good and pure and holy and godly. Practices of purification all seem to relate or compare most clearly to how the people of God speak of and recall the works of the Holy Spirit. And so we would be on solid ground to conclude that purification comes as the Holy Spirit is released to do His work in a person's heart and life

- David's prayer is a prayer for the purifying presence of the Holy Spirit.

We read in the gospel of John that one of the roles of the Holy Spirit is to convict the world of sin – highlight those areas of our lives that block God from our vision and keep us from living fully for Him and with Him. In Genesis we have the picture of the Holy Spirit hovering over the face of the deep and God begins to create "And God said, ... let there be ..." And as God the Father sent out his Word in the midst of the hovering Spirit, creation happened. David is praying that God would again work creatively as the Creator King and form within him a heart, a core, a central foundation that will motivate him and cause him to live rightly in relationship with his Father God and King. David's prayer is for Purity and is a prayer that desires a place of inner determined desire to think, act, speak, in a way that would please God and cause him to represent Him well!! David wants an inner "set apartness" to God represented by the marriage bond where we have eyes only for Him and our lives are lived within that covenant relationship. But David appears to know and understand that this is Spirit enabled, is an empowered relationship where it is Spirit maintained and Spirit dependent!

"and renew a steadfast spirit within me." This is a prayer for renewal - to take and make new what is already in existence, what is already there. It is a prayer about restoration. Like realising that the rope that was keeping your boat safely tethered to the harbour wall was loosening and was in desperate need of being retied or else the boat was in danger of slipping away and being lost out at sea or smashed against the rocks in a storm. It is our spirit's that are in need of renewing so that at our core and centre, our hearts would be fixed upon and tethered to the Lord God. What might our prayer then be in contemporary language? What about...

O Lord God, Creator and King, send Your Holy Spirit into my inmost being, into my heart, and deep into the depths of who I am.

Holy Spirit come like rushing waters to

cleanse me.

Holy Spirit come like burning fire to refine *me*.

Holy Spirit come like wild wind and blow away my brokenness and reveal the gold.

O Lord God, Creator and King, Strengthen the tethering that ties me to You,

A tethering of heart out of love and devotion,

A tying that keeps me close to where You are,

That You may always be in sight So that Your presence gives me strength.

Youth Group





Why did Jesus come into the world?

"God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world through Him might be saved." (John 3:17) "And this is eternal life, that they may know You, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom You have sent." (John 17:3) The first verse comes immediately after John 3:16 which, perhaps, is better known by most people, in that it ends with talking about "everlasting life" or "eternal life". It is only when we get to John 17, where it is recorded that Jesus is praying to the Father, that we find out what exactly "eternal life" IS.

Did Jesus come into the world to save us from our sins? YES. But if that is our ONLY focus, then we may miss the complete reason for Jesus coming into the world. Jesus was and is completely God. 



Victim to Victory

Good Friday reminds us of Jesus the innocent, made guilty victim who died on the cross; He was the victim put on trial, accused by false witnesses, the Scapegoat. The chief priests and the whole Sanhedrin were looking for false evidence against Jesus so that they could put him to death, But they could not find any, though many false witnesses came forward" (Matthew 26 v 59-60). As we know that at the feast of the Passover a prisoner was to be released on the request of the people, Barabbas revolutionary was released instead of Jesus. The religious authorities felt they had achieved their goal with the illegal mock false trial of Jesus, the declaration of his guilt, his crucifixion and then verification that he was dead. His body buried and sealed in the tomb. The words "It is finished" seemed to all who stood at the cross the cry of defeat of the victim.

But three days later those words were to prove the beginning of Victory. "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here, he has risen." Remember how



he told you, while he was still with you in Galilee. "The Son of Man must be delivered into the hands of the sinful men, to be Crucified and on the third day be raised again" (Luke $24 \vee 6-7$)

To-day the risen Jesus speaks to us. He offers hope, new life forgiveness and a glorious perfect future with himself forever one day in the New Heaven and Earth. Through Christ's death and resurrection."We are more than conquerors through him who loves us" (Romans 8 v 37)

"But thanks be to God, He gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ". (1st Corinthians 15 v 57)

The Christian faith centres around an empty cross and tomb. "He was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquitous, and by his wounds we are healed" (Isaiah $53 \vee 5$)

Rich Warren puts it this way "Jesus did not die on the Cross just so we could live comfortably, well – adjusted lives. His purpose was far deeper; He wants to make us like himself before he takes us to Heaven. This is our privilege, our immediate responsibility and our ultimate destiny". Jesus said "I am the Resurrection and the life. He who believes in me, though he may die, he shall live forever. And whoever lives and believes in me shall never die. Do you believe this? (John 11 25-26) Easter is the time to rejoice and be thankful for the gift of Life, Love and joy.

Yours are the eyes with which Christ looks out his compassion to the world. Yours are the feet with which he is to go about doing good. Yours are the hands with which he is to bless us now." Hopefully that is enough to whet your appetite, for joining with us during Holy Week. We look forward to seeing you there.

Spring into New Life

Clogher Diocesan Mothers' Union Trustees organised a Training and Fellowship morning on Saturday, 11th March entitled "Spring into New Life"

It was held in Cleenish Parish Hall and was attended by Mothers' Union branch leaders, treasurers and secretaries as well as Trustees from across the diocese. Those who attended were welcomed by Cleenish Mothers' Union with tea, coffee and sumptuous scones. They mingled together and were given the opportunity to write their prayers for sharing later in the morning.

The opening worship had been written by Revd Maureen Desborough from the Garrison group of parishes and was led by Canon Jen McWhirter as Revd Desborough was not able to be there due to a family bereavement. The keynote speaker was Mrs Sonya Johnston, Deputy Director of Fermanagh Trust. Sonya has 30 years of experience working and leading in community/family/voluntary sectors in England and Northern Ireland in a wide range of settings.

She told those present of her experiences in establishing services and working across boundaries in challenging areas with the homeless, youth care leavers, women's groups and education projects for children and young people. She also advised us of how Fermanagh Trust could be a resource for Mothers' Union branches and of the training they offer for community groups. She added that there are many opportunities for volunteering in the community and she encouraged Mothers' Union members to sign up for the Trust's telephone helpline.

The Diocesan President, Heather Ellis, reminded those present that this was International Womens' Week and we then gave thanks for the inspiring women who work with us in Mothers' Union here and across the world.

She then told us of Rebecca's story (a MU member from Africa) and the Mothers' Union Literacy and Financial Education programme which had arranged to teach Rebecca to read and write.

After she became literate, Mothers' Union helped her to start a business making and selling ice cream and juice and the income from this supported her family.

Revd Charles Eames led Midday Prayers. During the second part of the morning, Branch Committee member role outlines were shared by Trustees and those present asked questions about their new roles and learnt more of where they could get help and advice.

The morning closed with prayers led by Mrs Valerie McMorris and the Trustees in the Faith and Policy unit.

The President thanked all who took part.










MAUNDY THURSDAY: TWO PEOPLE FROM CLOGHER DIOCESE AREA LOOK FORWARD TO MEETING KING CHARLES AT YORK MINSTER

Two people who have contributed significantly to their community over many years have been nominated this year by the Bishop of Clogher, the Right Revd Dr. Ian Ellis, to receive Maundy Money from King Charles III.

This year King Charles III and the Queen Consort will distribute Maundy money in York Minster. During the service 74 men and 74 women, signifying the King's age, will be presented with Maundy money.

This year, Mrs. Hilary Keys, a leading member of St. Macartan's Cathedral, Clogher and Mr. Paddy Maguire, a member of St. Michael's Parish, Enniskillen, will be travelling to York for the service on Maundy Thursday, 6th April.

A commendation from Bishop Ian, stated; "Hilary Keys works tirelessly within Clogher Parish in various roles from parish recorder, select vestry member, Mothers' Union branch treasurer and coordinator of the Grouped Parishes Knit, Stitch & Natter group. Hilary also is a leading committee member of the local 'Cancer focus group' and a long-time member of the local Women's Institute. Bishop Ian also nominated Paddy Maguire; "Paddy Maguire has been involved in education long past his retirement, having served as a vice-principal and now for at least eight years as chair of a local Board of Governors. He has also written and published a book recently on his classmates from school days.

Hilary said the first she knew about her nomination was when she received a letter from the Royal Almonry's office at Buckingham Palace which oversees the distribution of alms to the poor, inviting her to receive Maundy money in York Minster.

"It took me a couple of days to get over the shock," said Hilary, who is Rector's Churchwarden at Clogher Cathedral.

Hilary said she has been involved in many aspects of church life, just recently stepping down as Recorder after almost 50 years. She is well known in the area as one of the founder members of the Knit, Stitch and Natter group, which meets twice a month in the Cathedral Hall to produce a range of garments and items from

needlecraft. In the past they have produced knee blankets for residents from their group of parishes, now in the nursing home in Clogher, each one personalised with their name. They have also produced bags filled with goodies for the local Women's Aid group as well as bags for children.

However the group became best known for producing the knitted model of Clogher Cathedral unveiled last summer and which is on display inside. That project took members two years to complete. Recently, they have been involved in producing scarves and hats for victims of the Turkey and Syria earthquake as well as knitted cardigans and blankets for premature babies at the South-West Acute Hospital.

They are now planning their next project to produce poppies for the Royal British Legion.

Hilary, whose husband John passed away seven years ago, has a son, Jonathan who is married and two daughters, Alison (Burrows) and Rachel (Robinson), living in the Fivemiletown, Castlecaulfield and Augher areas.

Hilary is now looking forward to travelling to York Minster with her daughter, Rachel for this historic occasion when it will be King Charles' first time to distribute Maundy money as Sovereign. Hilary said she had visited York Minster previously on a trip but never dreamed of being invited back to this service.

Mr. Paddy Maguire

Paddy Maguire, who lives close to Enniskillen and is member of St. Michael's Parish, said he appreciated the significance of the crosscommunity aspect of his nomination.

"It was a big surprise and something I would never have thought of," he said.

Paddy, a graduate of Queen's University, Belfast, is originally from Kinawley and attended St. Michael's College and in 2022 produced a book of reflections, "Whatever became of the class of 1957?" from more than 40 classmates as they began second level education in 1957.

Paddy's long career has been steeped in education, firstly as a teacher for more than 20 years in St. Mary's Secondary School, Irvinestown and Vice-Principal for the last 15 years. He then moved to the Western Education and Library Board working in Curriculum Development and as a Schools Inspector. In 1994 he led the CLASS (Computerised Local Administration System for Schools) project as manager of the team introducing it in schools across the Board area. It was expanded across Northern Ireland and by 2000 became C2K when Paddy became Service Delivery Manager of all the schools across the five area boards in Northern Ireland.

Following his retirement, Paddy continued his involvement in education and now serves as Chairman of the Board of Governors at St. Fanchea's College, Enniskillen and is also a member of the Parish Council at St. Michael's. He has been involved in producing a parish newsletter over the years.

Paddy and his wife, Kathleen have five children; Shauna, twins Manus and Claire, Maeve and Niall, all married with their own children.

Paddy and Kathleen are now looking forward to visiting York Minster on 6 April for the Maundy Thursday service.

History and significance of Maundy Money

The service dates back to 600AD and the special coins have kept much the same since 1670.

Each recipient of Maundy money is given two small leather purses by The Sovereign, one red and one white. The first contains a small amount of ordinary coinage which symbolises the Sovereign's gift for food and clothing. The second purse contains Maundy coins up to the value of the Sovereign's age. The coins are legal tender but recipients normally prefer to retain them as a keepsake.

Clones community ready to celebrate life of St. Tighernach

On 4 April, the community in Clones will gather at St Tighernach's Church at the Diamond to remember the saint. In this article, Walter Pringle outlines some of the historical facts connected to St. Tighernach and describes the inter-denominational event.

"Derryvullen North Parish Church in Irvinestown and Derryvullen South Church at Tamlaght, like the big church in Clones which towers over the town centre, are all dedicated to St. Tighernach.

The 8th to 9th century Round Tower graveyard at Cara Street in the townland of Crossmoyle in Clones is also known as St. Tighernach's graveyard. It has a church shape tomb where the saint is understood to be buried. The primary school and the famous venue for Ulster Final football matches are also named after the Clones Saint, although different spellings have been used as so often happened in earlier years.

St. Tighernach was known to be helper to St. Macartan to whom our cathedrals in Enniskillen and Clogher are dedicated. The Clones community, under the leadership of Clones Community Forum, in conjunction with the parishioners of St. Tighernach's have (before Covid restrictions) remembered and celebrated the life of St. Tighernach on 4th of April, the date the church recognises as the saint's day.

The celebrations always begin in the church with prayers, scripture readings as well as special singing by a choir or by soloists or by a singing group. Former bishop, Archbishop John McDowell, attended previous occasions and Bishop lan has kindly committed to being with us this year. Clergy in the area are always invited to attend this occasion for it's a celebration of Christianity for a much bigger area than the

parish of Clones. Those attending are led by volunteers dressed as monks to the burial place in The Round Tower Graveyard. Last year pipers from The Graham Memorial Clontibret Pipe Band, followed the monks with the pipe music of hymns such as Amazing Grace. Pipe music could be heard not just throughout Cara street and Crossmoyle, but much further afield, in the April night air.

Many people in the diocese may not be aware of the contribution St. Tighernach made to the Christian faith, not only in the Clones area, but also in Fermanagh and into Tyrone. This is an opportunity for people across the diocese, of any Christian tradition, to be part of what, with the exception of the Covid years, has been an important celebration to an important saint, without whom Christianity in these border counties may not have become central to the lives of people down through the centuries, before any of us were born. Worship or church activities are too often traditional and confined to Sunday mornings. We want you to join us on 4th of April in Saint Tighernach's church on The Diamond in Clones, and then for the short walk to the Round Tower which the Council have so beautifully floodlit and of which we in Clones are so rightly very proud. After that its across the road to the beautifully restored Cassandra Hand Centre for a cup of tea," said Walter.

'Recollections of a country life' is a popular bestseller

FARMER and member of Killeevan Parish in Co. Monaghan has published a book on his life, his family's connection with the countryside for 300 years and the rural community he has known well. William Ritchie (85), now living at Glenvar House, Cara, Newtownbutler, Co. Fermanagh, launched his book,

"Recollections of a Country Life" at a special event in Newbliss. The first print run has already sold out and a second print run is now being completed by the Castleblayney printers, such has been the popularity of the publication.

In a foreword in the book, Brian MacDomhnaill described the book as unashamedly local and all the more valuable for that with its epicentre in the townland of Garron in the Greenan's Cross area of Co. Monaghan between Newbliss and Threemilehouse. The Ritchie family belonged to Aghabog Parish Church and William said it was the foundation of his faith. He said William Ritchie's family's sense of place and love of community was illustrated in the account of the enduring relationship that William's father, also called William, had for the local school. Brian said that having farmed in the townland for 300 years and more, the Ritchie family already had very deep roots in the land and in the local community by the time William was born in 1937.


He said William Ritchie described with love and affection some of the characters of the area which were part of the colourful tapestry of diversity he wrote about.

"Human interaction was the glue that kept communities together and a striking feature of these recollections is the range of people with whom the author interacted while growing up in Carron. Tyrone Guthrie, Peter 'the Tangler' Connolly, the Nesbitt brothers, the Gavans and many more besides added to the colourful tapestry of life in this corner of Monaghan through the 1940's," Brian said.

"But there is much more to recommend it; descriptions of fair days, of hiring fairs, of the various stages of flax cultivation and processing, butter making and the growing and harvesting of potatoes and oats are set in landscape rich in natural


biodiversity. The horse and plough worked in a landscape where the call of the corncrake was present in summer and there was a rhythm to the seasons. Through his life as a progressive farmer, Willie Ritchie never lost sight of the simple pleasures that make life worthwhile and this book is both a celebration of such simplicity and a requiem for its passing," said Brian.

"His recollections also challenge any preconceptions we might have about someone born and reared a Protestant in one of the 'lost counties' of Ulster after Partition. Far from being embittered and 'sticking to their own' the Ritchies were fully immersed in the life of the wider community of all faiths. Theirs was a house for the ceilidh where traditional musicians were warmly welcomed and where Willie Ritchie developed his love for the Uileann pipes."

William told Clogher Diocesan Magazine said that inspiration to write his stories came from family members.



"I would be telling my family about things that happened in the past and they kept saying they should be recorded or written down or they would be forgotten. So about two years ago I decided to do it," William explained. While Garron townland is where William grew up (his brother John farms there now), he bought the farm at Cara in Co, Fermanagh in 1972 where he and his wife, Ivy, who is organist in Killeevan Church, had a family of one son, John and two daughters, Yvonne (Mrs Breen) and Helen (Mrs Johnston). William and Ivy have 12 grandchildren.

Books sold at the launch have found their way to the USA, Australia and all over the British Isles.

More copies will soon be available for sale following a second print run. Proceeds after costs will go to the National Council for the Blind of Ireland.

CHURCH OF IRELAND NEWS Children and Families resource for Easter

The Church of Ireland Board for Ministry with Children and Families have resources to help parishes through Lent and Easter. Below is an example of their resource for Easter called Easter Tiers.

This is an intergenerational activity that can be used either in your home or at church as part of an intergenerational service. Together you create each tier and read a section of the Easter story. Using the templates provided you make the boxes that separate each tier – each box has Bible verses and a question to fill in if you choose. At each stage you stop to reflect on what that section of the story means to you, and you pray together.

The bottom tier reflects on the garden of Gethsemane and we think about things that are difficult in life, things we want to pray for. The middle tier reflects on the crucifixion – the sacrificial love of God.

The top tier reflects on the resurrection – new beginnings, things to rejoice and give thanks for.

'DO NOT TURN YOUR BACK ON PERSECUTED CHRISTIANS' – NEW GLOBAL GUIDE LAUNCHED

A growth in extremism and increasing government control over religion in some regions are among the trends noted in the fourth edition of the Church in Chains Global Guide. The Global Guide aims to raise awareness in Ireland about the situation of persecuted Christians around the world by giving an overview of what is happening in 60 countries. It also seeks to motivate people to respond. The Global Guide was launched in Dublin by Revd Trevor Sargent, Rector of Bunclody Union, who appealed to Christians not to ignore the plight of persecuted Christians but to "be a voice for those who cannot speak or seek justice the way we can". The Guide divides the countries into three colour coded categories - severe (where many or all Christians face persecution including imprisonment, torture, murder or violent mob attacks), significant (where some, but not all, Christians face arrest, attack

or serious restrictions) and limited (where some churches or individual Christians face restrictions or discrimination).

David Turner, director of Church in Chains, explained that the new Global Guide documents how persecution of Christians is increasing right across the globe - from Latin America to some countries in Europe; from the Middle East to a growing number of countries in Sub–Saharan Africa; from the former Soviet states of Central Asia through the religiously diverse countries of South Asia to the communist-led countries in East Asia. A number of TDs and people working in Government departments attended the launch and Mr Turner said: "The persecution of Christians worldwide has been ignored for far too long by successive Irish governments which have repeatedly stated a commitment to prioritising freedom of religion or belief in foreign policy."

Archbishops lead service of prayer and reflection for Ukraine

On Friday, 24th February 2023 the two Archbishops of Armagh, the Most Revd John McDowell and the Most Revd Eamon Martin, led a service of prayer and reflection in Armagh on what was the first anniversary of the start of the war in Ukraine.

The Archbishops were joined by members of local churches and schools and representatives of the Ukrainian community who have now made Armagh their home. Prayers for peace and reconciliation were offered and a time of quiet reflection and remembrance was observed as the devastating impact of a year of conflict was recalled.

Ulster Scots funding for Coronation events

For parishes in Northern Ireland, the Ulster Scots Agency Small Events Grant 2023 is supporting

events from 1 April to 31 December 2023, including Ulster-Scots events to celebrate the forthcoming Coronation in May. The maximum grant available is £1,000 (minimum of £500) and this can be used to fund one to two events. Groups must provide match funding of at least 10%. Support is available from the Ulster-Scots Community Network if groups require assistance with their submission.

Projects must be delivered up to 31 December 2023 and groups should submit an application form at least one month before their planned event.
