

A NOTE FROM THE BISHOP



A Message from the Bishop

CORONATION OF KING CHARLES III

'First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings should be made for everyone, for kings and all who are in high positions, so that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and dignity'. 1 Timothy 2: 1-2

The Coronation of King Charles III will be a special moment in the life of our nation and one which many of us are unlikely to see again in our lifetime. The Coronation Service will take place on Saturday 6 May 2023 at Westminster Abbey, conducted

by the Archbishop of Canterbury. The ceremony is rooted in ancient traditions, but it will also reflect the way the monarchy continues to evolve and the role of the King today.

The Bible has lots to tell us about kings. In the Old Testament we read of Saul the first King of Israel, and the iconic kings David and Solomon whose reigns became legendary. Each of these despite their successes showed human weaknesses and ultimately, they and most of their successors failed to live up to the ideal God had envisaged. We also read of kings of foreign lands who conquered Israel and divided it up its kingdom. Invading armies carried off many of the people into exile where they languished as slaves. Although the people eventually returned and re-established the kingdom, by the time of the New Testament the land of Israel had been subjected by the might of the Roman empire and were ruled by puppet kings and Roman governors.

In Holy Week, we read of the hopes of the Jewish people for a Messiah to come to conquer Israel's enemies and to rule over his people and how the crowd welcomed Jesus as their King into the city. Later Pilate asks Jesus, 'Are you the King of the Jews?" to which Jesus replies 'You say so'. As Jesus was crucified Pilate ordered a sign be placed over him reading 'Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews'. The Christian church came to understand that strange as it might seem, the crucifixion of Jesus was a victory over the power of sin and death, and that by his resurrection and ascension he has been glorified as King who reigns over earth and heaven.

At King Charles's coronation he will be given the Sovereign's Orb (pictured inset). It is a representation of the sovereign's power and symbolises the world with the cross mounted on a globe. During the

coronation service, the Orb is placed in the right hand of the monarch as they are invested with the symbols of sovereignty, and it proclaims the reign of Christ over the world.

The writers of the New Testament understood that kings and those who govern society are placed there by God and despite their human frailties, the Christian has a duty to pray for them believing that by the grace of God working in their rule, citizens would enjoy peaceful and dignified lives. In our BCP at Morning Prayer we pray 'O God, save the King – and grant his government wisdom' (NI) or 'O Lord guide and defend our rulers – and grant our government wisdom'. (RI)

In that spirit across the UK and the Commonwealth over the Coronation weekend, churches will at services of worship offer prayers of thanksgiving and bring intercessions for King Charles. We particularly ask for wisdom for the King and his government, for righteousness to flourish in the land and for the gift of peaceful living. And we also commit ourselves to service of Christ as those who are the hands of Jesus today showing his love to the world.

Almighty God, the fountain of all goodness,

bless His Majesty, King Charles, and all who are in authority under him; that they may order all things in wisdom and equity, righteousness and peace, to the honour of your name, and the good of your Church and people; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Gracious God,

in company with our King, we rededicate ourselves to your service. Take our minds and think through them, take our lips and speak through them, take our hearts and set them on fire with love for you and your kingdom; that here we may have your peace, and in the world to come may see you face to face;

through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

This is the central legislative body for our church and comprises Bishops, clergy and laity representing every diocese. It will meet this year in Wexford from 12th – 13th May. 
Archdeacon Brian Harper

Update from Donna Geary

The last few months have been full-on staffing a Discipleship Training School (DTS) here in Townsville and taking my team to Papua New Guinea on the second part of their outreach. The school just wrapped up in March and I wanted to give you an update on how it went!

The lecture phase of the DTS involved the students delving into topics such as the nature and character of God, relationships, effort, Lordship, mission, bible and worldview, sharing Jesus, spiritual warfare and identity. It was an opportunity for students to solidify their foundations and gain teaching from people with years of experience in living for God.

The first part of outreach for this group was

in Townsville, lending a hand in the lead-up to Christmas with an event called "Stable". This event is an opportunity for people to hear the Christmas story by walking through the Town of Bethlehem and seeing the story unfold for themselves. It's a hard one to explain unless you've seen it, but I've included a few photos of our team setting up the event. They also had the chance to be a part of the production and serve within it right up to Christmas Eve.

After the Christmas period we headed to Papua New Guinea for the next part of our outreach. We spent seven weeks in the country and were able to pack so much into this time and connect with so many communities.

Some of the stand-out stories for me from this outreach were:

· After we showed a movie about genderbased violence in one of the villages we visited, a man

with a passion to see change for the women in his community had the idea to create a safe house for those women in violent marriages so that they would have somewhere to go. I look forward to seeing how this goes during future visits.

 Seeing my team come together, organise programmes, speak on various topics and even overcome some of their own fears. Being able to go back to one village and reconnect with a friend I had made there and see her bring her two-month- old in for her first injections.

 Speaking to young girls in a school in Western Province, hearing their hopes for the future and

being able to encourage them in these. Overall, staffing this DTS has been such an amazing experience and I look forward to being a part of more schools in the future. Being able to walk alongside the students in the school as they discovered new things about God and the bible, and then take

what they learnt and apply it on outreach, was really special.

If you want to know more, never hesitate to reach out. I've only covered a small snippet of the last few months so I would love to answer any other questions you may have. God Bless, Donna.



Mrs Keys accompanied by her daughter, Mrs Rachel Robinson attended the ceremony in York Minster along with Mr Paddy Maguire from Enniskillen. Mrs Keys said she deemed it a great honour to have been nominated by Bishop Ellis to receive the award. Mrs Keys was Parish Recorder for 45 years and has served the parish as a churchwarden, synodsperson and parochial nominator. She was also one of the principal organisers of the 'Stitch, Knit and Natter' group that created the much admired model cathedral.

Westway Films and the Scottish Bishops

Westway Films have visited Clogher Cathedral to make a documentary on the two Scottish bishops who came to the Diocese of Clogher at the time of the

Plantation of Ulster. They were interested in Bishop George Montgomery who occupied the See from 1605 to 1621 and his successor, James Spottiswood, bishop from 1621 until 1645. Montgomery was a pluralist and held Derry and Raphoe along with Clogher. Spottiswood was responsible for the rebuilding of the cathedral in 1628 and the datestone of this building with his initials engraved thereon is preserved in the present cathedral. The Archive Room holds a scarce copy of his 'lyfe and tryals'. Spottiswood, who was buried in Westminster Abbey was a brother of John Spottiswood, the Scottish archbishop who crowned Charles I at Holyrood. There are portraits of both Montgomery and Spottiswood in the collection of portraits in the cathedral.

A service of Holy Communion was held in the Cathedral on Easter Sunday. The service was conducted by the Revd Alison Irvine and Bishop Ian Ellis, who was the celebrant, also preached the sermon. He used the 3 "p"s – powerful, pledge and presence to convey the essential message of the Easter story. Mr Harry Alexander sang "Jerusalem" with the Cathedral choir joining in the choruses. Mrs Diane Simpson played the organ and was also the accompanist for the anthem.





The Three Trees

Once there were three trees on a hill in the woods. They were discussing their hopes and dreams when **the first tree** said, "Someday I hope to be a treasure chest. I could be filled with gold, silver and precious gems. I could be decorated with intricate carving and everyone would see the beauty.

Then **the second tree** said, "Someday I will be a mighty ship. I will take kings and queens across the waters and sail to the corners of the world. Everyone will feel safe in me because of the strength of my hull."

Finally, **the third tree** said, "I want to grow to be the tallest tree and straightest tree in the forest. People will see me on top of the hill and look up to my branches and think of the heavens and God and how close to them I am reaching. I will be the greatest tree of all time and people will always remember me."

After a few years of hoping that their dreams would come true, a group of woodsmen came upon the trees. When one came to **the first tree** he said, "This looks like a strong tree. I think I should be able to sell the wood to a carpenter." This made the first tree happy because he thought the carpenter would make him into a treasure chest.

At **the second tree**, a woodsman said, "This looks like a strong tree, I should be able to sell it to the shipyard." The second tree was happy because he thought he was on his way to becoming a mighty ship.

When the woodsmen came upon **the third tree** the tree was frightened because he knew that if they cut him down, his dreams would not come true. One of the woodsmen said. "I don't need anything special from my tree so I'll take this one and cut it down.

When **the first tree** arrived at the carpenters, he was made into a feed-box for animals. He was then placed in a barn and filled with hay. This was not at all what he had dreamed.

The **second tree** was cut and made into a small fishing boat. His dreams of being a mighty ship had come to an end.

The **third tree** was cut into pieces and left alone in the dark.

The years went by, and the trees forgot about their dreams. Then one day, a man and woman came to the barn. She gave birth and they placed the baby in the hay in the feed box that was made from **the first tree**. The man wished that he could have made a crib for the baby, but this manger would do. The tree could feel the importance of this event and it knew that it had *held the greatest treasure of all time*.

Years later, a group of men got in the fishing boat made from **the second tree**. One of them was tired and went to sleep. While they were out on the water, a great storm arose and the tree didn't think it was strong enough to keep the men safe. The men woke the sleeping man, and he stood and said, "peace" and the storm

stopped. At this time, the tree knew that it had carried the King of kings in its boat. Finally, someone came and got the third tree. It was carried through the streets as the people mocked the man who was carrying it. When they stopped, the man was nailed to the tree and raised in the air to die at the top of a hill. When Sunday came, the tree came to realise that this was as close to God as was possible, because Jesus had been crucified on it. Jesus was the one who made the difference - making each of the trees special. When we accept what he did on the cross for us and invite him into our lives we become born again and dependent on him (like a little child). He makes a difference in our lives and, like the three trees, we see it as such a privilege to have him in us (by his Spirit).

Our GFS and CLB Enrolment was carried out during our Family Service on Palm Sunday. The GFS and CLB sang 'Our God is a great big God' and 'Faith as small as a mustard seed' after the Enrolment and the badges, etc were handed out after the service, while the congregation saw images of what they had been doing. Since the last Enrolment Service, held before Covid, the children worked towards badges in the various age groups. The GFS completed their GFS Knowledge Badge, Home Making Badge, Cookery, Bible Study and Photography Badges as well as completing their Bible Study Programmes each year. The CLB completed their games, nature, scripture and 'doing' badges.

Joint Services It was great to be able to join with brothers and sisters in Christ from other



churches on Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and for an Easter Sunrise Service on Pigeon Top. Revd Leah McKibben (Togherdoo Methodist) spoke about the love that Jesus showed by washing the disciples' feet, even the feet of Judas Iscariot. We as disciples of Jesus need to show love to others as Jesus has shown to us – even those who don't love us. On Good Friday we had a service of reflection using readings and hymns/songs to help us to focus on the cross and then finishing with a video of the crucifixion from the Miracle Maker to the song 'Oh, to see the dawn'. Revd Andrew used three words being with 'L' to remind us that the cross shows God's LOVE, and that God couldn't LEAVE our sins to go unpunished, but he took the punishment himself. As we accept what Jesus did on the cross, he then leaves us an example for how we should LIVE. As he went to the cross for us, we who follow, must dent ourselves and take up our crosses daily. Davie Graham spoke at our joint Easter Sunrise Service about John running to the tomb, but that it wasn't until he went in, that he saw and believed.

Impressed by Hard Work

Recently two events have reminded me that hard work is its own reward. One is the ministry and commitment of mission societies, and the other is the work of uniformed organisations. In early February I had the privilege to attend the SAMS Ireland, (South American Mission Society) conference, this year held in Annaghmore parish, in County Armagh. The parish have a very impressive suite of halls built beside their Church building. But the greater interest that evening was the conference speakers who instead of a usual keynote speaker, were a series of individuals who have volunteered their time to either support the South American Church or were guest speakers both in person and on-line who have come to a faith in Jesus through the Church there. As I listened, I was reminded of a similar conference I had attended many years before in the Seagoe Hotel, led by WEC, the World Evangelism Crusade mission society. Both conferences were bearing witness to the Holiness of God, and to the labour which many are called to give in His Name. Following the February conference I emailed WEC, not realising that they are based locally in Portadown. Consequently, two from the parish attended a reflection day at their base near Scotch Street, based on the Japanese repair craft of Kintsugi. Their Arts Outreach Workers led the day explaining the craft of repairing broken pottery with precious metals and reflecting on passages of the Bible which speak of God's repair and restoration in our lives. For me, the best part of the day was meeting people from a new Churchplant in Portadown and hearing about their coming to faith. It allowed me to appreciate that God's household is indeed a broad Commonwealth.

My awareness of WEC happened because someone from the town here who had served with them overseas, some time

ago gave me a copy of their magazine. It also introduced me to the ministry of Maud Kells, who spoke in Fivemiletown Methodist Church in March. She was very impressive, and I will remember for some time how she described the hospital ward's mud floor and walls which greeted her in DR Congo some 50 years ago, and the years of hard work to cement render and built better facilities for the good of the patients. I include a quote from her book, An Open Door, in which she writes about the time she said farewell to those in DR Congo, after 50 (yes, 50!) years of missionary nursing service there.

'As I looked out I saw the sea of faces and waving hands, the majority were born in our little maternity unit and most were born again by God's Holy Spirit in the Church in our back yard: a truly precious and wonderful Harvest.'

And at the close of the Easter holidays, I had the great opportunity to drive my parents to the Ards peninsula. Driving to a favourite garden centre and café for lunch, possibly stopping at Mount Stewart and along the peninsula to make our way to Portaferry to catch the boat across the Strangford is a very favoured day away. But this day had a different mission. It's aim was to find the BB Boys Brigade Centre at Millisle, County Down. The garden Centre happened, as did a new pottery find, and an unexpected stop at the Ballycopeland Windmill (v impressive new visitors Centre.) But the most unexpected find of the journey was how expanded the once small BB camp site now is. 35 years on from a last visit, the centre now is very similar in scale to The Share Centre, Co Fermanagh. Owned and managed by the Belfast District of the Boys Brigade, the centre exists to promote and support BB across Northern Ireland and beyond. Our purpose in visiting was to gift to their museum an item for display. But instead of a small area

dedicated to this, we found a purpose-built exterior copy of Charlotte Street Church, which had hosted the first company in Belfast. Within has a vast display of items from the 140-year history since BB was founded in 1883 by Sir William Alexander Smyth in Glasgow, to support Sabbath School children in their daily life, through organised events and Bible teaching. The museum artifacts area is a great insight into many years of dedicated work by many leaders and young people to see the aim of BB achieved.

This organisation and the camp in Millisle, its growth and outreach bear witness to the value of dedication and hard work we see in many of the Church's uniformed organisations and ministries. Sometimes the only response in mission and ministry to a task is to get on and do it. I value prayer and reading and reflecting and thinking. But these recent visits have reminded me again that at times we need to graft for what we want to see achieved. Hard Work and enthusiasm are an appropriate summary of the activities associated with the parish's Holy Week. Many people worked hard to provide all of the aspects of this week in order to encourage and engage a broad range of ages across the parish's life and beyond. The week included beautiful flower displays, a prayer morning, a very thoughtful mime from the teens, a brunch for primary age children attended by 60+ children, a lamb, a meal with the local Churches, guest preachers, a full week of services, home-made Palm crosses, large scale colourings of the week's events described in the Gospels, a youth visit to the cinema, a craft day, the parish choir, musicians, Palm Sunday buns, a donkey called Lucy, and on Easter day itself - hours old fluffy chicks from the Clogher Valley. We do appreciate all that many do to allow us to meet in this way as a Parish.

You are an Heir of the World

Romans 4:13—"For the promise that he would be the heir of the world was not to Abraham or to his seed through the law, but through the righteousness of faith." The Coronation will be a historic moment in the life of our nation, a time to reflect on our history, celebrate who we are and look to our future. Looking ahead to this historic moment in the life of our nation, we give thanks for His Majesty The King's example of lifelong public service to others. The call to service is central

to our understanding of the monarchy. King Charles has already pledged himself to that vocation. Speaking just after the death of his mother Queen Elizabeth II, he made a commitment to follow the pattern of loving service that she demonstrated, a service of 'loyalty, respect, and love'. "The Coronation will be a time to celebrate community, faith and service. King Charles III ascended to the throne following the death of his mother, Queen Elizabeth II, on the 8th September 2022. It marks the formal investiture of a monarch's regal power.

The coronation ceremony is an occasion



for pageantry and celebration, but it is also a solemn religious ceremony and has remained essentially the same over a thousand years. For the last 900 years, the ceremony has taken place at Westminster Abbey, London. There are certain "objects of the coronation"coronation regalia. These are the sacred objects used in the coronation ceremony. The collection includes St Edward's Crown, the Imperial State Crown, the Sovereign's Sceptre with Cross and the Sovereign's Orb. The sceptre is a symbol of a monarch's power. The sceptre represents the sovereign's temporal power and is associated with good

governance. The orb and cross represent the power of God and it's a reminder to the monarch that their authority derives from above.

King Charles was three when his mother, Queen Elizabeth II acceded to the throne in 1952, making him the heir apparent. He was the longest serving heir in history and became the oldest to accede to the British throne at t the age of 73. Every believer in Christ is an heir. Whenever you hear the word "heir," it speaks of something good. It speaks of an inheritance that you don't work for, an inheritance that is yours not because of what you do, but because of whose you are. In Romans 4:13—"For the promise that he would be the heir of the world was not to Abraham or to his seed through the law, but through the righteousness of faith."The promise to Abraham and his seed (you and I) is that he would be "the heir of the world"! In the original Greek text, the

word "world" here is kosmos. Its meaning includes, "the whole circle of earthly goods, endowments, riches, advantages, pleasures."Now, that is what you are an heir to through Jesus' finished work! As The King prepares for this lifelong task, we pray for The King, The Queen Consort and the Royal Family and their calling to a life of public service. God save the King.

Notes from the Rectory:

In Oxford, where I come from, May Day is a 'bit of a thing'. In a tradition originating from the blessing of the fields, choir boys sing from towers, Morris dancers dance, and people jump of bridges into the river Cherwell, who knows why. Mostly, the streets are filled with tourists and students, fresh from their college balls, in full regalia, listening to the dawn chorus of choir boys from Magdalen College Tower – who do a gallant job of trying to be heard over the beery throng below.

I remember my old youth leader told me of one year when he, surrounded by students, had stood listening to the choir boys. Their singing finished, he started on his way home, but found himself



immediately walking against a tidal wayo

immediately walking against a tidal wave of students pushing their way up the high street. Where were they going, with such determined singlemindedness? What did they know that he didn't? Curious, he stopped pressing ahead in the opposite direction, and instead turned and allowed himself to be swept up in the crowd. He moved with them en masse, down the high street, around the corner to Cornmarket Street, where he found the goal which they had been moving towards - McDonalds.

And herein lay a valuable lesson – don't follow the crowd, unless you want to go where they're going.

So much of our Christian walk feels like pushing against the tide, cutting a different path to those around us. It can feel disconcerting – are we missing out on something? Would our lives look better somehow if we went along with the collective wisdom of the crowd? It can be tempting to turn around and be swept up in what everyone else is seeking after. But singlemindedness towards our goal is among the key Christian virtues. And what a goal it is – light for those who dwell in darkness; eternity in the arms of a loving saviour.

As Jesus said 'nobody who sets his hand to the plough and looks back is fit for service in the kingdom of God.'

I recently watched 'Inventing Anna' – the semi-fictional biography of Anna Delvey, the fake New York socialite who conned friends and acquaintances out of a fortune. What is clear in the series is the draw that

luxury and wealth have on Delvey, but also their evasiveness – as soon as she has them, they are gone, and she needs to hatch a plan to acquire more, eventually ending up behind bars. As Proverbs 23 puts it: 'Do not wear yourself out to get rich;

do not trust your own cleverness. ⁵Cast but a glance at riches, and they are gone,

for they will surely sprout wings and fly off to the sky like an eagle.'

Whatever sympathy you might have for Anna – a girl from humble, workingclass roots, swept up in the crowd and deposited at McDonalds – you feel far more for the people who she hurts in pursuit of her goal. The Christian path, by contrast, blesses those around us as much as it blesses us. Perhaps for you, like me, it's time to turn away from Instagram, turn off the TV ads, and set your face towards the goal once more.



Between Egypt and the Promised Land

Two of our beautiful windows in Christ Church, Trillick show depictions of events that were 50 days apart in actual time, the resurrection of Jesus and the coming of the Holy Spirit at the feast of Pentecost. At this stage for us and our celebrations, one is behind us and the other to come. The cross, fulfilling the passover imagery of the Old Testament speaks of an application of blood that kept judgement out of the house and the awaited coming of the Holy Spirit, an event that would involve a filling of the house with the kingdom shaking power of God. We have celebrated the death and resurrection of Jesus, hopefully



catching a fresh glimpse of what it is about for ourselves and humanity and been convinced, all over again of the necessity of preaching about the cross and resurrection and sin and our need of a Saviour. As we move towards Ascension, the lever that enabled the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost we do well to consider the need for this event as much as the need for the former. The Passover was about freedom from slavery, an illegal contract of enslavement and ownership legally broken, and a journey begun to enjoy that freedom and ultimately head to a promised land. Not far into that journey, 50 days after it started, and now that the Israelites were without a master and free agents, a marriage contract between God and Israel was made and their relationship became official. With Pentecost, postresurrection, this anniversary celebration became a renewal of vows with some



entering in to it for the first time. The coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost brought close the love of the bridegroom for his bride and also in the experience of that love, he deposited that same love into the heart of his bride. On Good Friday we see something of God's love demonstrated towards us in this that while we were still sinners that Christ died for us but at this feast of Pentecost God's people experience something of God's love towards them and then after receiving this Holy Spirit and love are told to go to the ends of the earth and tell everyone on the way of that love and demonstrate it in acts of loving power. Where have you been? To the cross and the resurrection! Where are you going? To Pentecost and into all the world!

St. Patrick's Day Quiz Night

Amazing grace, how sweet the sound! that saved a wretch like me! I once was lost, but now am found; was blind, but now I see.

This great hymn was written 250 years ago by the renowned hymn writer and Anglican clergyman John Newton. The hymn was written initially as a poem to illustrate a New Year's day sermon given by Newton in 1773. Because of its growing popularity, the poem was later set to music and published as a hymn

in 1779. This hymn remains one of the most popular, and indeed one of the most poignant hymns that we continue to use regularly today. It is a wonderful hymn of salvation, that speaks powerfully to us as individuals, but also tells the often dark story of its' writer. John Newton was born in 1725. He joined the navy at a young age, and he quickly became renowned for his stubborn, and defiant nature. After a time in the navy, he got involved in the slave trade, and was captured and enslaved himself for a time in West Africa. Upon his release, he quickly returned to sea, working once again in the slave trade and becoming Captain of a number of ships. While serving as Captain, his ship hit a violent storm off the coast of



Donegal. Despite his lack of faith up to that point, he cried out to God for mercy and he and his men were brought to safety. This marked a turning point in his faith, and although his continued working in the slave trade for a few more years, he soon gave it up to work towards ordination in the Church of England. He also became a prominent supporter of the abolition of the slave trade. He wrote a number of hymns whilst working as an Anglican clergyman, the most famous being 'Amazing Grace'. This hymn, and Newton's story, show the power of God's grace at work within us. It shows the power God's grace has to bring about complete transformation, regardless of the sins we have committed. And this

hymn shows God's grace to us in opening our eyes to see Him, to see His love, his goodness and his mercy towards us, his precious children. As we mark 250 years since the writing of this wonderful hymn of salvation, may we always remember the power of God to transform the world, and all who are broken within it.

Lent, Holy Week and Easter

Our journey through Lent has continued each Wednesday night as we reflected on the idea of 'giving up' certain negative qualities including anger, doubt, fear and guilt. We considered the Biblical perspective and how these qualities

might be channelled in a positive way to build us up, rather than to pull us down. Our Midweek reflections were well attended, and the short services provided a space in the week for us to draw close to God and to take time away from the busyness of our weekly routine. We held Easter Communion in the hall for all who would be unable to attend on Easter Day. This provided a great opportunity to come together for Communion, but also for fellowship and friendship. Our catering team provided refreshments after the service, which allowed us to continue our time together. On Monday night of Holy Week we held another fun night in the parish. It seems strange to promote fun during Holy Week, but this was primarily an opportunity to draw in our primary school aged children and to enhance our teaching of the Easter message. This too was well attended, with children coming from across the community. With the help of our Sunday school teachers, we played games, watched a video, did some action songs and did an Easter craft. Everyone had a great night and learned a bit more about the importance of Holy Week. As I write these notes, our Mother's Union



branch in Derrybrusk are preparing for our Maundy Thursday service of Holy Communion, where they will provide refreshments after the service. This service focuses very specifically on Christ's call for us to serve, as he washes the disciples' feet. We look forward to welcoming ladies from both branches, and of course all parishioners. Our Church wardens in Maguiresbridge are also preparing to strip the Church ahead of our Good Friday service. This notable action provides a powerful image for all in attendance at this service, and it is a sharp reminder of the need for the presence of Christ in our lives. We are very much looking forward to celebrating Easter Day in both Churches, as our hope is renewed and we walk with Mary Magdalene to view the empty tomb and the fulfilment of our faith once again. Activity Across the Parish On Monday 27th March a number of our Brownies made their Brownie Promise. This was a great achievement for each of them, and a credit to our leaders who have worked so hard to get the group up and running again after the pandemic. The group is doing so well that it is at


Coronation Weekend

Milestones on the Way

During the month of May two important milestones in the Christian Faith take place. The first Ascension Thursday marks the return of Jesus to Heaven. Its marks the completion of Jesus' ministry and purpose of His coming namely his death on the cross for our sins and His Resurrection triumphant over death. As He would pray prior to His death, I have brought you glory on earth by completing the work you gave me to do. And now Father, glorify me in your presence with the glory. I had with you before the world began" (John 17 v 4) The Ascension secondly means that the disciples are now in waiting for the promised coming of the Holy Spirit to equip and empower them to "go and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you." (Matthew 28 v 19-20) "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witness in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth" (Acts 1 v 8) Jesus' Ascension also marked the promise of His return. One day as judge of all peoples, his acknowledgement as Lord

and establishment of a new heaven and a new earth, to claim his bride the Church (Revelation 21)

The other milestone commemorated by the Church is Pentecost, the coming of the Promised Holy Spirit "It is for your good that I am going away, unless I go away, the counsellor will not come to you; but if I go, I will send him to you" (John 16 v7) "When the day of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place. Suddenly a sound like the blowing of violent wind came from Heaven and the house where they were sitting. They saw what seemed to be tongues of fir that separated and came to rest on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the spirit enabled them" (Acts 2 1-4)

This startling, noisy, life transforming event had dramatic, marvellous results due to the preaching of the gospel and the Holy Spirit's moving, 3000 people became Christians. Today we are a waiting people, a waiting Church for the return of Christ. God calls us to be ready by a living active faith alone in Christ alone. We are to be committed to Christ and then alert for his return active, serving Christ in our words and by our actions.

Annual Friends Service is held in Clogher Cathedral

The 64th Annual Friends Service took place in St. Macartan's Cathedral, Clogher on Sunday, 26 March, the first such service since 2018, mainly due to the Covid pandemic.

The service was conducted by Revd Alison Irvine, who was joined by fellow clergy and laity, the Bishop of Clogher, the Right Revd Dr. Ian Ellis; the Dean of Clogher, the Very Revd Kenneth Hall; Canon Noel McGahan, Parish Priest of Clogher and Mr. John Irvine, Diocesan Reader.

The hymns were; "God is here," "Thy hand, O God, has guided" and "Saviour, again to thy dear name we raise." The organist was Mrs Diane Simpson and guest music was provided by Tully Meadow Singers accompanied by Roisin McCurry with conductor, Siobhan O'Neill.


The lessons were read by Mr Jack Johnston and Mrs Beryl Boyd.

The preacher was the Bishop of Clogher, the Right Revd Dr. Ian Ellis who said it was good to be associated with a body of supporters of the Cathedral extending beyond its congregation and across denominational boundaries.

He said the group, Friends of Clogher Cathedral spoke of their common desire to support, care and love this historic place of worship and of their belief that together they could help to maintain its witness and role in the community.

Bishop Ellis went on to expand on the meaning of "friend."

"St Macartan as you all know, has historically

been described as the friend or 'faithful companion' of Patrick. The ancient origin of this diocese and Cathedral church brings us back to the early Celtic church in these islands. It transports us to the missionary movement of those early Christians who through the leadership of those saints like Patrick and Bridget and their friends and followers set up centres of prayer and learning, and from them reached out to the indigenous people, eventually bringing the Gospel to every part of these islands. "In continuing our worship on the same holy sites, we are joining in God's mission and uniting in their friendship too. There is something inspiring and comforting to know that the walls of these ancient churches have echoed the prayers of countless saints, friends in the Lord and we join

with them in approaching God in a place hallowed by such prayer.

"Perhaps today we could learn from the approach of understanding our faith as a friendship with God and with one another. We today need to counteract the atomisation of society which encourages self-interest, individualism, and the denial of community. We who believe we are the friends of God could become his instruments for transformation. "So, as we commemorate once again, St Macartan who died in 506AD, we are caused to reflect as Friends of this Cathedral upon his life and witness. We give thanks for his steadfastness in bringing the ancient faith to Counties Tyrone and Fermanagh. We praise God for the founding of this Cathedral church, giving thanks for the heritage of prayer and worship we have received, and may we seek a greater understanding of what it is to be a 'friend of God'.


Following the service, afternoon tea was served in the Cathedral Hall by members of the Mothers' Union.





CHURCH HISTORY

The first church was built on the site during the 1620's with the tower completed in 1637. Following an extension in the early 1800s, St. Anne's Parish Church was reconsecrated in 1842. The church was dedicated as St Macartin's Cathedral in 1923, as the second cathedral in Clogher Diocese. There have been many improvements carried out over the years, the most recent being a £550,000 restoration which included re-roofing, repair of stonework, internal redecoration, rebuilding of the organ and enhancement of the Cathedral precincts. This was carried out with the financial support of parishioners, members of the community, local businesses along with grants from the National Churches Trust and AllChurches Trust. The Cathedral is named after St. Macartin, a "strong man" who supported St. Patrick in his mission in Ireland. Macartin was the first Bishop of the Diocese in 454 and is the patron saint of the diocese.

"We love the place, O God; "Be thou my vision" and "Nearer, my God, to thee," as well as the anthem, "The Church's One Foundation" arranged by Dan Forrest in 1978, the Magnificat, Psalm 84 and the Nunc Dimittis.

Archbishop McDowell, in his address, paid tribute to the Dean, Select Vestry, parishioners and local community for their support to maintain the fabric of St. Macartin's Cathedral and outlined the history of churches in Ireland from the early days through the Reformation and Disestablishment.

He spoke of the early church practice of giving the First Fruits and tithes for the establishment of a church but said nowadays the cost of refurbishment of churches was borne by the parishioners and local community themselves such as those connected with St Macartin's Cathedral, praising them for the remarkable way they reroofed and refurbished the building, without which the witness of God would not go on.

The witness of God was the reason church buildings were important to people over the centuries and why following the ending of Covid restrictions, people were delighted to be back in church, he said.

"They came back to church with great devotion because these were places where they encountered the holiness of God," said the Archbishop.


As the 25th anniversary of the signing of the Good Friday Agreement was approaching shortly after the service took place, he said; "I think were need to equip ourselves for the building of peace because we are at the point in the life of this country which will

either be a breakdown or a breakthrough." He said that despite all the promises that were made 25 years, everyone had not tried in their personal lives to build on those because the church of Christ in Ireland and in these islands were in particular a vocation of peacemakers and peacebuilders. "All we have done is we have stopped the war but we have not built the peace." He suggested; "We need always to speak a word of peace into every violent or fractious or uncivil conversation or attitude." He then quoted the familiar passage from the Book of Matthew; "Blessed are the Peacekeepers for they will be called the Children of God."

During the service, the two Churchwardens Mr. Nathan Clyde, Rector's Churchwarden and Miss Alanna Williamson, People's Churchwarden assisted by the Dean, cut the Quadricentennial Anniversary Cake. The congregation was invited to tea in the Cathedral Hall following the service for food and fellowship.

Clones patron saint is remembered on St. Tighernach's Day

St Tighernach's Parish Church stands prominently at The Diamond in Clones and on Tuesday, 4 April it was the focus of a special event to commemorate the patron saint of the town.

St Tighernach was Bishop of Clogher from 506-549 and the cultural event marks the anniversary of his death.

Mr Walter Pringle, of Clones Community Forum, organisers, introduced the service in the church where musical items were provided by the Different Keys Community Choir and the Graham Memorial Pipe Band, Clontibret.

There were a number of talks, the first by Anne Corley, from Clones Community Forum on St. Tighernach.

She said; "In addition to Clones, Rosslea and Galloon there are a number of other Parishes, such as Derryvullen, Aghalurcher and Killtierney, who claim St. Tigernach/ Tiarnach/Tierney as their Patron Saint. "Saint Tigernach is said to have been born in 506AD. His mother Derfraigh was a daughter of Eochaid who held the Royal seat in the city of Clogher. His father was Coirbre, a nobleman from Leinster, and a high ranking officer in Eochaid's army. The two fell in love and had a son. The boy child was brought back to Leinster by his father. When they entered Kildare they were met by Saint Bridget and he was brought to the

Bishop of Kildare to be baptised. Bridget became his godmother and it was she who gave him the name Tigernagh 'meaning Princely' because he was the son and grandson of many generations of Gaelic lords and kings. Tigernach's father, Coirbre took his son home to his father's lands to be brought up and educated. In his youth Tigernach was captured by pirates who had come to plunder Leinster. He was brought to the King of the Briton's. Here he was loved by his captors for his virtue and eventually Tigernach was given his freedom. Instead of returning home Tigernach went to the Monastery of Rosnat, a dual monastery, and an important centre

in early Celtic Christianity.

It was while he was here that he had a vision that told him *"in the land of his mother he would found a famous church"*. On leaving Rosnat, Tigernach travelled to Rome where he acquired relics of the Holy Apostles Peter and Paul. He then returned to Ireland, first to Kildare, where Bridget made him a Bishop before continuing his journey to Ulster, in particular to Clogher the land of his mother. He went to his maternal grandfather Eochaid who was delighted to see his grandson, whom he considered as *"no ordinary man but a great and gentle Holy Man"*.

In an apparition Tigernach was told "go to the ultimate boundaries of the land over which your grandfather Eochaid presides and found a Holy Place with Gods help". It was at this time that he founded the Monastery of Galloon on Lough Erne. Leaving Galloon in the safe hands of one of his beloved monks Comgall, Tigernach travelled eastwards to a more spacious and fertile land, not far away on the boundary of his grandfather's kingdom to build a bigger Monastery. It was here that the Great Monastery of Clones was founded under the shadow of the magnificent Royal Moat, Rath or Hill Fort that still stands sentinel over the town. Tigernach became Abbot of Clones and Bishop of Clogher with a college of holy men and a convent of nuns in both active and contemplative life. St. Tigernagh is said to have taught a great many to serve God in primitive purity and simplicity which was the way of the Coptic Church before the influence of the Roman Empire. In later life he suffered from blindness and died of the plague in Clones in 549AD. His remains are reputed to have been buried in the Stone Sarcophagus in the Round Tower Graveyard. Clones Stone Tomb, House Tomb or Sarcophagus is a unique feature in Ireland as it is a monolith (made from one stone), in the shape and design of an early church most probably taken from the design of an earlier wooden reliquary box. The Sarcophagus is located in the same graveyard as an almost intact 9th Century Round Tower, nearby is the 12th Century Abbey dedicated to Saints Peter and Paul, built after the 5th Century Abbey was destroyed. On the Diamond in front of St. Tigernach's Church of Ireland is a beautiful High Cross, a Scripture Cross, engraved with scenes from the old and New Testament.

The second talk was local historian, George Knight on St. Erc's Hermitage, Slane. The Bishop of Clogher, the Right Revd Dr. Ian Ellis gave an Easter homily and made reference to the Christian images of crosses and referred to the High Cross in the centre





of Clones which dates from the mid 9th century. Like many other crosses it has illustrations of biblical scenes such Daniel in the Lion's Den as well as Adam and Eve. "Because they are retained today speaks so much for their cultural significance so that people can be inspired to faith," he said.

Following the church service, the ensemble

from Graham Memorial Band led a parade of people dressed as monks carrying lanterns followed by the congregation to the Round Tower graveyard, assembling close to the Sarcophagus, where St Tighernach is said to be buried. Everyone attending were invited for refreshments in the Cassandra Hand Folk and Famine Centre.

COMMUNITY NEWS Holy Land tour 'exceeded expectations'

Geoffrey and Eleanor Kerr from Lisnaskea were among 11 people from Clogher Diocese who travelled on the recent tour of the Holy Land led by Revd William Bennett, former rector of Lisnaskea parish. The 48 people travelling included people from throughout Ireland, France, Hungary and Canada staying at an hotel on the shores of the Sea of Gallilee. This is their report.

"The first few days were spent in the region of Galilee as we visited many of the very well-known places associated with the early life of Jesus but also places given great importance in the Old Testament. "There were also numerous historical and archaeological sites visited. A few highlights which left lasting memories and enriched our understanding of the Gospel included;

- Nazareth Village is a wonderful construction of a patch of ground near Nazareth where life is depicted as it would have been 2000 years ago.

- The Mount of Beatitudes where Jesus preached the most famous sermon (Matthew Chapter).Mount Tabor where the transfiguration is celebrated and Mount Carmel where Elijah saw a wonderful victory over the prophets of Baal.

"The views of the Jezreel Valley were brilliant and in the distance one could see Megaddo. Driving up to the Golan Heights the views were breathtaking and as far as the Temple of Pan where Jesus asked 'Who do people say I am?' and Peter's reply 'you are the Christ the son of the Living God'. "We called at the recently developed site in the ancient city of Magdala where Mary Magdalene was born and is a fascinating discovery and most interesting tour. A boat ride on the Sea of Galilee was very special where we got a panoramic view of the countryside and mountains as they were 2000 years ago.

"Leaving Galilee we travelled south and on the way to the Dead Sea we visited a baptismal site on the River Jordan where a number of our group renewed their baptismal vows or may have been baptised for the first time.

"Floating in the Dead Sea is always great fun and even though the weather there was a little cooler than normal, people who never could swim could swim for the

first time. We saw where the Dead Sea Scrolls were found and then ascended Massada by cable car to hear its

amazing history revealing much of the lifestyle of King Herod and the

gruesome story of the fall of Masada at the hands of the invading Roman Army. "Jerusalem is always special starting with the panoramic view of the city from the Mount of Olives. Then to the Garden of Gethsemane, where Jesus spent his last hours before his arrest. The Church of all Nations is a beautiful building at the Garden. "The places visited are too numerous to mention in this small resume but some very special places must be mentioned; St Ann's Church at the pool of Bethesda, where Jesus healed the crippled man, is an amazing place. Groups queue to take their turn to sing in the church.

It is one of the best, most exciting and moving places to sing that I know of and of course the Irish made great sounds of praise there.

"The Via Dolorosa, the way of the Cross, leads from the Pool of Bethesda to the Church of the Holy Sepulchre and is punctuated by the stations of the Cross which gave visible expressions of the suffering of Jesus as he walked to Calvary. We visited The Upper room where Christians celebrated the Last Supper and the coming of God the Holy Spirit on those assembled on the day of Pentecost and we went to the western Wall (Wailing Wall) where there is almost continuous prayer offered either audibly or written on paper and inserted between the great stones in the wall.

"One of the great highlights of the tour was a visit to The Garden Tomb. This is a garden site beside what was a marketplace in Jerusalem and is adjacent to a quarry where there is the very obvious shape of a skull on the rock face. In this garden there are many things that lead people to believe that it may have been here that Jesus was buried, having been crucified in the marketplace outside the garden.

"We all had an opportunity to enter the tomb which is one that answers the description given in the Gospels. This was a special experience which was followed by a very meaningful culmination of our tour in the celebration of Holy Communion in a small-enclosed area at the Gordon Tamb

the Garden Tomb. "This tour was much more than we could have expected. Yael, the guide had a great understanding of 'us Irish' and excelled in her guidance with amazing knowledge, deep insights and a passion for scripture. "We had an excellent driver, comfortable hotels with delicious food to suit all tastes and weather was very comfortable and dry. "Sincere thanks is due to all who helped out in any way. We had lots of talent who entertained us most evenings but very special thanks to Garth Peel who, with his wife Gena, showed no hesitation in their generosity by providing top class and

generosity by providing top class and appropriate entertainment for the tour. Clogher Diocese was well represented having 11 people on this tour.

GIVING PEAS A CHANCE IN MALAWI

Malawi is Africa's largest producer of pigeon peas. This versatile, low-cost, protein-rich and drought-resistant crop has been maligned in Malawi - regarded as 'desperation' food and only eaten when there is no alternative. But with the support of Christian Aid's local partner, one widowed grandmother is making her children's dreams come true with this humble pulse.

Esther Saizi is lively, chatty and full of laughter. When we first meet the 54-year old grandmother, she is baking bread with pigeon pea flour. She shows us the bread oven, opening the front door to reveal the rolls inside and the place where the firewood fits at the back.

But Esther's broad smile hides much sorrow and hardship. Two years ago, Esther's husband passed away and she struggled to come to terms with his loss.


On top of that, Esther lives in Malawi, one of the most climate-vulnerable countries in the world and smallholder farmers like her are on the frontline, beset by harsh drought and extreme weather.

Thankfully she was spared the worst effects of Cyclone Freddy, the longestlasting tropical cyclone on record, which devastated Malawi in February and March. However, just a year earlier, Cyclone Ana washed away many of Esther's crops, leaving her feeling desperate. Even the war thousands of miles away in

Ukraine impacts Esther, driving up the price of food and fertilizer.

Despite these difficulties, Esther has seen a remarkable reversal in her fortunes since 2019 when she joined a pigeon pea cooperative run by Christian Aid's local partner, the Nandolo Farmers' Association. Esther had been growing pigeon peas for eight years before joining the cooperative, but she'd never been able to secure a fair price for her crop. Exploitative middlemen target isolated farmers like her to gain a sale at very low prices. But when Esther started selling as part of the cooperative, she was connected to better buyers and was able to fetch much more. She is one of more than 3,300 farmers helped by the Nandolo Farmers' Association to get a better price for their crop.

Another benefit of Esther's membership of



the cooperative is that she is able to store her pigeon peas in a communal warehouse, safe from storms and floods. Instead of having to sell her crop immediately after harvest and accept a bad price, the store allows her to wait until prices have improved. The programme also helped Esther to restore her soil fertility and boost her harvests.

With the profits from her pigeon pea crop, Esther began buying goats and today her herd has grown to 13. The goats provide milk and meat to support her family as well as manure for her crops, which saves on expensive fertiliser. Esther even used her income to buy a sewing machine and now she makes clothes for her family. With the money she earns growing pigeon peas and selling bread made from pigeon pea flour, Esther is helping her elder daughter develop her carpentry business and supporting her younger daughter's education, hopeful that one day she will become a nurse. The money is also paying nursery school fees for her 4-year-old grandson.

Pigeon peas are drought-tolerant, so they thrive in the dry fields of southern Malawi. They're cheap to grow from recycled seed and require only minimal amounts of fertiliser and pesticides, making them an ideal crop to grow in a region where over

60% of families live in poverty. And because pigeon peas fix nitrogen, they improve soil quality, boosting the yields of crops like maize, sorghum and peanuts. The pigeon pea is an essential part of the diet of millions of people around the world, particularly in India where dhal is eaten as a staple alongside rice and roti. But the pigeon pea has been maligned in Malawi where it's regarded as 'desperation food', eaten only when there is no alternative. Just 10% of the 400,000 tonnes the country produces each year is consumed domestically. The Nandolo Farmers' Association has produced a recipe book in the hope of rebranding the pigeon pea as quality, healthy food.

Baking bread from pigeon pea flour is just one initiative Esther is involved in to support her family. Recently, Christian Aid provided a machine to process fish food from a blend of pigeon peas and soya, and this busy grandmother plans to start a fish farm, growing fish in small ponds and selling them to earn an additional income. This transformation in Esther's fortunes has only been possible because of the generosity of Christian Aid's supporters. By giving this Christian Aid Week at caweek. ie, you can help more farmers like Esther secure a fair price for their crops and make their children's dreams come true.

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
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
