A NOTE FROM THE BISHOP



A Message from the Bishop



Remembrance season is here once again and causes us to recall the service and sacrifice of soldiers, sailors and airmen from the two world wars of the last century and others who served in conflicts in more recent years. In Northern Ireland we also remember those who gave their lives defending our freedom during the period of what we call 'the troubles'. We are drawn especially on Remembrance Sunday to remember the devastating bomb at the Enniskillen War Memorial in 1987, with the loss of many members of the local community.

Times of war in the last century inspired many poets in the English language such as Rupert Brooke, Robert Graves and Wilfred Owen. Among these famous war poets writing of the First World War was army chaplain Geoffrey Studdert Kennedy.

streets and poverty. Geoffrey had grown up seeing the impact of poverty on local people. He followed his father and became a vicar in Leeds. When the First World War broke out, he believed it was a cause worth fighting for and so became an army chaplain and served at Flanders.

He experienced life on the front with the ordinary soldiers and felt that he should also share their hardships rather than getting special treatment. In the mud and blood of the Western Front, military chaplains sought to bring solace and hope. He was nicknamed "Woodbine Willie" during World War I for giving Woodbine cigarettes to the soldiers he met, as well as spiritual aid to injured and dying soldiers.

Woodbine Willie became more and more saddened by the horrors he saw during the War. His poetry shows that he was gradually convinced that all war was futile. He showed huge bravery and self-sacrifice, earning the Military Cross for helping wounded soldiers under enemy fire. He died in 1929 in Liverpool because of overwork and pneumonia. He was 45 years old.

When he died King George V sent a telegram of condolence. More than 1,700 people filed past his coffin in a single day as it lay in a Liverpool church. And, touchingly, former servicemen sent a wreath with a packet of Woodbines at its centre.

I was also struck by one of his poignant poems entitled: If ye forget which speaks of his experience of the weariness of war and the horrible cost in human life. It starkly tells why we must never forget the sacrifice of so many.

If Ye Forget

Let me forget - let me forget, I am weary of remembrance, And my brow is ever wet, With tears of my remembrance, With the tears and bloody sweat, -Let me forget.

If ye forget – If ye forget, Then your children must remember, And their brow be ever wet. With the tears of their remembrance, With the tears and bloody sweat, -If ye forget.

The poem speaks of him trying to forget

what he had witnessed in battle and pointing out that we must not allow the sacrifices of war to be forgotten by future generations.

In recent times we have been made all too aware that war seems ever present in our world. The war in Ukraine and conflict in the Middle East have been brutal and the horrors of these ongoing battles have filled the news agenda. The destruction, suffering and huge loss of life on both sides of those wars are almost incomprehensible and like Studdert Kennedy we too can become weary of remembering 'the tears and bloody sweat'.

The horror of war makes it so difficult for people of faith to know what to think and what to pray for, particularly in the political complexities of the conflict in the Middle East. The Archbishops of Armagh and Dublin have urged the people of the Church of Ireland to pray for peace in the Land of the Holy One and pray for wisdom for those in positions of authority to work towards an end to all violence. We uphold to God in praver all who are affected by the current conflict. All human life is the gift of God. The Church of Ireland, in its daily prayers, prays for people suffering in conflict, those who seek to bring care and relief, and the peace of the world.

So, as we enter a season when we give thanks to God for the sacrifice of so many who died to win our freedom, we couple it with our Christian compassion, as Studdert Kennedy showed, and offer our prayers for peace, asking the God who created all mankind to lead us in the ways of peace.

A Prayer for the Peace of the World – from the Book of Common Prayer

Almighty God, from whom all thoughts of truth and peace proceed; Kindle, we pray thee, in every heart the true love of peace; and guide with thy pure and peaceable wisdom those who take counsel for the nations of the earth; that in tranquillity thy kingdom may go forward, till the earth is filled with the knowledge of thy love; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.



From the Rector's Desk Just a little insignificant potato!

A short while ago I was driving some back roads in rural County Down, an area prolific in commercial potato growing. As I stopped at a road junction, I noticed lying at the side of the road one lone potato, I could only conclude that it had fallen of a trailer as it turned onto the main road. With all the traffic whizzing past, there it sat unharmed, small, dry, abandoned and seemingly so vulnerable. I think it took my attention

I think it took my attention because it seemed so out of place. It made me think about how we view apparently humble looking things, and how their worth / value is altered depending upon its surroundings and who is looking at it. If this little potato hadn't fallen out of the trailer it may well have ended up in a posh Belfast or London restaurant where it would have been transformed to accompany other high range produce on a fine china plate. Perhaps it might have been sold in a local shop, it's destination and recipient of much humbler origins. Or yet still, perhaps this little potato may have been used as a seed potato, the seed if you like, when placed back into the dark earth would reproduce many other potatoes and sprout glossy green leaves. Just for the record, I am not on commission from the Department of Agriculture to encourage you to eat more potatoes! Rather I simply want to challenge the way we view things, but most importantly the way we view people who at first sight may appear of humble or modest appearance. You see, Jesus, as he walked and preached, taught us the importance of the seemingly unimportant, isolated, discarded, unpopular. He looked at all such people with very different lens, when many passed them by – He saw them, remember the blind man calling out.

When many had thrown them away – He rediscovered their real worth, remember the woman at the well. When many wouldn't go near them – He embraced them – remember the ten lepers. Don't judge people by their outer appearance, be more like Jesus folks, and ask to see them through His eyes, because that's where the true beauty and potential lie. Every human being is made in God's image, don't discard or dismiss God's handiwork.

So, the next time you look at a humble little potato, may it remind you that to

the King of kings we looked small, diry, abandoned and vulnerable, yet He willingly paid the highest price possible to save us.

"For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith – and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God – not by works, so that no one can boast. For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do. Ephesians 2:8-10

The development of Harvest Thanksgiving Services

The Biblical writings proclaim the creative power and wisdom of God, revealed in the patterns of the natural world. It is therefore a natural instinct for worshipping communities to develop patterns of worship and prayer around the agricultural year and it is no surprise that several of the ancient Jewish festivals have agricultural roots. The Christian tradition, too, has incorporated, elements of the agricultural festivals. Much of this is bound up with the need to provide food to sustain human life, and the accompanying sense of a proper humility before God as source of

all things, gratitude for his goodness, and responsibility in stewarding the resources of the earth. In more recent years, urban congregations have explored ways of adapting traditional creation-based festivals for their own contexts. Harvest Thanksgiving is a more modern addition to the church calendar. Its origins are usually traced to the adaptation in 1843 of Lammas Day by the Revd R. S. Hawker, a Church of England priest in Cornwall. He chose the first Sunday in October as a Christian response to coincide with the traditional but largely secular 'harvest home' celebration. An annual church celebration of the harvest certainly established itself rapidly with great popularity and was first recognised officially in the Church of England in 1862 and from there it spread around the world. People decorated their places of worship to reflect the harvest and the glory of God's creation. In many places all of this is linked closely to a sense of wanting to share the goodness of the earth with those in need. In our parishes we link Harvest Thanksgiving with gifts for the local Food Bank and this is an out-working of the Biblical teachings of sharing God's abundance with those in need.

Second Sunday Services

The informal all-age worship continues each second Sunday of the month. On Sunday 8th September at Derryvullen North, there was a duet sung by Sharon Duncan and Carolyn Neville, accompanied by Rachel Giles on keyboard. The Scripture reader was Sandra Cashel and the collection was received by some of the younger members of the congregation. The fellowship continued in the hall over a very enjoyable cuppa. 

Cathedral 100 years old

The Parish Church of Enniskillen will celebrate its 100th anniversary as St Macartin's Cathedral in December 2023. To mark this special event a concert, presented by Mr Glenn Moore, organist and choirmaster, and the cathedral choir, will be held in the cathedral on the evening of Tuesday 12th December. This feature, and one to follow in next month's Magazine, will trace the history of Enniskillen Parish Church from its foundation until it was made a Cathedral in the Diocese of Clogher in 1923. In the Plantation of Ulster, Enniskillen was granted to William Cole in 1611. He had the responsibility of providing a church along with certain other obligations. Enniskillen Church was operational in the 1620s and subsequently became known as St Anne's Church. It was a much smaller building



and had a totally different layout from the cathedral. The entrance was from a porch facing Church Street. The pulpit and communion rail were on the south wall which faced a north transept. Mr Richard Pierce's drawing of the first church shows the layout of the building.

With the growing population of the town, it was found necessary to enlarge the church. This major project was initiated in 1839 with the new church being completed and consecrated for worship on 7th June 1842. Parts of the original church were incorporated into the new building, including the base of the tower and the south wall. The internal layout of the 1842 church differs from that of the cathedral. The choir stalls were within the nave and at right angles to the pews. The chancel was much smaller than that of the cathedral. The robing room did not exist. Next month's feature will deal with the decision to create a second cathedral in Clogher Diocese and the work involved in bringing St Macartin's up to cathedral standards.


We were really pleased that a series of seven lovely boards had been drawn and coloured by Norma and Paul Kerr to form a Harvest Competition.

I have read some of Catherine's books and have heard her speak a few times in St John's Hall and have been blessed by this lady and the way she speaks about how God has worked in her life.

At Christmas I was given this book as a present and I use it every day with other devotional books for my quiet time. I have found it very useful and I particularly like how clearly Catherine communicates in her writing and the examples that she uses, that we can all relate to.

One reflection that stands out to me is from Job chapters 1 & 2. The Bible tells us that Job was a righteous man who feared God. The devil wanted to test Job's faith by sending tragedy into his life. He lost everything including his animals, servants, children and almost his life. Eventually Job's wife told him to curse God and die, but through all of these hardships Job held onto his faith and did not blame God. Catherine was trying to say that, no matter what we are going through in our lives, God is always with us and we should hold onto our faith. Job may have questioned God as to why these things happened but he never lost his faith in the God whom he followed.

When life is hard and we sometimes can't see anything good coming from it we must remember that God is with us and He will bless us and give us the strength we need to trust that He knows best.

Every day when I read the scripture for the day and reflect on Catherine's comments, I find myself asking "what does this mean for my walk with God?" and "am I giving God full control of my life?" 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God's Peace

Now the peace of God be with you all Amen. Romans 15:23

As Your Word says, Lord, "How good and pleasant it is" when people live together in unity (Psalm 133:1)—how refreshing and how cleansing. And how much sadness and suffering results when a nation and a people are divided. As we approach Remembrance Sunday when a twominute silence is observed and dedicated to those soldiers who died fighting to protect the nation. As Remembrance Day approaches, take the time to centre yourself and pay your respects to the

veterans we celebrate. Although our gratitude may seem minuscule compared to what our soldiers sacrifice, gratitude is what we can give them. Gratefulness extends beyond the concept of "Thank you for your service." Be grateful for their service, yes. But be grateful for everything their service did and does for us. The silence is observed as a tribute to the sacrifices the armed forces made to defend freedom and for us to be forever thankful for the peace we now have in our land as a result of their great sacrifice. I'm sure you want the Lord to manifest Himself as the God of peace when you are fearful. So let's go deeper into what the "God of peace" means. Don't forget

that Paul was Jewish, so when he said "the God of peace be with you," he was saying "Jehovah Shalom be with you." "Jehovah Shalom" is Hebrew for "the God of peace." Now, the first appearance of the name Jehovah Shalom is in the Old Testament story of Gideon in Judges 6. As we read Gideon's story, we discover that the Midianites terrorised Israel day and night, descending upon them like a swarm of marauding locusts and destroying their crops and pillaging their livestock. Fearful of their cruel enemies, the Israelites hid in dens and caves in the mountains. It is no wonder Gideon was petrified and hid himself at the bottom of an abandoned winepress to thresh



the measly stalks of dry grain he had somehow managed to scavenge. He was bound by fear and overcome by all the news of terror that surrounded him. In the midst of Gideon's fear, "the Angel of the LORD appeared to him, and said to him, 'The LORD is with you, you mighty man of valour!'" (Judges 6:12).

When you find the expression "the Angel of the LORD" in the Old Testament, it usually refers to our Lord Jesus in His preincarnate state. Jesus Himself appeared to Gideon when he was in the pit of fear and called him a mighty man of valour. Isn't that amazing?

Are there moments when you feel besieged by fear? When you hear reports of terror or exposure to some virus, do you feel fearful and anxious? Has fear driven you into hiding? The truth is, regardless of how you feel, when our Lord Jesus looks at you right now, He sees you as a mighty man or mighty woman of courage.

Isn't it amazing how our Lord looks at us?

It's not how we see ourselves that defines us; it is how our Lord Jesus sees us that defines us. That's why we read His Word. We read it to discover what His Word says about us. My friend, no matter what state you are in right now and how messed up your life might be, the Lord Jesus sees the best in you.

He sees your potential, your gifting, your call, and your destiny to do great things in this life! And as the ending of Gideon's story shows, He will guide you and cause you to be a testimony of His protection as you trust in Him and see yourself and your situations through His eyes.


Notes from the Rectory

I'm from a big, chatty, noisy family. I'm one of five children, and we grew up on top of each other. I have a somewhat introverted side though, and when it all got too much, I'd sneak off to my bedroom to play with my toy horses, draw pictures or read books. However, I always loved having my siblings around, and as I've grown older I've only grown to appreciate them more. My elder brother gives great financial advice. My little sister's very funny, and a great listener. My twin brother is kind and caring and could probably deliver a passable lecture on any topic.

In my parish ministry I've encountered several 'solo Christians'. These are people who have a real, living faith, but for

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whatever reason have chosen to bypass the mainstream church. Often, their formative encounter with the Christian faith came from outside of the church, and post-conversion, they found adapting to denominational norms a challenge. Often this is framed in spiritual language – they receive their insights 'directly from God', without the need for external moderation. They are 'free'. Their beliefs are seen as superior to those received and upheld through centuries of theological conversation within the Church. The beliefs passed down from the church are seen as controlling, limiting, centred around human wisdom.

And yet all these individuals who have received their faith 'direct from the source' have beliefs that vary wildly from oneanother. One claims that the Lord has imparted special wisdom to them, which does away with hell and the existence of the demonic, while another claims to have been granted visions into the very chasm of hell.

Of course, I'm sure medical types have their notebooks ready to offer a diagnosis of various psychoses, but I'd rather take a more spiritual route. Our relationship with God is predicated upon his selfrevelation, the idea that he has chosen to show us who he is, whether through an audible voice, a passage of Scripture, or the wonder of a star-spangled sky. The Bible is clear that we can expect God to reveal himself, and in the New Testament this promise of God's self-revelation is

opened to all believers. But the Bible also clearly emphasises the corporate nature of worship, teaching, study and prayer. Our experience of God is moderated and contextualised through our relationship with other believers. They understand things about him that we don't, while we may have insights that they don't. Libraries are filled with the voices of Christians through the ages, sharing with others what they have glimpsed of God. The Church at its best is a babble of discussion, the noisy family who enjoy heated dinner-table discussions, where grandfathers debate with 10-year-olds, and conversations can end with a humble 'perhaps you're right', or a friendly slap on the back and a 'we can agree to differ'. Sure, if it all gets too much, feel free to step away and seek God's presence in the quiet, but make sure you come back with what you've learnt. You wouldn't want to miss the party.


Flower Arranging

Being prepared for the place of enduring peace

Since our last Diocesan magasine hit the pews, the war between Russia and Ukraine has been eclipsed (yet not forgotten) by the new and intense conflict between Israel and Palestine. As we move towards Remembrance Sunday and endeavour to remember the cost of lives lost in the pursuit of freedom alongside lives lost in senseless acts of violence we could be forgiven for asking the question, "What has humanity learnt from all of those past conflicts that is demonstrated in a more learned approach to conflict resolution?" We are probably familiar with Jesus instructions and teaching in Matthew 24 that was given to provide

some kind of meaningful help to his disciples concerning the timing of his return and when the end of the age will be. To the questioning disciples Jesus states, "And you will hear of wars and rumours of wars. See that you are not troubled; for all these things must come to pass, but the end is not yet. For nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom. And there will be famines, pestilences, and earthquakes in various places. All these are the beginning of sorrows." We are certainly witnessing much sorrow in our present world. We are also witnessing a sharp rise in broader international conflict. In the world's present condition, not forgetting that we are moving

along that timeline that leads towards the return of Jesus, we may be blessed to experience a kind of relative peace, for a time, but according to Jesus the direction of travel is towards greater conflict. Around Remembrance Sunday we remember loved ones lost and celebrate the freedoms that their lives paid for and gifted us, but this year we will be only too aware that peace can be extinguished and forfeit in an instant. When war rises up again perhaps so should our vision and longing for that ultimate peace that will come when Jesus returns and when all that is wrong is put right. Many of us enjoy, at best, a relative peace now, but a time is coming when all

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that stands against peace will be dealt with and peace will reign as God's kingdom fully comes. Perhaps at a time like this we may be encouraged to remember and focus on and begin to value much, much more the place that is being prepared for God's people in his kingdom; a place where all tears and sorrow and suffering will be no more but rather where wholeness and healing and peace and reconciliation will permeated the climate all around. We are strangers in a strange land and although we may have anchored down and made our home here, maybe now we would do well to hold more loosely to the things of this world and have our sights more fully focused on God's eternal kingdom. Might we just do well to make sure that when time comes, we will have made the most important decision of all, the decision to say yes to Jesus, accepting his gracious rescue and be able to enter into that place of everlasting peace, where moth nor thief, nor bomb, nor bullet can touch us but where we will be enveloped in the love of our Father in heaven and truly at peace at last.

joints. season the flour with salt and pepper, coat each piece of rabbit in it. Melt the fat, put in the floured rabbit, fry lightly, then pour in enough hot water or hot stock to cover. Bring to the boil, then lower the heat and simmer for one hour. Put in the vegetables, thinly slice and cook again for 30 minutes. Small dumplings may be made and served with the dish as an accompaniment.

DIOCESAN NEWS Right Rev Dr. Gordon McMullan fondly remembered in Clogher Diocese


The Bishop of Clogher, Right Revd Dr. Ian Ellis, was among church leaders to pay tribute to one of his predecessors, Right Revd Dr. Gordon McMullan, who died on 15 October aged 89. He had served as Bishop of Clogher from 1980 to 1986 and as Bishop of Down and Dromore from 1986 to 1997.

The Bishop of Clogher, the Right Revd Dr lan Ellis stated; "Bishop Gordon McMullan is remembered fondly here in Clogher Diocese. He was a very pastoral bishop who was across the detail of diocesan life and kept an attentive watch over the flock in his care. His deep interest in learning meant he gave considerable time to young people and education in this diocese. "We offer our sincere condolences and the assurance of our prayers to his children and the wider family circle at this time of loss."

Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland, the Most Revd John McDowell who served as Bishop of Clogher from 2011 to 2020 said; "Bishop Gordon McMullan was a conscientious pastoral bishop with a lifelong love for learning and scholarship, each aspect of his ministry enlivening and informing the other. Gordon was my sponsoring bishop when I went forward for selection for ordained ministry, and I will never forget the quietly searching interviews that I had with him before being sent off to the Selection Conference. "When I first went to live in the Diocese of Clogher, following my election as bishop, one very experienced clergyman who had served with Gordon, when he was bishop there, told me: 'Bishop McMullan, he could see round corners', meaning he had the gifts of wisdom and foresight which allowed him to be well-prepared for what was experienced by those around him as an unforeseen crisis.

"Gordon had a cool and measured intelligence and an insatiable curiosity about the spiritual life as well as the realities of life around him. He never forgot his roots in working class Belfast. He understood the people he ministered to whether in St Brendan's, Sydenham, leafy Knock, or rural Fermanagh and Monaghan. His scholarship helped him understand more deeply the great movements and

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upheavals of life in the twentieth century, but his trust was always in the Lord of History, who Himself had hurried on events on a world scale.

"He had a deep sense of the distinctive role which the Church of Ireland could play in the religious and civic life, particularly of Northern Ireland, and never tired of proving good relationships and a sense of hope. "My thoughts and prayers are with Gordon's sons, Philip and Stephen, as they mourn the loss of a wise and caring father and grandfather, just as we in the Church of Ireland mourn the loss of a great bishop." The Archbishop of Dublin and Bishop of Glendalough, the Most Revd Dr Michael Jackson, who was Bishop of Clogher from 2002 to 2011 also paid tribute; "Having lived in Clogher Diocese when Bishop Gordon McMullan was bishop, I remember with affection his own care for the people of the diocese in what were troubled times. He is remembered for facilitating an administrative structure for the diocese that stood the test of time and enabled both parishes and the diocese itself to flourish with calm confidence. His untiring work ethic and attention to detail ran hand-inhand with his commitment to learning and the education of others. It was an honour and a pleasure some years later to succeed him as bishop.

Bishop Robin Eames, who was Bishop of Down and Dromore (from 1980 to 1986) and subsequently Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland (from 1986 to 2006):

"I am very saddened to learn of the passing of Bishop Gordon McMullan and express my deepest sympathy to the members of his family.


"As a colleague for many years, I saw at first hand his devoted pastoral ministry firstly as a parish priest and then as a bishop in Clogher Diocese and then in Down and Dromore during years of suffering and violence for the community. His gifts of pastoral compassion for so many people will be long remembered. In particular I recall his support and care for clergy in those years.

The Right Revd Dr Gordon McMullan was born in 1934 and grew up in the parish of Willowfield, in East Belfast, and worked in the aircraft manufacturing and petroleum industries prior to his ordination in 1962. He initially served as Curate and Rector of parishes in the Belfast area and was Archdeacon of Down before being elected Bishop of Clogher in June 1980. He was elected as Bishop of Clogher in June 1980, and was consecrated in St Patrick's Cathedral, Armagh, in September of that year on the same day as Bishop James Mehaffey as Bishop of Derry and Raphoe. Bishop McMullan was subsequently elected as Bishop of Down and Dromore in March 1986. He was deeply involved in cross-community bridge-building and mutual understanding, pastoral care, and active concern for the unemployed and people living in areas of social and economic disadvantage. He retired in 1997. He was predeceased by his wife, Kathleen, in 2006 and is survived by their two sons, Philip and Stephen. He was an accomplished author on Christian discipleship whose publications included A Cross and Beyond, We are Called ..., Everyday Discipleship, Growing Together in Prayer, and reflections on the gospels of Mark and Luke. Bishop McMullan always kept in touch with events in Clogher Diocese and was a postal subscriber of the Clogher Diocesan

Magazine since leaving the diocese.

Archdeacon of Clogher actively involved in diocesan work



The new Archdeacon of Clogher is the Venerable Canon Paul Thompson (pictured left), Rector of the parishes of Derryvullen North, Irvinestown and Castle Archdale. The announcement was made at the Diocesan Synod by the Bishop of Clogher, the Right Revd Dr. Ian Ellis. He succeeds Archdeacon Brian Harper, who moved to Connor Diocese to be Rector of Dunluce Parish in August.

Bishop Ellis described Canon Paul as having gifts of administration and pastoral care and is a much-respected Rector in his parishes of Derryvullen North and Castle Archdale. Archdeacon Thompson is currently the Warden of Readers and Support officer for Lay Ministry. He is also a member of Diocesan Council, a Diocesan Nominator and as Prebendary of Donaghmore, is the Diocesan Representative Canon to the National Cathedral of St. Patrick, Dublin. He is also a Clogher representative on the RCB and on the Church of Ireland Safeguarding Board.

Archdeacon Thompson serviced in parish ministry in the Dioceses of Down and

Dromore and Connor before moved to England where he served as a Prison Chaplain in the Church of England for 18 years before his appointment to Derryvullen North and Castle Archdale in 2017. Working closely now with Bishop Ian, both of them know each other well, having trained together for ministry in Theological College.

The new Archdeacon received warm applause from the Synod members and thanking the Bishop for his words, said he felt nervous approaching the role but pleased to share in this ministry as he finds out more about it.

"It is a pleasure and an honour in the present day to continue ministry in the parishes and wider diocese," he said. He said he has discovered that he is not the first Archdeacon of Clogher from his parishes Derryvullen North. The first from the parish to hold that title died in 1441. Archdeacon Thompson and his wife, Lorraine, have two sons, Hugh and Oliver who live in Dorset and Hampshire in England.

During His earthly ministry Jesus frequently used parables to teach his listeners about the Kingdom of God. RCB Roadshow proved beneficial for parish officers

A RCB roadshow for clergy and parish officers in Clogher Diocese, took place in Lisbellaw Parish Centre on 11 October. Staff from the Representative Church Body at Church House, Dublin, gave presentations on finance, charities and compliance and property issues during a very informative evening.

There was a good attendance from across the Diocese.

Following the opening by the Bishop of Clogher, Right Revd Dr. Ian Ellis, the main presentation on finance was given by Kate Williams, RCB's Head of Finance, who outlined trustee responsibilities, how the RCB can support them, explained the rules of the Charities Acts and Revenue rules, thresholds for NI, how to set out Receipts and Payments and Accrual accounts, explained restricted and unrestricted funds, Assets and Liabilities and Balance Sheets, accounting for church property and parish investments.

Kate encouraged the diocese to support the formation of local treasurer networks to share learnings and for Select Vestries to set up a parish email address for communicating with the charity bodies and the RCB so that when the personnel changed, the email address remained the same.

Janet Maxwell, Head of Synod Services and Communications, gave an overview of the charities legislation and said the charity regulator empowered churches to think about tomorrow.

Pauline High, Head of Property, gave a presentation on the practicalities of administrating property in parishes and explained how some property from parishes was vested in the RCB. She said the RCB were the legal owners of church property vested in it and that this property was held in trust for the benefit of the parish. She said the RCB need to know what major works are proposed in parishes. The approval process is first discussed at Vestry, then taken to Diocesan Council via the

Glebes Committee, then to RCB Property Committee and finally the Executive Committee.

If parishes were considering selling property, there needs to be a resolution from the Vestry first before going to Diocesan Council for approval to sell, with two independent valuations and confirmation of title.

The RCB manage over 20,000 trusts which could be bequest money from sales of property. Eighty per cent is held in trust by parishes or groups and 20 per cent of sales of church buildings go to the Church Fabric Fund.

To refurbish church property, there must

be full approval before beginning as well as the engagement of suitable qualified consultants with proof how it will be funded. Any contracts are between the RCB and the contractor.

Pauline also itemised what parishes needed to seek advice from the RCB for, such as removal of trees reordering of churches, graveyard improvements, church plate and telecommunications where a mast might be sought for a church tower.

There are a range of grants available; Church Fabric and Development Fund, Marshall Bereford Fund, National Lottery, National Churches Trust, Benefact Trust and well as local council initiatives.

Bishop of Clogher's statement on explosion at Gaza hospital

As the conflict between Israel and Hamas continues, there was condemnation of the explosion at the Al Ahli Anglican Episcopal Hospital in Gaza. The Bishop of Clogher, Right Revd Dr Ian Ellis. in a statement said; "Members of the Diocese will remember the link Clogher Diocese had with the Al Ahli Hospital during the episcopacy of Bishop Michael Jackson (now Archbishop of Dublin). In 2009/10 the diocese responded to an appeal from the Archbishop of Jerusalem for help and support for the hospital as it dealt with demands upon it due to the conflict at that time. "In addition, several Diocesan Pilgrimages to the Holy Land brought a large group of parishioners from the diocese to experience being in the land of our Lord's birth and ministry. They gained an insight into the complexities of the political situation in that land and the lived suffering and danger experienced by both the people of Israel and Palestine.

"Many of us in Clogher Diocese can therefore identify with the suffering and death of those caught up in this explosion at the Al Ahli Hospital, and in the wider region. We assure Archbishop of Jerusalem, Most Revd Hosam Naoum, of the thoughts and prayers of the clergy and people of Clogher diocese and for all people in the land of the Holy One at this most terrifying time.

"We share the statement issued today by Archbishop Jackson who retains close contact with the hospital and join our prayers with others from the wider Church of Ireland and the Anglican Communion."

Diocese examines social issues

A series of talks on topical issues affecting people in society took place in the Cathedral Hall, Enniskillen recently hosted by CARE, Christian Action Research and Education.

The talks on "Cost of Living Crisis," "Abortion in Northern Ireland – the Story so Far," and "Tackling Northern Ireland's Gambling Addiction" were organised by the Clogher Diocesan Board for Social Theology in Action and involved Ian Bingham, Head of CARE in Northern Ireland.

lan, a former teacher, was joined for the talk on gambling addiction by Tim Cairns, Senior Policy Officer, CARE.

Ian firstly explained the background to the charity which was established 40 years ago and operates across the UK.

He said they wanted to engage the church and equip politicians and empower future leaders.

CARE watch out for new government policies and then reach out to politicians with a response to give a Christian voice. In the first talk on the Cost of Living Crisis, Ian said some families have been making a choice between either heating or eating. He illustrated how the high costs of school uniforms, for example were causing real concern for some families and now parents worry more about the summer school holidays than Christmas in terms of costs. The reasons have been the high costs of fuel, energy and running a home but yet wages have largely stayed the same. Food banks have become lifelines for some of these families and that reliance is increasing. The Trussell Trust, which overseas a large number of food banks across all regions of the UK allocated almost three million food parcels.

He said the catalyst for this increasing cost of living was the Covid-19 pandemic. There was a shortage of electronic chips which are required in many machines from cars to appliances and when demand rose again

after lockdown, there was not enough to meet demand. There were also supply chain issues, such as global food shortages, evidenced by empty supermarket shelves and a global energy crisis because of high fuel costs. The Russian invasion of Ukraine was another factor and the rises of inflation hitting 11 per cent. The increase in interest rates resulted in higher mortgage and rent costs.

"All of this has been creating a perform story where families are struggling," said lan. He also said it has been found that underachievement at school is linked to poorer families, the so called poverty gap. These were people who were more likely to become ill.

This also leads to a deterioration in mental health.

Asking if there is a Biblical response, Ian said God has a heart for the marginalised and quoted passages from Deutoronomy, Leviticus, Isaiah, Matthew and Acts. He said CARE's position was to try and enact change in policies at Stormont and other political institutions in the UK, they were examining how the school uniform problem could become more affordable, tacking educational underachievement and raising the child benefit gap. They also signpost clients to other organisations such as "Care for the Family," "Christians Against Poverty (CAP)", the "Trussell Trust Foodbanks," "Your Local Pantry," "Aspire NI"

and "Citizens' Advice."

He said in terms of churches, he wondered if they could support more local charities rather than giving all their donations to worldwide causes.

In the second talk of the series on Abortion in NI – the Story so far, Ian gave the background in Northern Ireland to the legislation now which forms the most liberal laws in the UK and Europe.

In October 2020, the Abortion(NI) Regulations came into effect which he described as dark day in the history of the province. This allows for abortions permitted up to 12 weeks for any reason, up to 24 weeks where continuing the pregnancy would risk injury physically or mentally, abortions permitted to full term for cases of severe fetal impairment such as Down's Syndrome and for cases of severe fetal abnormalities if there is risk of grave injury by continuing the pregnancy.

He quoted several Biblical phrases. He said people could pray and contact their MLAs, MPs and ask how they voted.

In the final talk on gambling addiction, lan said this was a massive issue. He noted how this has shifted to become online 24 hours a day using just a credit card.

He said gambling in Great Britain was worth £14.1 bn with just under half coming from online betting. There is one suicide each day linked to gambling but in Northern Ireland there is no legislation or reviews.

Parish representatives applaud new Archdeacon announced at Diocesan Synod

This year's Clogher Diocesan Synod in St. Macartin's Cathedral Hall, Enniskillen, brought members together from across the diocese on Thursday, 28 September. The Synod began with a Service of Holy Communion in St. Macartin's Cathedral where the celebrant was the Bishop of Clogher, Right Revd Dr. Ian Ellis. The Old Testament, Epistle and Gospel readings were by Monsignor Peter O'Reilly, representing the Holy Catholic Church; Revd Gunther Andrich, from the Presbyterian Church and Revd Ian Cruickshank, Rector of Carrickmacross Union, Magheracloone and Ardragh. The intercessions were led by Revd Canon Jennifer McWhirter, Rector of Cleenish and Mullaghdun.

At the Synod meeting afterwards, the Bishop appointed Right Hon. Lord Stephens of Creevyloughgare as his Assessor. Following a Scripture reading by Mr. Michael Skuce MBE and prayers by Revd Alison Irvine, Diocesan Curate, the Presidential address was given by the Bishop. The main part of his address was printed in the September Diocesan Magazine.

In his address, the Bishop announced that Canon Paul Thompson, Rector of Derryvullen North, Irvinestown and Castle Archdale would be his new Archdeacon. He succeeds Archdeacon Brian Harper, who moved to Connor Diocese to be Rector of Dunluce Parish in August.

Bishop Ellis described Canon Paul as having gifts of administration and pastoral care and was a much-respected Rector in his parishes of Derryvullen North and Castle Archdale.

"Within the diocese he is currently our Warden of Readers and Support officer for Lay Ministry. He is a member of Diocesan Council, a Diocesan Nominator

The 152nd report of the Diocesan Council was proposed by Revd Canon Alan Irwin, seconded by Mrs Ethne McCord; the Clogher Diocesan Board of Religious Education proposed by Miss Joyce Clingen and seconded by Miss Frances Boyd; the Clogher Board of Mission proposed by Revd William Jeffrey seconded by Miss Joyce Clingen; Clogher Diocesan Board of Society Theology in Action proposed by Revd Charlie Eames, second by Mr. Neville Armstrong; Ministry of Healing presented by Revd Canon John McClenaghan and Mrs Eileen Cutler and **Clogher Diocesan Glebes Committee** proposed by Mr. Henry Robinson seconded by Revd Canon John Woods. Pioneer Ministry initiative was presented by Revd Rob Jones, Director. He said this initiative was aimed at reaching people that the normal church was not able to do. He said the aim was to "reach those with little or no connection to church" in fresh and innovative ways.

This will be done through the establishment of pioneer leadership teams and a council and creating Pioneer Ministry hubs.

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Archbishop Justin Welby addresses MindMatters conference in Dublin

The first phase of the Church of Ireland project, MindMatters, to promote mental health awareness concluded with a conference in Dublin on Friday, 20 October. This marked the completion of the threeyear initiative to respond to the mental health needs of communities across Ireland. Such was the demand from people across all dioceses to attend the Conference in the Radison Hotel, Golden Lane, Dublin that a waiting list was compiled.

The project received a significant grant from the Benefact Trust supported by the RCB and House of Bishops.

The keynote speaker at the conference was the Most Revd Justin Welby, Archbishop of Canterbury, who took as his theme, Faith and Mental Health.

Due to an impromptu pastoral visit to Israel following the Israel-Hamas war, the Archbishop was unable to attend in person but gave his presentation via a live video link from Jerusalem.

Archbishop Welby gave his own personal account of being affected with depression. "A few years ago, I realised I was feeling different. I had experienced bouts of what I might now recognise as depression before. Sometimes I felt absolutely awful, even though everything was, objectively, fine. But these feelings always seemed to pass, and I did not feel the need to talk to anybody or do anything about it. This, though, was different. I felt utterly hopeless.

"It was my daughter who helped me – she has been incredibly open about her own experiences with mental health and her experiences of depression and suicidal ideation. And she helped me to see that there was nothing to be ashamed of, and getting help was the right thing to do. So, I began taking antidepressants – which I still take – and talking to someone.

"I 'announced' the fact that I was suffering with depression on BBC Radio 4's Thought For The Day. Most people think just telling their families over dinner is enough, but I thought I would go all out. It was the same day we were hosting a mental health conference at Lambeth Palace in London. And it got me thinking about how the Church has historically dealt with mental health issues – and the answer, we all know, is not necessarily very well.

"A 2022 study of mental health disorders in the Republic of Ireland found that 42.5% of people met the criteria for a mental health disorder. 11.1% had a lifetime history of attempted suicide, more than one in 10

people. According to data from the Central Statistics Office, which The Samaritans published in 2022, there were 11 deaths by suicide per hundred thousand individuals per year in the Republic of Ireland. For men, it was 17.6 per one hundred thousand. "We are encountering novelty, uncertainty, and uncontrollability in new ways," he said referring to global politics and conflicts and the climate crisis.

"The threats and dangers we must live with are hugely different. They are less acute, but they procure the same biological response that makes us feel as though we are on the edge. Such extended periods of high stress are extremely demanding on our physical and mental health, so it is no wonder we are seeing people suffering from burnout, chronic stress, and exhaustion, as well as more serious mental health issues. "And that's as true in the Church as it is in any other sector. Clergy are present with people during the most stressful and painful periods of their lives. The emotional burden is heavy – it is the greatest privilege of my life, but it takes its toll without adequate support and self-care.

"We must reduce the stigma of mental health issues. It's gotten better, there's no doubt about that, but it still exists. We start with our willingness to talk about it, to share our experiences.

"In churches, one of the ways we find that community is in small groups that meet and share.

"But, of course, faith can also be a great support in times of mental health difficulty. I've heard of sharing groups being set up particularly to talk about living with mental illness," he said.

The next phase of the project will prioritise four areas, primarily through training and awareness-raising activities. These are: Promoting connections, Reducing stigma, exploring the role of clergy and the supports and training that would be useful for them and exploring the role of faith in promoting positive mental health.
