A NOTE FROM THE BISHOP



A Message from the Bishop

'GOOD KING WENCESLAS'

A few years ago, at the beginning of December, Heather and I were able to visit Prague in the Czech Republic. This central European country was formerly known as Bohemia and was once a province in the Habsburgs' Austrian Empire. It is a fascinating city with a rich history and many beautiful buildings and squares. At this time of year, it holds a large Christmas market and has many other attractions for visitors such as Prague Castle which also comprises St Vitus Cathedral. Within this stunning church is the St Wenceslas Chapel in which the remains of the patron saint of the Czech Republic are buried.

Wenceslas (Václav in Czech) served as duke of Bohemia from 921AD until his death probably in 929AD. Though he died young, this martyr's accomplishments were many. He built numerous churches in Bohemia and was deeply respected as a pious, moral, educated, and intelligent man who promoted the Christian faith and took care of the poor, the sick, the widowed, and the orphaned by doing charitable deeds. From 985AD his feast day (28th September) is known to have been observed in Bohemia whose patron he became.

NATIVITY SCENE

On our visit to the Cathedral, we also came across a most unusual display - an amazing outdoor nativity scene of full-size figures made of straw. It made a stunning depiction of the Christmas story of the birth of Jesus told using the straw of the cattle shed.

Visiting the Cathedral with this Nativity scene got me thinking of a carol sometimes sung at Christmas time. "Good King Wenceslas" it seems was written in 1853, by JM Neale, inspired by Wenceslas' image as a righteous king. It is entirely imaginary but based on the lyric of a Czech poem and legend of Wenceslas. The Rt Revd Dr Ian Ellis

Good King Wenceslas looked out On the Feast of Stephen When the snow lay round about Deep and crisp and even Brightly shone the moon that night Though the frost was cruel When a poor man came in sight Gathering winter fuel.

THE BLESSING OF GIVING

It tells a story of a Bohemian king who goes on a journey, braving harsh winter weather, to give alms to a poor peasant on the Feast of Stephen (December 26, the Second Day of Christmas). During the journey, his page is about to give up the struggle against the cold weather but is enabled to continue by following the king's footprints, step for step, through the deep snow. The last verse of the carol points to its key lesson:

In his masters step he trod Where the snow lay dinted Heat was in the very sod Which the Saint had printed Therefore, Christian men, be sure Wealth or rank possessing Ye, who now will bless the poor Shall yourselves find blessing.

The carol is reminding us that the spirit of giving at Christmas should not happen just on that day but every day. As we follow the footsteps of our Master Christ Jesus and reach out to the poor and needy in our own community and across the world, we too will be blessed. Remember our Lord's words to his disciples: 'Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me.' Matthew 25:40.

BISHOPS' APPEAL

As we look around our world there is so much need for us to respond to with the

Christian spirit of giving. Traditionally at this time we are reminded of the work of Bishops' Appeal. which is the Church of Ireland's World Aid and Development Programme.

We have just been informed that Bishops' Appeal has allocated €10,000 (equivalent to £8,650) in emergency funds to the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem. The Diocese includes 7,000 Anglicans worshipping within 28 congregations in Israel, Palestine, Lebanon, Syria, and Jordan. The Diocese runs Al Ahli Arab Hospital in Gaza which provides medical care and support to all people, regardless of their faith or ethnicity. This is the hospital that suffered such devastating damage on the evening of 17th October.

This release of emergency humanitarian funds accompanied the call from Archbishop John McDowell and Archbishop Michael Jackson asking all members of the Church of Ireland to pray for peace in the Holy Land, following the outbreak of conflict in the region. By our prayers and gifts, we can each in a small way bring the love of Christ to a needy world. Jewels Women's Group had a lovely, relaxed evening doing some "Art from the heart" painting projects with an autumn theme. The evening started with lots of chatter and soon became a very quiet class as people quietly painted some amazing work ...it was truly lovely and finished all too soon. There were treats and little inspirational notes to ponder on and it all added up to a great evening.

Remembrance Day

This year, as part of our Remembrance Day commemorations, we focused on those involved in the Far East campaign during the Second World War. Despite the role it played in shaping history, the Far East campaign became known as "the Forgotten War."

Involved in "the Forgotten War" was Mary Cooper who served from 1919 – 1946 as a military nurse. She lived with her family lived in Magheross, Carrickmacross. Educated at Magheross National School and Viscount Weymouth Grammar School in Carrickmacross. Patrick Cooper, her father, was a veterinary surgeon with a practice in the town. Sister Mary Cooper, a nurse with Queen Alexandra's Imperial Military Nursing Service, was evacuated during the 'fall of Singapore' in 1942. She died in a Japanese prison camp from the combined effects of starvation, brutality and tropical diseases. She continued to nurse her fellow prisoners during captivity. Mary was one of 650 Irish citizens serving with the British armed forces who became prisoners of the Imperial Japanese Army in 1942, known as Far East Prisoners of War or FEPOW. Mary is buried in Jakarta War Cemetery, Indonesia; only her name was added to the family grave in St Finbar's Church of Ireland graveyard. Her



name is also engraved on a stone plaque in the church commemorating those from the parish who gave their lives in service during the Great Wars.

As well as remembering conflict in the past, we normally pray for parts of the world where the tragedy of war continues and rightly the Ukraine, Gaza and Israel would have been remembered. However over the past few weeks, I have received emails from a charity I support asking for

prayer. Here is part of the email. Two years ago, when Myanmar erupted in violence, many of you joined us in prayer and sent donations to provide thousands of food parcels to families on the brink of starvation. However, since that time, Myanmar and the plight of its people have slipped out of the news and been forgotten by the world. I'm heartbroken to share that the situation has only become more desperate. The brutality,

trauma and fear that has gripped the country is unfathomable and it is for this reason, I am once again asking you to join us in prayer for Myanmar. Our children and staff are living with the constant threat of violence, particularly in the north of the country. We thank God for His continued protection over our staff and children throughout the fighting which can break out at any time, even outside our homes and schools causing our children to have to shelter under their beds or desks. Not only is it dangerous in the towns where we work, but whole villages in the surrounding areas have

been set ablaze. It seems, that as places affected by war 80 years ago were forgotten at the time, so today, Myanmar, which was previously known as Burma, involved in Far East Campaign during WW2 has been overlooked again. We decided in our moment of commemoration to especially remember Mary Cooper and the people of Myanmar.

From the Rector's Desk

Everyone needs an angle grinder – don't they!

I was walking through LidI recently, and I happened to stray into that dreaded middle isle, you know the one, it has all the things that you begin to believe that you couldn't live without, and even worse, if you don't buy it now you might miss out! Among all the treasures I spotted an angle grinder, if you know me at all, you will know that I love gadgets, however, even I, the 'Gadget Queen,' knew that I really didn't need an angle grinder – but it didn't stop me from standing there for a wee minute pondering what I might do with one if I had it!

It really is so easy to get caught up in what the advertisers tell us we need – even an angle grinder! As you read this, we are now officially commencing the free fall to Christmas. Advertising is in overdrive, and the children are counting the days left of school and the number of sleeps until the big guy arrives. I wonder how often you find yourself looking at things, or even buying them, that if you were honest, you no more need than the man on the moon. Or maybe you buy things/ stuff, for others, your children, your grandchildren, yet in your heart of hearts you know that they don't need it.

In a season which is flooded with gifts and stuff, we are so easily distracted and perhaps even coxed into things which are no good for us. Jesus was and is, the best gift any of us have ever been offered, and yet this wonderful life transforming gift from God is so often ignored, belittled and dismissed as irrelevant and



discarded after 25 December. When Jesus was born in Bethlehem, he wasn't what the people at that time wanted, he wasn't a strong military type who was instantly going to liberate God's people with might and power. Rather, he came as a vulnerable baby, in very humble circumstances, Jesus wasn't what the people wanted, but he was what they needed – their Saviour.

This Advent season, as your senses and your bank account are bombarded with all the things that the advertisers tell you that you need to make this Christmas special, I hope that you pause, and use this season of preparation for exactly that, you prepare. I know the house, the food, the presents etc all shout for your attention, but what your heart really needs is time with your Saviour. To clear the decks of all the 'stuff' which the world says we need the 'angle grinders' of this life. To discover anew the true wonder and joy of the gift of His coming, and His amazing grace and mercy as you daily place your hand in His. May your eyes be fixed on true King of Christmas.



Christmas Activities



Winter Reflection

Winter is a season that speaks of both physical and spiritual realities. It reminds us of the cycles of life and the temporary nature of our earthly existence. In the cold and stillness of winter, we find strength in the promises of God's Word.

Ecclesiastes 3:1-2 tells us, "For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven: a time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted." Winter serves as a reminder that there are seasons of dormancy and waiting, but they are purposeful in God's grand design. Psalm 46:10 encourages us to "Be still, and know that I am God." In the quietude of winter, we are invited to draw near to God, to listen to His voice, and to find rest in His presence.

Isaiah 1:18 assures us, "Come now, let us reason together, says the Lord: though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they are red like crimson, they shall become like wool." Winter's glistening snow reminds us of the cleansing and forgiveness found in Christ. As we navigate the challenges of winter, let us hold onto the hope found in Isaiah 40:31, "But they who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings like eagles; they shall run and not be weary; they shall walk and not faint." In our waiting, God strengthens us and prepares us for the seasons of growth and renewal that lie ahead.

During this winter season, may we find comfort and inspiration in God's Word, knowing that even in the coldest and darkest moments, God is with us, guiding us, and preparing us for the beauty that comes with each new season.



Having the new projector mounted on the beam means that we no longer have to fear for Ken Atkinson's life or the wellbeing of the Junior Choir as they walk past the old projector on its tottering floor stand. We hope that everyone who joins us for worship and other events in St Salvator's will enjoy the benefits of this significant investment.

'Save the date' notifications have become extremely popular. They are an early announcement that there's an invitation on the way, usually for a wedding or another very special celebration. The important thing is that the sender wants you to know that on a specific date in the future something very special is going to happen, and they would like you to be present. You need to save the date in order not to miss out! You don't want to double-book on that day! So you'd be wise to put it in your diary. Mark it on the calendar. Something big is on its way! God peppered the Old Testament with 'save the date' notifications. While he didn't give us the exact day or year, He made it clear that one day he would send His Son to earth. And he wanted to make sure we would participate in the event, not merely by bedecking the tree, but by personally welcoming the 'Sent One' into our lives. God gave us plenty of notice about Christ's first coming, and daily we have the opportunity to respond to it.

And 'save the date' information for when the Saviour will return to earth again has already been posted in God's Word. One day Christ will come to take His bride, the church, home to Himself, and he will finally judge mankind. We need to ensure that our lives are not so cluttered with other things that we misuse the time He has given for us to prepare for an event that should not be missed – in fact, cannot be missed!

At His first coming, the world slept, but that will not be the case when Jesus returns, for 'Behold, He is coming with clouds, and every eye will see Him' (Revelation 1:7, emphasis added). 'Save the date'. He will return! ('Journey with me' Catherine Campbell, ivpbooks)

I am writing these words on the afternoon of Remembrance Sunday which I hope were meaningful services for all who attended. It is important that we continue to remember the sacrifices of the past both in global conflicts and in our own land and beyond due to acts of terror. On Remembrance Sunday over the past few years I have shared information about the names that we read out who are those who paid the ultimate price in the two World Wars. I was surprised to realise that I had reached the end of this list and shared some information about the last two names on my list.

My thanks again to Mr David Keys for allowing me to quote from his book on those from this area who paid the ultimate price for our freedom.

This year I shared information about two men who died in World War 1 and whose final resting place is known.

23035 Private Thomas Johnston, Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers

Thomas Johnston was the only son of John and Mary Johnston of Rossgole townland, Co Fermanagh. Thomas was a member of the 7th Battalion RIF and was killed on 13 March 1916 aged 19 years. He is buried at Philosphe British Cemetery Mazingarbe, Pas de Calais. Thomas enlisted at Pettigo on Fair Day 20 May 1915 when a total of 11 men from the area

enlisted. He is commemorated on the Memorial at Pettigo and on the County War Memorial, Enniskillen. 28094 Private John Wray, Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers John Wray





was a son of Mrs Kate Wray, Letter, Belleek and he was killed on 7 June 1917 aged 34 years and was a member of the 9th Battalion RIF. He was buried at Irish House Cemetery, Vlaanderan, Belgium. He is commemorated at the War Memorial in Pettigo and in Enniskillen.



Choir Concert - Cathedral 100 Years Old

It had been felt for some time, in the early years of the twentieth century, that Enniskillen Church merited a higher status than that of St Anne's Parish Church. This was due to the central position of Enniskillen, with regard to the Church of Ireland population in the Diocese of

Clogher. This idea was strongly promoted by the Enniskillen rector at the time, Archdeacon James MacManaway, later Bishop of Clogher. In 1920, plans were prepared which would bring the church up to cathedral standard. This involved the Act of Dedication

extension of the chancel, creation of the present choir stalls, and the enclosing of a robing room. In May 1921, the decision was made in the parish to proceed with upgrading the church and the approval of the General Synod of the Church of Ireland was obtained. Colonel Madden and Mr J. Whiteside Dane had made generous financial contributions towards the upgrading of the church. Colonel and Mrs Madden of Hilton Park, Clones, donated the bishop's throne. The marble lining of the chancel walls and the Communion rail and step were placed in the cathedral by Bishop MacManaway in memory of his son, Lancelot, and his dear wife. The upgrading of the porch and staircase, including the First World War memorial, were part of the work undertaken at that time. The memorial has inscribed upon it the names of 238 men who served in the war, 50 of whom gave up their lives. The memorial was unveiled by Sir Charles F. Falls on the day of consecration of the cathedral. The cathedral was consecrated and reopened on Wednesday 12th December 1923 by The Most Revd Charles D'Arcy, Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland.

The cathedral was consecrated as The Cathedral Church of St Macartan at Enniskillen. The name was subsequently changed to St MacCartin and later to the present usage, St Macartin.

The church's elevation to the status of a cathedral will be celebrated at the

concert in the cathedral on the evening of Tuesday 12th December.

The Dean's Sit Out for Charity

This year, funds will be distributed to Bishops' Appeal, Air Ambulance Northern



Ireland and the Cathedral Outreach Fund. Bishops' Appeal contributes to relief of suffering in time of emergencies whether natural or man-made.

The Aims:

 To educate the Church at home about the needs and concerns of people in the less developed world and the causes of poverty;

• To encourage Church members to examine the reasons for the problems facing the less fortunate in the world and to consider what we can do to change conditions;

• To reach out in God's name to those who need our help;

• To encourage informed prayer and prayerful action aimed at strengthening the poor; and

• To raise the funds needed to allow Bishops' Appeal to support development projects and alleviate the suffering caused by disasters, both natural and man-made.

The Church of Ireland Bishops' Appeal for World Aid and Development has released €10,000 (equivalent to £8,650) in emergency funds to the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem. The Diocese includes 7,000 Anglicans worshipping within 28 congregations in Israel, Palestine, Lebanon, Syria, and Jordan. It is responsible for more than 30 institutions, including hospitals, schools, clinics, rehabilitation centres, guesthouses, and retirement homes. The Diocese runs Al Ahli Arab Hospital in Gaza which provides medical care and support to all people, regardless of their

faith or ethnicity.

We urge the people of the Church of Ireland to pray for peace in the Land of the Holy One and pray for wisdom for those in positions of authority to work towards an end to all violence. We uphold to God in prayer all who are affected by the current conflict. All human life is the gift of God. The Church of Ireland, in its daily prayers, prays for people suffering in conflict, those who seek to bring care and relief, and the peace of the world. Air Ambulance NI is a charity in Northern Ireland. They work in partnership with the Northern Ireland Ambulance Service, to provide the Helicopter Emergency Medical Service for the region. Serious or life-threatening situations can happen to anyone at any time and on average, every single day in Northern Ireland, two individuals find themselves in critical need of an

Air Ambulance. The charity's operational helicopter carries a crew compiling pilot, doctor, and paramedic, 365 days of the year operating for 12 hours every day. They attend some of the most traumatic medical incidents across the province and are dedicated to delivering the very best possible pre-hospital critical care, both at the scene and whilst transferring the patient to the most appropriate hospital for their specific injuries.

St Macartin's Cathedral Outreach Fund is specifically designed to be 'people focused' and not 'building focused'. It helps fund groups like Parenting and Wellbeing, Messy Church, Xplore, Supper at Six and Senior Citizens. It also provides assistance for those in need and to assist with projects that reach out to people in the locality.

Confirmation Classes

Those who expect to be confirmed should regularly attend services with their families, as Confirmation is about taking your place within the life and mission of the Church. Born to Die

You are probably familiar with the story of Jesus' birth in Bethlehem. The Bible says that when the time had come, Mary "brought forth her firstborn Son, and wrapped Him in swaddling cloths, and laid Him in a manger" (Luke 2:6–7). But have you ever wondered why the angel told the shepherds that the Babe wrapped in swaddling cloths and lying in a manger was a "sign"? A manger is actually a feeding trough for livestock. Do you know what a feeding trough in those days looks like? I have seen a similar one at Solomon's stables in Meggido, Israel. It is basically a big rectangular block of stone with the trough hewn out of it. So baby Jesus, who was wrapped in swaddling cloths, was placed in such a stone trough.

But why was that a sign? Because if you have seen the empty tomb of Jesus at a place called The Garden Tomb in Jerusalem, you would have noticed that the place where His body was laid, inside a tomb hewn out of rock, resembles a stone trough. The Bible says that after Jesus' crucifixion and death, Joseph of Arimathea took Jesus' body, wrapped it in linen and laid it in a tomb hewn out of a rock (Mark 15:43–46).

Can you see the similarities? Wrapped in swaddling clothes and laid in a manger, baby Jesus would one day be wrapped in linen and laid in a tomb. That was the sign the angel was referring to. It pointed to Jesus' death.

Jesus was the only child in all of humanity born to die. Once you realise that, you will realise how much God loves you. You will realise that He gave up His Son for that one purpose, and that His Son willingly came for that one purpose—to die for your sins and mine.

Beloved, can you imagine living your

life knowing that you are just qualifying yourself to die on the cross to save the world? That was the life that Jesus lived. He lived to die, so that we might live and enjoy life abundantly today!

I order bulbs to plant at the weekend, buy paint for 'when I get the time' to repaint the utility, book holidays for the spring, buy books to read in the new year, and all the time, the present is going on around me, and I'm oblivious to it, my imagination in some future time and place.

A lot of people do this. They make plans for retirement, or for when the kids have left home, for a future where they'll 'be less busy'. They talk of the place they'll visit, the activities they'll find time for. Decluttering shows (of which I'm a big fan) often scan around homes filled with piles of unfinished craft projects, unsorted mail, incomplete DIY jobs, all set aside by well-meaning people for a fantasy realm somewhere in the future where things get done and where time is a plenteous commodity.

But there's another great phrase. 'As today, so tomorrow.' The things I don't find time for today, I won't find time for tomorrow. And God is the most central of those. If I can't find time for him today, why should tomorrow look any different? In this busy season, I've noticed my prayer life slipping. But as someone reminded me recently, 'every season is busy.' You can always find an excuse for not making something a priority, whether it's time with your kids, time to get on top of your finances, or time with the Lord. Or as

James the brother of Jesus puts it, 'Now listen, you who say, "Today or tomorrow we will go to this or that city, spend a year there, carry on business and make money." Why, you do not even know what will happen tomorrow. What is your life? You are a mist that appears for a little while and then vanishes. Instead, you ought to say, "If it is the Lord's will, we will live and do this or that." (James 4:13-15). The things I want to do tomorrow, I need to do today. Tomorrow carries no guarantees, and if I set my hopes there, I'll miss what the Lord wants to do in my life today.

So, whatever you do this December, don't set your hopes on January! Carve out time, now, for the things that are important. Even if it means saying no to some things other people tell you that you should be doing.

What if Jesus had never been born?

Philip Van Doren Stern was an American writer born in 1900 who, one night, in 1938 had a dream. In his dream he found himself standing on a bridge contemplating throwing himself in because he considered that his life was not worth living. While considering this action he was approached by a man who asked him what he was about to do and after the explanation, the man granted him the wish that he could view the world as if he had never been born. The man has the opportunity to travel around his neighbourhood and see what life for others would be like without him ever having been born and concludes at the end that perhaps his life was more meaningful, worthwhile and valuable than he had ever imagined. Stern got this 4000 word story published in 1943 and it was discovered soon after by a production company who turned it into the movie, "It's a Wonderful Life". Not unlike Charles Dicken's "A Christmas Carol" it brings the reader to comtemplate the value of their life and consider that it may be of greater value than first thought. In 1994, just over 50 years later the book, "What if Jesus had never been born?" was published, inspired by this same dream

encounter, only daring to imagine what life would be like in the world if it was Jesus who had never been born. Kennedy & Newcombe provide us with what they have entitled a quick overview of the impact that Jesus Christ has had as his disciples lived out their faith. "Despite its humble origins, the Church has made more changes on earth for the good than any other movement or force in history." And amongst those changes are listed: "Hospitals, most of the world's greatest universities were started by Christians for Christian purposes, literacy and education for the masses, representative government, civil liberties, the abolition of slavery (both in antiquity and in modern times), modern science, the elevation of women, benevolence and charity, higher standards of justice, the elevation of the common man, the sanctity of marriage and good sexual relationships, high regard for human life, the codifying and setting to writing of many of the world's languages, greater development of art and music, the countless changed lives transformed from liabilities inot assets to society because of the gospel, the eternal salvation of countless souls." (p3, 4) With such amazing positive outcomes and results there are yet many in our day who genuinely wish that Jesus had never been born, that the manger had remained empty, that there would be no such thing as Christmas, that God had not stepped into our world, as the light of the world to proclaim good news to the poor, to bind up the broken-hearted, to proclaim freedom to the captives and release from darkness for the prisoners, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour and the day of vengeance of our God, to comfort all who mourn and provide for those who grieve... Granted that much has been done in the name of Jesus by grossly misguided individuals and groups that had nothing to do with him whatsoever. Their actions were not in line with the kingdom plans and purposes of God. At this time of year as we move towards Christmas, would it be pertinent to consider the implications of Jesus never

having been born? The Bible tells us that his arrival and ministry was about destroying evil and inviting all people to come to him and find forgiveness, cleansing, new life and purpose and redirect their onwards journey heavenward. As men and women, boys and girls, older and younger said yes to his invitation to come follow, the world experienced the postive Spirit-transforming power of God, to the benefit of all. No Jesus – none of the above. Let us. as believers renew our faith in the transforming power of the gospel, the transforming power that comes through the renewed mind, and as we walk daily with the Lord, may we once again have great confidence in Him who's heart is to continue to make a difference for the better and benefit of this whole world... and may we celebrate that He was born among us!


Curry Night

Discipleship Leadership and Growth

In our world today there are many distractions. Not that there were not any distractions before the year 2000 or 1989 and the beginning of the internet and the World Wide Web (WWW.) but there seem to be "far more" distractions now. When I say distractions, I mean in terms of things that draw us away from what the Bible teaches and a weakening of our faith in God in particular.

In this Modern World there is a greater sense of "Entitlement" whereby people think that they are "Entitled" to receive something simply because THEY DO! Without taking into consideration any of the responsibilities or actions that may come with the "thing" that they feel entitled to receive.

In Titus 2:1 - 8 we read about how Paul directs Titus to teach people: "You, however, must teach what is appropriate to sound doctrine." (Titus 2:1)

"Teach the older men to be temperate, worthy of respect, self-controlled, and sound in faith, in love and in endurance."

- (Titus 2:2) Temperate
- Worthy of Respect
- Self-controlled
- Sound in faith
- Sound in love
- Sound in endurance

These virtues and values DO NOT come simply by being "older" but by reading and learning the Bible through study and discipleship. There is only so much that can be gained by attendance at a Sunday morning service.

"Likewise, teach the older women to be reverent in the way they live, not to be



slanderers or addicted to much wine, but to teach what is good." (Titus 2:3) Reverent in the way they live NOT slanderers NOT addicted to much wine BUT teach what is GOOD Equally as well, these virtues and values come with time and discipline through study. "Then they can urge the younger women to love their husbands and children, to be self-controlled and pure, to be busy at home, to be kind, and to be subject to their husbands, so that no one will malign the word of God." (Titus 2:4 - 5) By being at home and coming alongside the younger women, the older women are able to lead by example.

Having said that, the older men too can help the younger men: "Similarly, encourage the young men to be self-controlled. In everything set them an example by doing what is good. In your teaching show integrity, seriousness and soundness of speech that cannot be condemned, so that those who oppose you may be ashamed because they have nothing bad to say about us." (Titus 2:6 - 8)







As we are now in the season of Advent and fast approaching Christmas some of the readings used reflect the importance of the name used with regard to Jesus:-**Isaiah 9 v 6** – "For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulder. And he will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace". These titles or names speak of the eternal, sovereign nature and rule of Jesus Christ the promised coming Messiah.

Isaiah 7 v 14 – "Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign; The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a Son, and will call him Immanuel".

These words were fulfilled by the visit of the angel Gabriel to Mary, when she asks how she will give birth to a child since she was a virgin. She is told that the baby will be conceived by the work of the Holy Spirit.

This verse is used by the angel to the apprehensive Joseph when he is told by Mary of her pregnancy.


Immanuel is God come to earth in human flesh but without our sin. He would experience all human emotions be tempted as we are, yet He did not sin. John 1 – describes Jesus as the Word, the eternal, God present at the creation of the world "In the beginning was the Word, and the word was with God, and the word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through him all things were made; without him nothing was made that has been made. The word became flesh and he made his dwelling among us". Paul sums up the costly coming of Jesus and the purpose of his coming in words of Philippians 2 v 5-11.

Both Mary and Joseph are told the name of the baby boy to be born, Jesus, "He shall save his people from their sins." Jesus means Saviour, which clearly tell us the purpose of His coming, Jesus was born to die.

The last name is not a name or title for Jesus but the place of his birth. The prophet Micah (5 v 2), prophesied Jesus birthplace, the Roman emperor Caesar Augustus had called for a census and all people must go back to their family roots to be registered. Joseph along with Mary go to Bethlehem as descendants of King David, fulfilling Micah's prophecy. Bethlehem means house of Bread. Later Jesus would say "I am the bread of life. He who comes to me will never go hungry. He who believes in me will never be thirsty."

On the second advent of Jesus, he shall return with authority to be judge of all people's and establish his eternal worldwide Kingdom. Revelations 22 "Behold, I am coming soon, my reward is with me, and I will give to everyone according to what he has done. I am the Alpha and the Omega, the First and the Last, the Beginning and the End." As Christ fulfilled prophecy and became God with us in human flesh to carry out God's plan for the Salvation of the World for all time, so He will return again to complete God's eternal plan of a new Heaven and a new Earth.

The clear message of Advent is to be ready waiting particularly for your salvation is drawing nearer daily. Jean, Sarah and I would like to wish all our Parishioners God's blessing, peace and presence this Christmas and a Happy New Year.







Popular timepiece restored at Ballinode Church

The parishioners of St, Dympna's Church, in the Parish of Tydavnet, Ballinode, Co. Monaghan, with support from the local community have restored the clock on the tower which has become a landmark in the area.

The restoration of the clock on the tower of Ballinode Church which had been donated by Mrs Wood Wright of Golagh House, Scotstown in memory of her only child, W.H. Wood-Wright who died in 1880 at the age of 27, has received endorsement from local funding organisations.

A Service of Thanksgiving and Rededication after the restoration of the tower clock and church repairs took place on Friday, 27 October when the preacher was the Bishop of Clogher, the Right Revd Dr. Ian Ellis. There was a good attendance at the service conducted by the Rector, Chancellor Ian Berry, who welcomed members of the parish involved in the restoration along with other community leaders and funding representative.

The clock was made by Chancellor and Son, Dublin and was donated by Mrs Wood Wright. The clock has been mentioned in the Heritage Councils "Horology /The Heritage of clocks and other Timepieces" as a very rare example of a church clock as most Irish clocks dating from the late 19th century were made in England.

The clock is double faced, both inscribed, circular faced with brass hands in moulded limestone facing west and south with lead lettering and a marble plaque underneath. The clock has been out of use for many years and has been restored by Canavan Clockmakers, Lurgan by the electrification of the clock rotation on both clocks and the addition of a new electromechanical bell hammer to strike the existing bell on the hour whilst keeping the original mechanism intact.

Prior to electrification, the weights had to be wound up every week, times adjusted, the pendulum regulated and the bushings and other parts oiled regularly. In living memory this work was dutifully carried out by

George Humphreys, Tommy Leitch, Moore Heasty and Vincie McAree himself who made many parts over the years to keep it going. This was very time-consuming work. The restoration was made possible by a very enthusiastic cross community committee comprising Brendan Monaghan, Dermot Maguire, Patrick McClave and Raymond Wilkinson , the generosity of the local community and a Built Heritage Investment Grant 2023 facilitated by Monaghan County Council.

Four governments were represented at the Remembrance Day Service in St Macartin's Cathedral, Enniskillen organised by Enniskillen Parish and the Royal British Legion, which followed a ceremony at the Cenotaph.

The service was conducted by the Dean of Clogher, the Very Revd Kenneth Hall, assisted by Monsignor Peter O'Reilly, of St. Michael's Roman Catholic Church and Captain Trevor Homfray-Cooper, Padre to the Royal Dragoon Guards.

The preacher was the Bishop of Clogher, the Right Revd Dr. Ian Ellis. Attending was the Secretary of State, the Right Hon Chris Heaton Harris MP representing the United Kingdom Government; the Taoiseach, Mr Leo Varadkar T.D., representing the Irish Government; the Consul General James Applegate, representing the American Government and Mr Jerome Mullen, Honorary Consul of the Republic of Poland, representing the Polish Government. His Majesty's Lord Lieutenant for Fermanagh, Viscount Brookeborough KG, KSt.J also attended and took part. A contingent from the Royal Dragoon Guards was in attendance.

The Book of Remembrance was opened by Lt Col Mark Scott(Ret'd) MBE, DL Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers who gave the exhortation and the Last Post and Reveille were sounded by Mr Warren Kerr of Ballyreagh Silver Band. A Piper's Lament was played by Pipe Major Gordon McKeown, 4 UDR Association.

The readings were by Mr. John Jones, Chairman, Enniskillen Branch of the Royal British Legion; Viscount Brookeborough and Monsignor Peter O'Reilly.

The prayers were led by the representatives from the UK, Irish, American and Polish Governments.

The hymns were; "Praise, my soul, the King of heaven;" "I vow, to thee, my country," "Your kingdom come, O God," "Lord while for all he world we pray," "Be thou my vision, O Lord of my heart" and "Nearer, my God, to thee." The organist was Mr. Glenn Moore. The Bishop of Clogher, the Right Revd Dr. Ian Ellis, in his Remembrance Day address spoke about the importance of memories and remembering.

"Today is such a sombre occasion when we come together as a community here in Enniskillen, as communities come together all over the UK and Ireland, to remember those who died or served in the two great wars of the 20th century and the many conflicts since that time. We also have special cause to remember those who were killed in defence of our freedom during our period of troubles in Northern Ireland. And today of all days we think of those from this town who lost their lives in the bomb attack at the Enniskillen War Memorial in 1987.

"Today we remember particularly those who served and those who gave their lives in the two great wars at the early part of the 20th

Bible reading and prayer journals available to help build young people's relationship with God

During their time in Accra, Dame Arlene, former First Minister of Northern Ireland and Brian met the Anglican Bishop of Ghana and visited the Anglican Cathedral.

CHURCH LEADERS VISIT MESSINES ON REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY

A group of Church Leaders from Ireland participated in a special ceremony to commemorate the 25th anniversary of the Island of Ireland Peace Park, in the village of Messines on Sunday afternoon, 12th November.

Archbishops John McDowell and Eamon Martin were accompanied by the Revd David Turtle, President of the Methodist Church in Ireland, and the Very Revd Dr Rob Craig, a former Moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, representing the current Moderator, the Rt Revd Dr Sam Mawhinney, who was undertaking a weeklong pastoral visit to Presbytery of Omagh. The ceremony, organised by the Mayor and the Town Council of Messines, the Irish and British embassies to Belgium. and the Office of the Northern Ireland Executive in Brussels, looked back to the Peace Park's inauguration on Armistice Day 1998, as a symbol of peace and reconciliation following the conclusion of the Belfast/Good Friday Agreement. The Peace Park was built by volunteers from north and south to commemorate the 200,000 Irishmen who fought in the First World War, and to embody the message of peace for the next generation. An estimated 35,000 Irish soldiers lost their lives in the war, many in the areas surrounding Ypres and Messines. The park was opened by President Mary



McAleese in the presence of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II and Their Majesties King Albert II and Queen Paola of the Belgians.

Containing a replica of an Irish round tower, it came about through the determination and inspiration of Paddy Harte, from Donegal and Glenn Barr, from Derry-Londonderry, and is visited by many thousands of people each year. It is located close to the site of the 1917 Battle of Messines Ridge, during which the 16th (Irish) Division fought alongside the 36th (Ulster) Division.

The Church Leaders met with the Barr and Harte families and spent time with a group of young people from Northern Ireland and international guests talking about peace and reconciliation.

A joint British military and Irish Defence Forces band provided music at the ceremony, which was followed by the unveiling of the Pillars of Peace project in nearby Messines Town Square in the company of representatives from Australia, Ukraine, Belgium, France, Germany, New Zealand, Britain and Ireland.

The Government of Ireland was represented by Minister for Education, Ms Norma Foley TD, and the Government of the United Kingdom was represented by the Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State for Northern Ireland, Lord Caine.

SEMINAR ON PROTESTANT **COMPREHENSIVE SCHOOLS**

The Revd Professor Anne Lodge (pictured right), who leads the Church of Ireland Centre at DCU, has presented new research into Protestant comprehensive schools, drawing on interviews and document archives, to tell their origin and contemporary stories and how their lived ethos is expressed.

She was speaking at a recent seminar on this theme, co-hosted by the Church of Ireland Centre and the Educational Studies Association of Ireland (ESAI) at Dublin City University's Purcell House on Friday, 27th October.

This research project's rationale was to capture the memories and insights of those involved at the start of comprehensive schooling and also a concern about the visibility of the diversity of school type in research and policy-making. It therefore sought to document and analyse the stories of the five Protestant comprehensives and compare them with the nine other comprehensives and the 20 other Protestant second level schools. Of the 14 current comprehensives, 10 were amalgamations of other schools, three were on greenfield sites, and one was a



single school continuing to operate on its site. Nine were rural and five were urban, four were in the DEIS (Delivering Equality of Opportunity In Schools) Plan for communities at risk of disadvantage and social exclusion, one had boarding, and one was in the Gaeltacht.

The five Protestant comprehensives are more likely to be large urban schools, and they account for 42 per cent of all comprehensive students. Four out of the five came from the amalgamation of a range of different private secondary schools, while the other emerged out of local lobbying.

COMMUNITY NEWS Christian Aid Christmas appeal - Bangladesh's material girls

In one of the poorest and most severely flood-affected areas of Bangladesh, women are embracing new technology to revive an ancient art form, overcoming both poverty and prejudice.

Kakoli Khatun comes from a region of northern Bangladesh beset by devastating annual flooding as well as high levels of extreme poverty and child marriage. However, this 21-year-old is defying expectations by combining a successful new business venture with studying at university.

Kakoli is passionate about preserving nakshi kantha, the centuries-old Bengali art of quilt making which involves embroidering old cloth with thread. She said:

"Nakshi kantha is from an old era and it's getting lost but if we can make it and sell it, it will spread."

Christian Aid's local partner, Aid Comilla gave Kakoli the training, technology and money she needed to set up an online business. As one of Aid Comilla's 'change agents', Kakoli then recruited and trained nine other women from her village to join her new business.

Things used to be very different for Kakoli: "I didn't have any dreams a few years ago because I didn't have any money. To do something, I had to ask for money from my brothers and father. Today, I have a dream to grow this business so I can support my parents."

The turnaround in Kakoli's life is particularly impressive given that she lives in Kurigram, Bangladesh's most impoverished district where sixty per cent of the population are landless and over half live in extreme poverty.

The climate crisis is pushing people in Kurigram further into poverty. Higher global temperatures bring heavier monsoon rains, and when the mighty swollen rivers reach this low-lying area, they burst their banks, damaging houses, destroying crops and leaving hundreds of thousands of people stranded.

This combination of material poverty and a poverty of expectation for girls helps to explain why Bangladesh has one of the highest rates of child marriage in the world. Over half of all girls are married before turning 18 and 22% are married by the age of 15. Child marriage normally spells the

end of a girl's education as she takes on the domestic duties of a wife and mother. Kakoli avoided an early marriage by convincing her parents to allow her to study instead: "My parents aren't educated," she said. "They saw a lot of girls get married around us so they think that their daughter has grown up and needs to be married. I told my parents I don't want to marry. I want to study. I'm in the first year of my degree course and next I want to do a Master's." Across Kurigram, literacy rates are just 65%. This is why Kakoli wants girls to stay in education for as long as possible. She said: "If girls get married early, they don't understand the value of education and when they have daughters of their own, they make them marry early. The literacy

rate drops gradually. If we're educated, our children will be too."

Women like Kakoli are working together to take control of their lives. Already, Christian Aid's support has enabled Aid Comilla to reach more than 5,800 women. But this Christmas, there are so many other women around the world who urgently need the same opportunity.

With your help we can train more young change-makers, provide more women with smart phones and build more internet hubs to connect them with a better future. In turn, these young women will go on to train others like them and light the path to change.
